Democrats to Fight Hard Tuesday to Hold Congress

Presbyterian Synod Meeting Enthusiastic One

Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, pastor of Cisco First Presbyterian church, arrived home Friday afternoon from San Antonio, where he attended the meeting of the Synod of Texas of the Presbyterian church, U. S.

The meetings were held in San Antonio First Presbyterian church, in cooperation with the centennial of that church.

Wednesday night the First church entertained the synod with a barbecue at La Villita Village. The honor guest was Dr. Green, moderator of the general assembly of the southern church.

Following the barbecue, the centennial of the First church was held at 8 p. m., in the remodeled sanctuary of the church. Dr. W. A. McLeod of Cuero, historical chairman, presided.

Dr. Green, moderator of the general assembly, brought a most inspiring message, after which Dr. Bondurant of the First church told of the objectives of the church for its centennial year.

The church, for every dollar spent for the local congregation, spent one likewise for some one else. The pastor of the new Grace church, located in the Jefferson high school district, San Antonio, was presented a check for \$20,000 for their new building.

Mr. Farnsworth of Houston, chairman of the Presbyterian educational drive in Texas, was presented a check for \$50,000 for the educational fund. The San Antonio church assured Mr. Farnsworth that the church quota of \$90,000 for the educational fund would be paid in cash, within 90 days.

Arrangements are to be made for the southern and northern church synods to be held together next year, probably in Dallas or Ft. Worth.

T. C. Williams was also present as a representative of the Cisco church. Total attendance was more than 400.

Cisco Had Electric Storm, Inch Rain, Saturday

Cisco experienced a heavy rain and electrical storm early Saturday morning, during which about one inch of moisture fell. There was comparatively little wind and the storm passed before daylight.

Rumor was widespread in Cisco Saturday morning that a destructive cyclone had struck Cross Plains, Callahan county. Telephone lines to both Cross Plains and Rising Star were out of commission and little of fact could be ascertained until later in the day when a truck driver for West Texas Produce company arrived in Cisco.

He brought the news that Cross Plains had high winds in the early morning hours, but that property damage was small and that no lives were lost.

Lobo Band Football Program a Spectacular One

The Cisco Lobo band presented its most spectacular football game program in many years before and at the half time of the Cisco-Brownwood game Friday night.

Fireworks provided by A-G Motor company formed a magnificent pre-game display a few minutes before the kickoff as the band, standing in a darkened field, with the flash-bombs bursting in streamers over them, played the Star-Spangled Banner. The Cisco fire department shot the pyrotechnics.

During the half-time, shared with the splendid Brownwood band, the Cisco musicians played "Bicycle Built For Two" from a formation representing an old-fashioned bicycle with revolving wheels formed of the players, and an airplane that moved down the turf in an outline of colored lights when the field lamps were turned off.

Vocational School to Open Welding Shop in Cisco

The Eastland County Vocational School, with headquarters in the Prairie Oil building, Eastland, will open a welding school in Cisco, Tuesday, Nov. 12. It will be located at the Adams Welding Shop, Eighth and E.

Election Polls to Open at 8 in Cisco Tuesday

Polls will open at Cisco city hall and at East Ward school house at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning for Texas' statewide election. Voting will end at 7 o'clock in Cisco.

Fred Grist, in charge at city hall, had not completed his list of election officers Saturday afternoon, but said a full force would be on the job.

W. R. Huestis, in charge at the school house, said his list of officers was not complete, but that W. W. Wallace, Kent Word, Mr. Gilmore and J. D. Yardley would be among those to serve.

Police Arrest 4 of Anti-Negro, Anti-Jew Group

ATLANTA, Nov. 2. (AP)—Police arrested a founder and three members of the new Anti-Negro, Anti-Jewish Columbians, Inc., on charges of inciting to riot today and demands arose to suppress the secret society.

No physical clash occurred, but Detective Chief E. I. Hilderbrand said an angry crowd gathered in an Atlanta neighborhood where the four Columbians were warning Frank Jones, a Negro, not to move into a house he had bought in a semi-white block.

In an editorial today, the Atlanta Constitution called on Governor-Nominate Eugene Talmadge for help in efforts to disband the Anti-Negro and Jew group formed last Aug. 16.

Agnew will officiate and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery. Mr. McCarty, 32, died from a pistol wound, accidentally inflicted, according to Henry Stubblefield, justice of the peace.

L. D. Donaway of Dothan, who celebrated his 91st birthday on October 11, was a caller at the Daily Press office Friday, accompanied by a son and daughter. Though totally blind, he is in excellent health for one of his age and in good spirits at all times.

He was born in Morgan county, Ala., October 11, 1855. When he came to Texas he first settled near Putnam in 1893, or just before the Cisco cyclone. Later he moved to his present home at Dothan.

Mrs. Donaway, who also enjoys very good health, was born in Miami, county, Ohio, October 16, 1859. They were married November 8, 1883, in Alabama, and will soon celebrate their 63d wedding anniversary.

Four children were born to this union, one of whom, Myrtle Donaway, is deceased. The others are D. L. Donaway, Joe Donaway and Miss Pearl Donaway.

Mr. Donaway has never missed voting in a Democratic election since he became of age. His first vote was cast for Samuel J. Tilden for president. Tilden, by the way, received the largest popular vote, but failed of election.

The aged man is widely known throughout the county and is always glad to meet and talk with friends who call at his home.

HUGE CROWD SAW CISCO WIN FROM BROWNWOOD IN BIGGEST CONFERENCE UPSET OF WEEK

There were stars over Chesley Field Friday night -- stars in the sky and stars that streamed from a spectacular pre-game fireworks display. And there were eleven stars that fell on Brownwood.

An unbelievable band of Cisco Loboes, tired of being kicked around by an indifferent fate, came into its own in convincing fashion by defeating heavily favored Brownwood Lions -- 13 to 0.

In doing so they furnished the Interscholastic League's "upset of the week" and tossed a gallant salute to those persistent well-wishers who said they had it in them. It was Brownwood's first conference defeat of the season and a bitter, bitter one to numerous Pecan Bayou partisans who had come for a holiday and remained for disaster.

They sat stunned while a Lobo team, magnificent from end to end and paced by the towering Williams and slashing "Papa" Noble, outplayed and out maneuvered their team from start to finish. If these two Cisco lads were super Friday night, it was because there were nine others who went every step of the way with them—Alvin King and Raymond Penn and Robert Rendall and Ted Fields and Harold Hill and Charlie Pence and Gerald Smith and Flournoy Cleveland and Don Johnson!

The Loboes won by combining a fondness for the pigskin with an airtight defense against aerials and such rocking line play that the Brownwood T-formation was rarely able to put more than two ground gainers together. Time and again the Cisco forwards charged through to toss Brownwood backs for losses, particularly on attempted end sweeps, so that the Lions lost a total of 40 yards from scrimmage to 106 gained — a net of only 66 yards in running plays.

Out of 13 passes attempted, Brownwood was able to complete three — one allowed for interference — and they had four intercepted, one for a touchdown in the most spectacular play of the game. In contrast, six of Don Johnson's eleven sharpshooter heaves were completed — one to Pence for a touchdown, while only one was intercepted. That interception, incidentally, had an ironic note. It set the stage for the second Cisco touchdown. Duila, a Brownwood sub, made the interception on the Cisco 40-yard line. On the very next play Crossland, Brownwood quarter, stepped back and shot one down the middle.

Stanley Williams leaped above two Lion receivers and snagged the ball on Cisco's 25 yard line. A quick-forming wave of Cisco blockers blasted him an alley to the sideline and down it he raced, turning just outside the outstretched arms of three tacklers a foot from the foul line, and flying straight down that line to cross the goal, 75 yards away. He out-

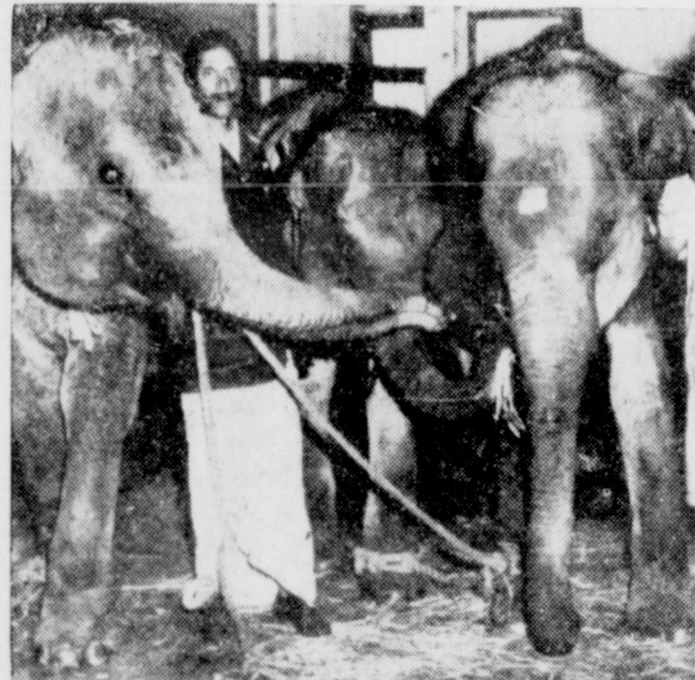
ran the fleetest Lion backs in a run that iced away a game already won in the first quarter. Cisco scored from the initial kickoff, marching 80 yards in a drive that featured Williams' running and Johnson's bullet-like passes to King, Pence and Williams. Corder of Brownwood kicked well to Williams, who returned 10 yards to Cisco's 20. Williams made one, Johnson lost two and then Johnson rifled to Williams for 15 and the Loboes, momentarily stymied, were off. Gerald Smith blasted the line for five and Williams broke off left tackle in a 22-yard center. He added five, Johnson three and King took a pass for five. Williams collected four more and King rarely missed a pass. Williams ran for six and Johnson got three at center.

Then, with the ball on the 12 yard line, the Loboes executed a touchdown pass play that was a thing of artistic beauty. Don Johnson took the pass from center and started toward his right, screened by a vanguard of blockers, and carrying the ball cocked against his right ear. Across the goal line 15 yards away Charles Pence ran parallel to Johnson in trying to get ahead of two of three Lion defenders. As he pulled ahead, Johnson rifled to his mid-section and the Cisco right end took the ball going away for the score. Cleveland drop-kicked the point and there the score stood until Williams' magnificent interception and run in the fourth period.

In the second quarter Brownwood advanced to Cisco's 17-yard line in what looked like the beginning of the end for Cisco. But the confident Lion backers watched the Loboes break up every pass play and spill every line attack for a loss. Cisco took over on its 22 and that was as far as Brownwood ever got.

In the matter of statistic, too, Cisco won. They made nine first downs to five for Brownwood, gained 134 yards on the ground and 64 yards in the air. Cisco lineup:

Drumwright, president; Mason Pee, vice president; Lucile Huffmyer, secretary-treasurer; and the following directors — George Grayum, E. G. Damron, A. D. Anderson, Charles A. Spears, Tom B. Stark, Charlie M. Burke, Standlee McCracken, Joe Clements and J. L. Thornton.

Much has been accomplished by the association since its organization of which the merchants are proud. One of great protection to the merchants is the curbing of outside soliciting for advertisements and donations, which take money out of Cisco and bring no return to the merchants here. Any club, organization or individual wishing to solicit are asked to call at the office of the association and receive a card of approval from the secretary; otherwise, the merchants will not recognize it as a valid project. This one thing alone, said Mrs. Huffmyer, has already saved the merchants many dollars. Every project is thoroughly investigated, and if found unworthy of support, is turned down.

"A comfortable acceptance of the role of our Credit Bureau by people in general is heart-warm-

ing," Mrs. Huffmyer added. "A popular notion in the past was that Credit Bureaus only contain a black-list. It is quite the contrary. Our Bureau has the names of both the good and the bad. Some of our members, and many of our citizens, have even dropped into our office and submitted their financial statements, or asked us to forward a copy of their rating to some other town where they desire credit. This contributes much to the success of our organization."

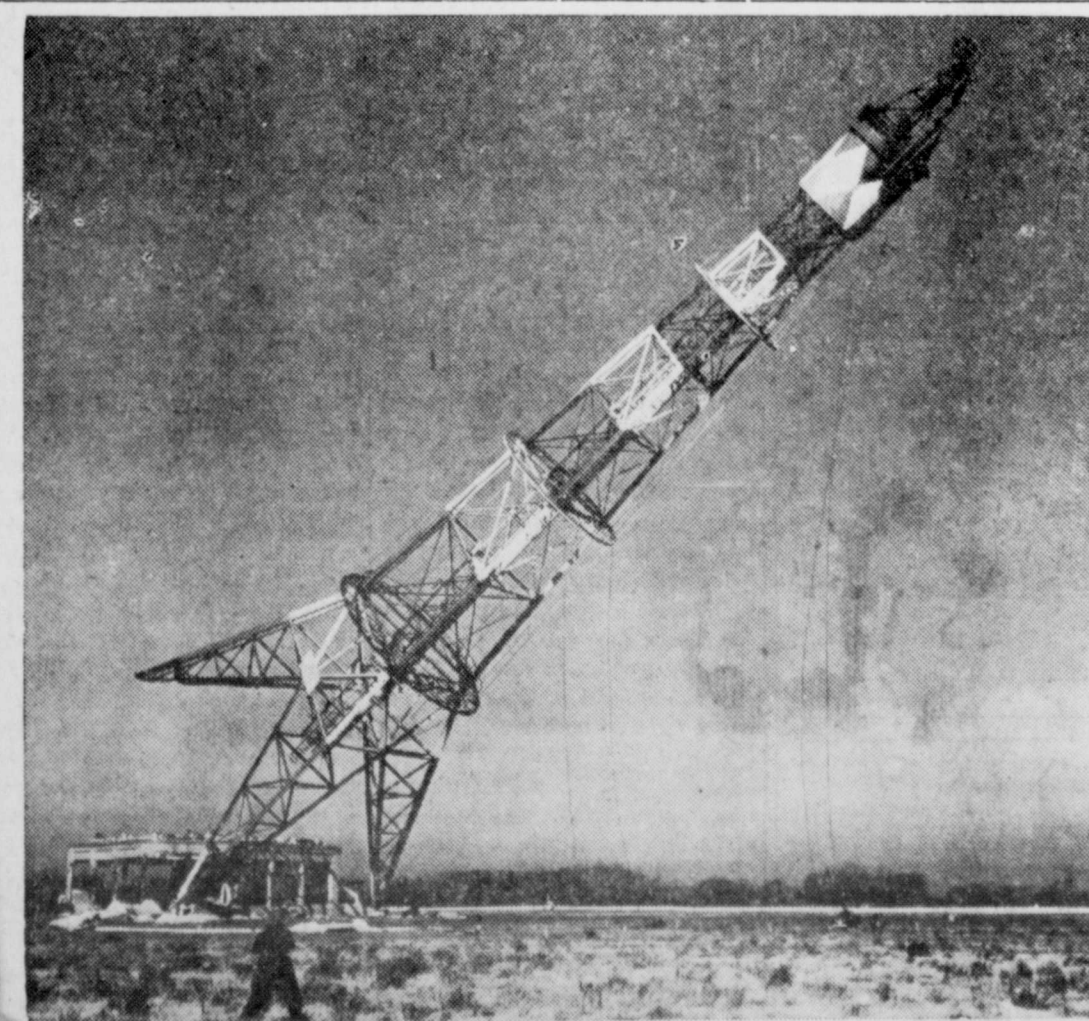
Miniature of High School Routine Pleased Parents

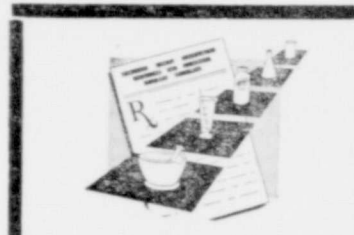
