## Taft Says GOP Can Cut U. S. Costs \$13 Billions

The electorate Tuesday voted Republicans into control of Congress during the next two years while a Democrat rules the White House.

Precedent, however, promises little cooperation. The last time the voters sent a Republican Congress to Washington to help a Democratic president run the nation — in 1918 during the Wilson administration — the result was the bitterest kind of political and personal conflict.

President Truman, confronted with his party's disaster at the polls and suggestions that he resign, was represented as planning to spend the next two years in the White House acting in a way he considers good for the nation.

Authoritative Democratic sources said Mr. Truman has no intention of quitting.

Nor has he any intention of forming a coalition government by bringing Republicans into top positions of the executive branch.

In Chicago, meanwhile, a leading Republican and presidential aspirant, Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, predicted that his party will be able to cut government expenses by \$13,000,000,000 next year, and at the same time reduce taxes 20 per cent.

Taft said he would accomplish this by aiming at federal expenditures of \$25,000,000,000 annually instead of the present budget of \$43,000,000,000.

Taft told a news conference that he believed the suggestion that Mr. Truman resign "has merit."

Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece, in a victory statement, called on Mr. Truman to cooperate with the Republican 80th Congress.

Meanwhile, House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr. said the first job to be undertaken by the GOP Congress will be to return the nation to a peacetime basis and cut it loose from government controls.

Martin, who will become House speaker, mapped conferences "to prepare for prompt and decisive action" by the Republican Congress. If that action conflicts with Mr. Truman's wishes, presidential vetoes are sure to fly and bi-partisan promises of cooperation may go out the window.

### Sees Strikes in U.S. As Greatest Menace to Peace

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. — Eugene Meyer, president of the World Bank, declared today that strikes in this country are threatening the world with economic starvation and thereby endangering the peace.

Meyer called present American labor relations "disastrous." He headed the Federal Reserve board and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation under Republican administrations and resigned as publisher of the Washington Post last June to accept the bank's presidency.

#### ROAD BOND VOTED.

NEW ORLEANS — A \$25,000,000 road bond issue which Gov. Jimmie Davis said would make available a total of \$41,000,000 by matching federal funds, appeared adopted today in unofficial partial returns from Tuesday's general election.

#### MURDER AND ARSON.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 7. — Two men listed on a Seafarers' International union ballot as candidates for minor offices were held without bail on murder and arson charges today in connection with a fire which swept a waterfront rooming house a week ago and killed five Latin-American seamen.

### Molotov Goes to Washington to Meet President

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (U.P.) — Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov arrived in Washington today for the first meeting between President Truman and a top Soviet official since the Potsdam conference last year.

Molotov stepped from his special railroad car at Union Station here to be greeted by Acting Secretary of State Dean Acheson and Soviet Ambassador Nikolai Novikov.

Acheson, in a brief formal greeting, conveyed President Truman's "welcome to Washington" to the Soviet member of the Big Four foreign ministers council.

Molotov told Acheson through an interpreter that "I convey my great gratitude to the president of the United States."

It was officially stated that Molotov's visit with Mr. Truman would be solely a "courtesy call."

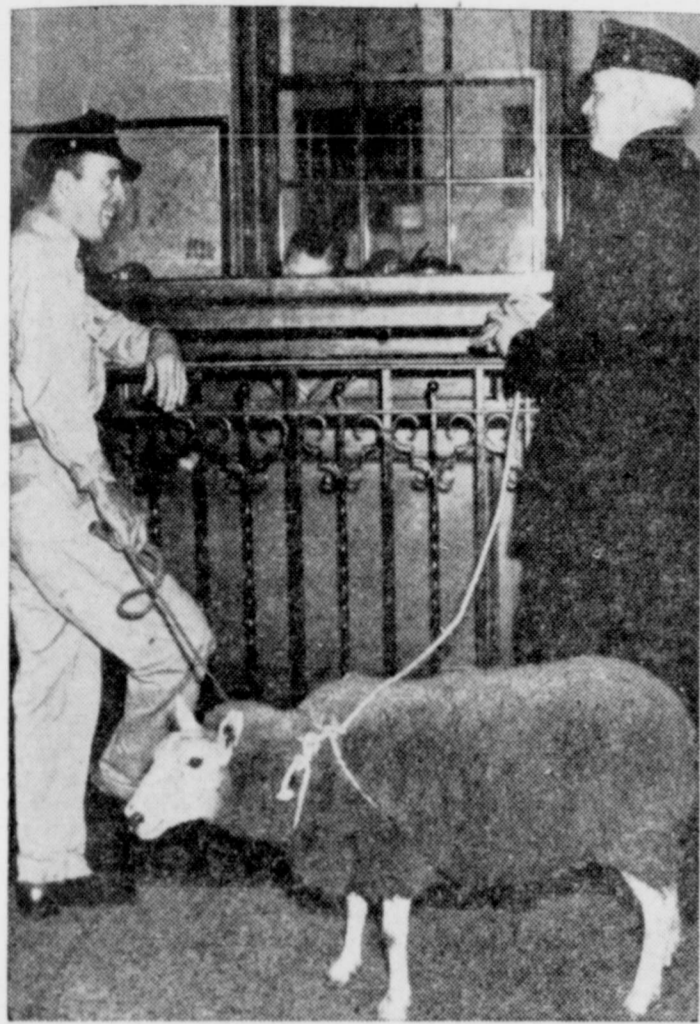

### Humble to Broadcast 3 All-Conference Games Eastland Airport

Football broadcasts this Saturday afternoon will give fans their choice of three all-conference games, as Southwest Conference teams, for the first time this season, pair off three and three.

The first game to be broadcast by Humble Oil and Refining Company will be the Arkansas-Rice game at Little Rock, which starts at 1:50 p. m. Kern Tips will describe play-by-play and will be assisted by Alec Chesser for color highlights. Stations carrying this game will be WOAI, San Antonio; WFAA-WBAP, Dallas-Ft. #### POSTPONE DEMONSTRATION.

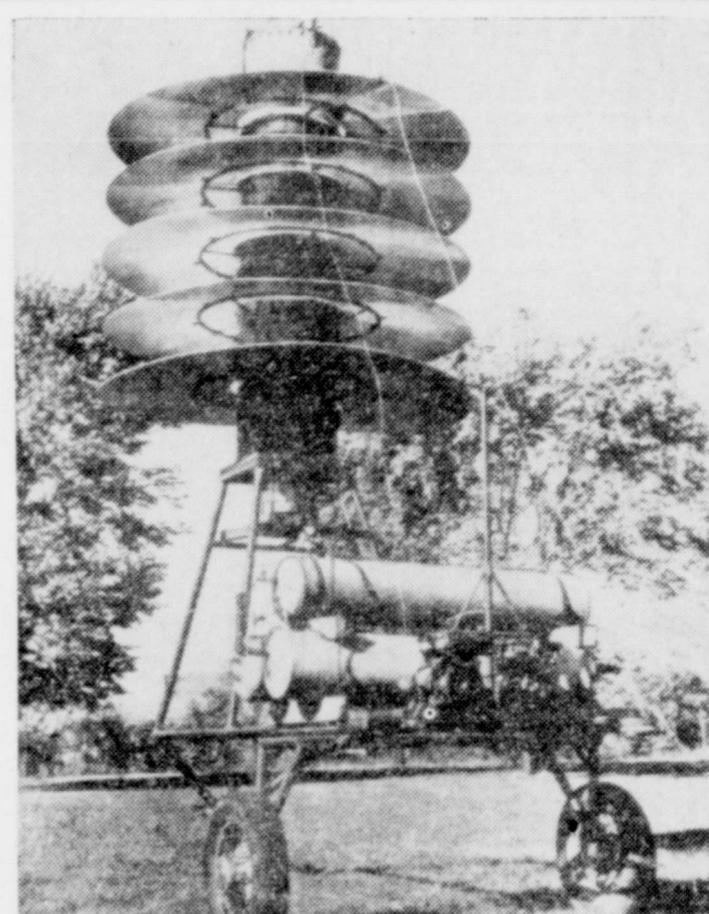

### Jester to Name 3 Appointees at An Early Date

AUSTIN, Nov. 7. — Appointments to public office was the principal theme of conversation at the capital Wednesday following the election of the new Democratic slate to make it possible for the officials-elect to discuss their choices without violating ethics and customs.

Neither Governor-Elect Beauford H. Jester nor Attorney General-to-Be Price Daniel would make any announcements Wednesday but it is known both will make almost clean sweeps in their respective jurisdictions.

Jester admitted he was working on his slate of appointees but said he had not received acceptance to some of his invitations, and for that reason was not ready to make announcements.

Daniel started interviewing applicants in his old quarters in the Speaker's room of the House and had a huge file of endorsements in behalf of applicants.

There will be over forty assistant attorneys general to name and nearly all will be new faces, it became known Wednesday, as Daniel squared off to select their successors.

He also has a large point and those who are loyal will be retained in most cases while others will be supplanted, efficiency also being a test. Daniel has given no hint as to who will be

### Many Old-line Political Machines Need Repair Job

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. (U.P.) — A number of old-line Democratic political machines, long the big-time vote producers in key states, were in need of a repair job today.

Only one of the major local machines, the Crump organization in Tennessee, emerged from Tuesday's election without serious damage from the Republican onslaught.

The Pendergast Machine in Missouri, the Kelly organization in Chicago, and the Hague Machine in New Jersey all took beatings from the GOP. Even the Tammany Machine in Manhattan suffered dents and scratches.

SANTA CLAUS.

The Santa Claus myth, in giving children the idea that they can live by magic, helps to make neurotics of them, says Maj. Gen. Brook Chisholm, Canada's Surgeon General. In a visit to New York as member of the UN World Health Organization, the general, a psychoanalyst, said neurotics are being produced today on a mass basis. Parents are helping by what they are saying to their children, and he quotes conversations overheard in public buses.

The general's remedy for increasing neuroses is to have psychoanalysts share their specialized knowledge with members of parent-teacher groups, school and home organizations, community clubs and the like.

Thoughtful parents will agree with the general in deerring the technique of "if-you-aren't-a-good-boy-Santa-won't-come." Perhaps, though, he will permit a mild Santa Claus drama in the infant years. Half the fun of Christmas will be lost for Mom and Dad if science is going to rob them of this.

MOSLEM-HINDU PEACE.

For the first time in history Moslems and Hindus in India are burying their differences and working for a unified country. Moslems have accepted five offices on the fourteen-man coalition interim government which is attempting to set up frame work for an independent India. Heretofore the Moslem League refused to meet with the Congress Party, composed of Hindus.

The Moslem capitulation does not mean the end of strife in that troubled country. Calcutta and Bombay report Hindu-Moslem clashes resulting in bloodshed and killings. The crowded province of Bengal with its 5,000,000 population is in the grip of communal strife because of rice shortage, and masses face starvation.

India's complex problems, political, economic and social, cannot be approached until Indians themselves can find a common basis for tackling these issues. In the present world, the state of any one country affects all. Consequently this first getting-together of Moslem and Hindu is an event of at least slight encouragement not only to Indians, but to all people.

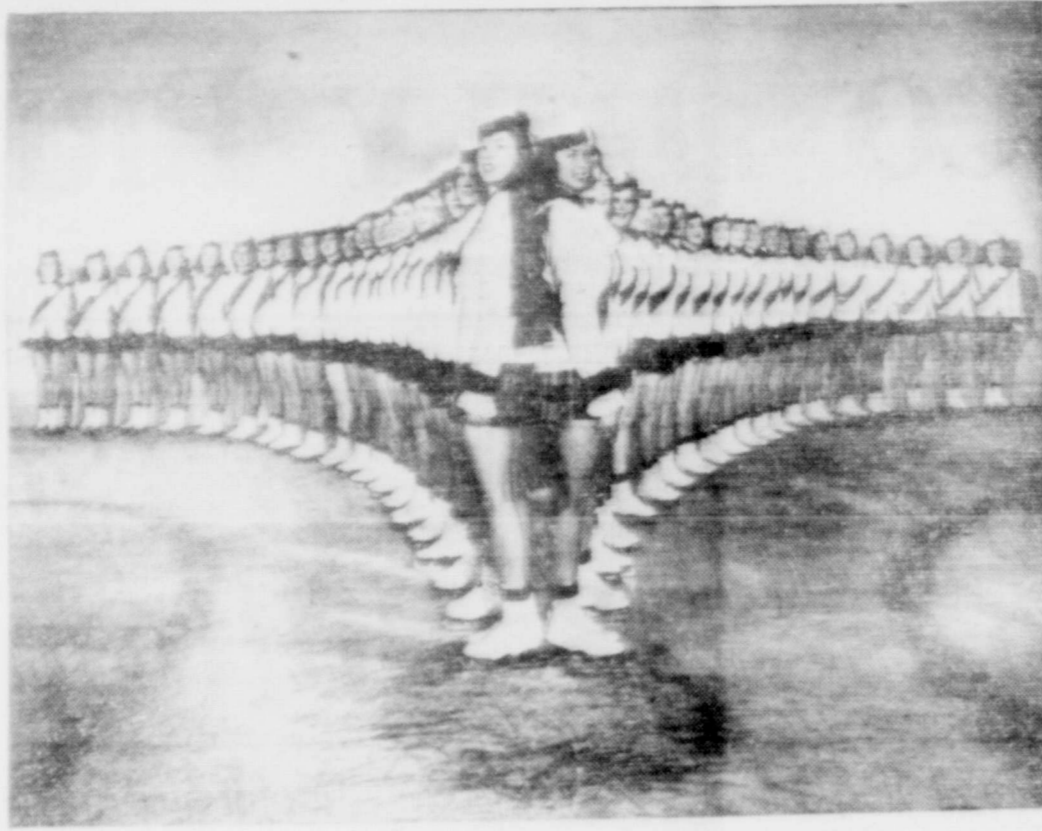

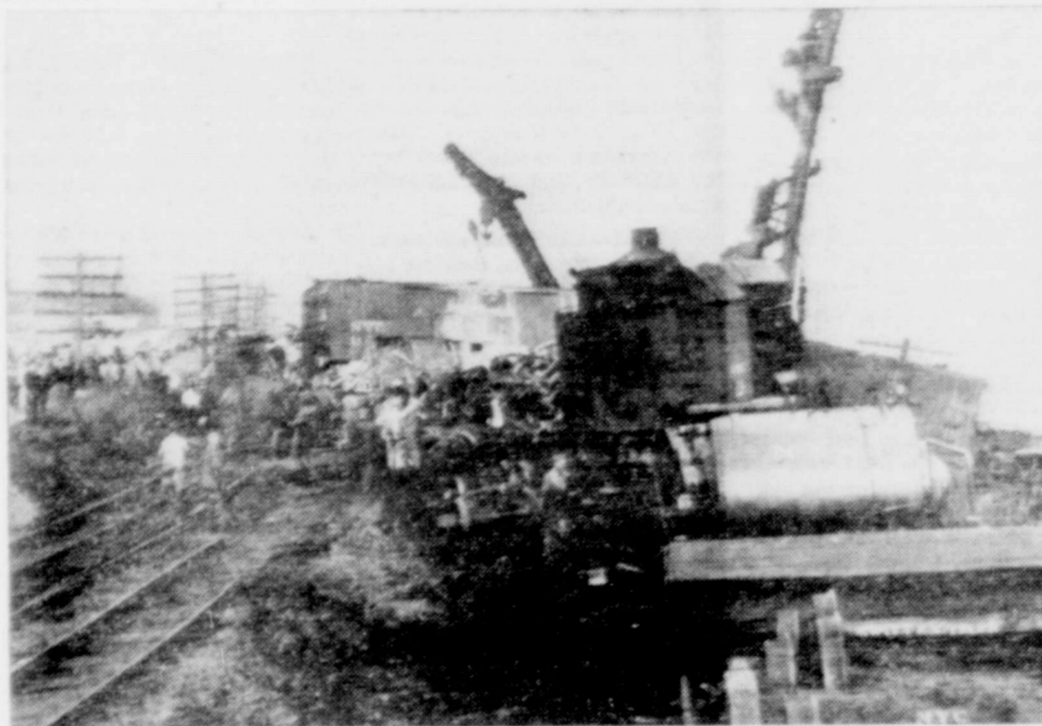

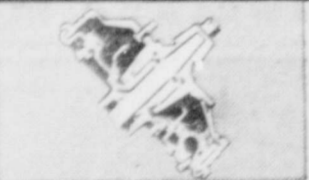

BIG BODY. One of biggest in the half-ton field, body is 78 in. long, 49 in. wide, 20 in. high.



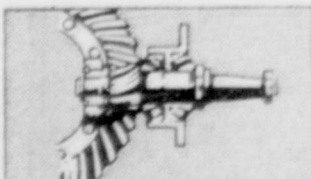
FLOATING REAR AXLE. Typical of heavy truck design, axle shaft propels, axle housing carries the load.



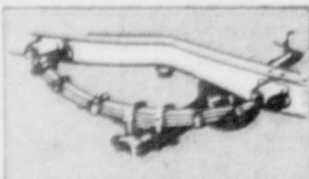
