

BRAN GRIDDLE CAKE ROLLS

11/2 cups sifted flour tablespoon baking powder 2 tablespoons sugar

1 egg. slightly beaten 1½ cups milk 3 tablespoons melted shortening

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg and milk; add to dry ingredients stirring until partially mixed. Add shortening and bran; stir until batter is fairly smooth. Bake at once on hot griddle, turning only once. As soon as baked, remove from griddle, spread with softened butter, sprinkle with brown sugar. Roll up like a jelly roll.

Yield: 8 griddle cake rolls (51/2 inches in diameter).




