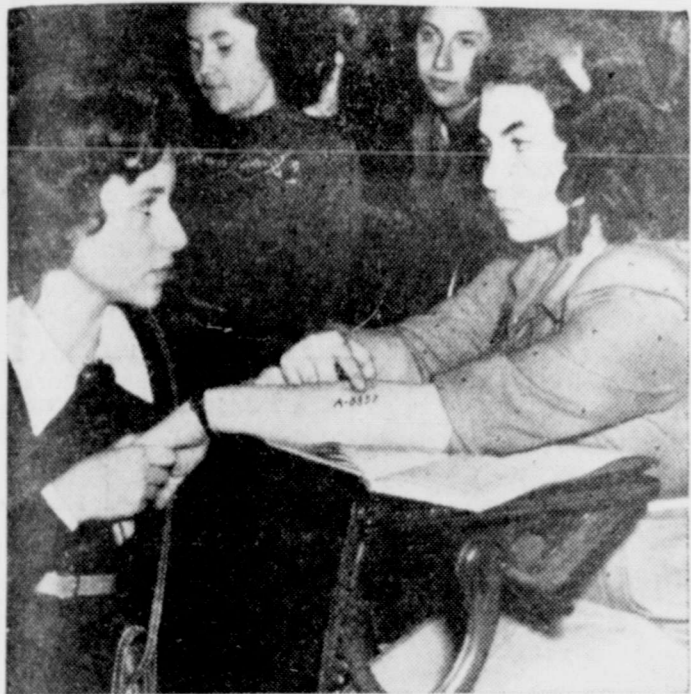

House GOP Steering Body Drafts Legislative Plan

Schools Will Get 500 Farmers, Cat-Surplus Property and Business From OPA Offices Men at Barbecue

FORT WORTH, Nov. 14. — Immediate shutdown of 1,642 OPA offices will make large quantities of surplus property available to educational institutions urgently in need of additional facilities to accommodate overflow enrollments of veterans and other students, War Assets administration announced today.

Federal Works agency has agreed to take over all surplus property in these offices for immediate distribution to institutions at 5 percent of the appraised value. Complete removal of all such property must be accomplished by Dec. 12.

The transfer of property to schools will also include typewriters which many institutions turned over to the armed forces at the outset of the war. Typewriters will be sold at the usual discount of 40 percent granted educational institutions by WAA.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. — Some members said after a meeting of the house Republican Steering committee today that agreement was reached on a legislative program containing "about a half dozen" items, including tax reductions.

The meeting to draft a legislative program for the 80th congress ended at 2:21 p. m. CST.

House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr., Mass., planned to issue a statement about the meeting at 3 p. m.

Rep. Earl Michener of Michigan revealed that the proposed 20 percent personal income tax cut had been discussed as "an objective and a hope."

"We think it can be accomplished," he said.

Rep. James W. Wadsworth of New York said a foreign policy program was not discussed "because there appears to be no argument about that."

Several other members said the question of house Republican leadership for the next congress did not figure in the discussions.

Martin is slated to be house speaker. There are three leading contenders for the house GOP leadership.

The three are Reps. Thomas A. Jenkins of Ohio, Clarence J. Brown of Ohio and Charles A. Halleck of Indiana. Cameramen photographed them together and separately so often that the start of the meeting was delayed more than 15 minutes.

HITS SOFT-PEDALING.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 14. — U. S. Sen. Joseph H. Ball, R., Minn., said today soft pedaling of restrictive labor legislation by the Republican majority in congress would be the "ranked kind of political expediency."

M. E. Fry, Cisco, new president of the association, was introduced and spoke briefly to the group. Fry, formerly of Brown county, is a breeder of polled Herefords.

Childress thanked the committee composed of C. M. Eastland Ranger and Cisco had been invited by the association to submit plans and proposals for a show barn where an annual show could be held. Each town submitted a plan last summer. The directors voted to accept the Cisco bid and have their annual show in that city for the next five years.

The football field at Gorman was dedicated Monday afternoon to the memory of the late Dewey Brogdon who, as a school trustee, had always evinced keen interest in the athletic activities of that school. The dedicatory speech was made by E. B. Brummett, former school superintendent, and talks were made by Mr. Bean, present school superintendent and the Rev. Mr. Healey. The field will now be known as Brogdon Field. Present from Cisco were Mr. and Mrs. J. Harrelson and daughter Sue, Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Brogdon and children Betty Lou and James.

OBJECTS TO WARSHIPS.

BELGRADE, Nov. 14. — The Albanian legation announced today that Premier Enver Hoxha had sent a note to the United Nations demanding immediate withdrawal of British warships from Albanian territorial waters and harbors.

WANT ELECTION-DAY AID.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. — The state department disclosed today that Romanian opposition parties have appealed to the U. S. British and Russian foreign ministers to intervene in the Nov. 19 Romanian election to protect their rights.

HEREFORDS AVERAGE \$362.

ABILENE, Nov. 14. — Forty Herefords sold for an average of \$362 in the seventh annual fall sale of the West Texas Hereford association here yesterday. The females were in greater demand, selling for an average of \$370.

US. Opposes South Africa's Plan to Annex SW. Africa

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 14. — The United States today opposed in the United Nations the South African attempt to annex the mandated territory of South-West Africa.

UNRRA Director-General F. H. LaGuardia appealed to the United Nations today to forget "personal grudges" and do something concrete to feed the world's hungry.

The American position was disclosed to the other 50 nations of the United Nations General Assembly in a terse statement submitted by John Foster Dulles, U. S. delegate to the trusteeship committee.

The South African issue arose in the trusteeship committee after the little nations had waged a hot fight in the political and security committee against the Big Power veto, with Cuba demanding that the UN charter provisions on voting be rewritten.

Rep. Rankin and Harvard Professor Have Sharp Tilt

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. — Rep. John E. Rankin, D., Miss., today cited Dr. Harlow Shapley of Harvard for contempt of the House UN-American Activities committee, and was immediately accused by the world-famous astronomer of using "star chamber methods of the Gestapo."

Shapley said he was standing on his rights as an American citizen "and will not submit" to Rankin's tactics.

Tax Assessor-Collectors to Ask Four Year Terms

AUSTIN, Nov. 14. — County tax assessor collectors want four year terms, and favor abolition of ad valorem taxes.

Resolutions to this effect were among those adopted by the assessor collectors in the closing session of their annual convention yesterday. Another resolution denounced a proposal that vehicle registration and title collections be transferred to the state highway commission.

Baptists Won't Take Rent Money Where Beer Sold

MINERAL WELLS, Nov. 14. — Embarrassed Texas Baptists admitted yesterday that a cafe in a Baptist-owned building in Corpus Christi is dispensing beer and wines, but said they were working "to effect a satisfactory solution of the problem."

The Nixon building in Corpus Christi was deeded to the Baptist Foundation of Texas by Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Kokernot of San Antonio and the cafe owner's lease was renewed without consent or knowledge of the foundation, George Mason of Dallas, executive secretary, said in a formal statement.

Although Mason did not say so, it was learned that the foundation will not come into complete control of the property until Jan. 1.

If the foundation cannot negotiate a cancellation of the lease, the cafe owner stands to have his establishment rent-free, for Mason said the foundation would refuse revenue from the lease.

The foundation offered \$15,000 to the leaseholder if he would discontinue the sales of wine and beer, Mason reported.

The text of his formal statement follows: "The Baptist Foundation owns

valuable properties in Corpus Christi, received by bequest, on which is located a cafe where beer and wines are being sold.

"The lease on this property was renewed by the building superintendent without the consent or knowledge of the Baptist Foundation. The foundation has made every effort to get the tenants to discontinue the sale of beer and wines, even going so far as to offer \$15,000 for the discontinuing of such sales.

"The tenants have agreed to discontinue wine sales after Jan. 1, 1947. The foundation will continue efforts to effect a satisfactory solution of the problem.

"Baptists have no intention of profiting by or from income from liquor in any form.

"In the event a cancellation of the contract cannot be secured, it is my opinion that the foundation will abide by the unexpired lease but will refuse the revenue."

It was learned the lease still has seven years to run.

WAR ON DOGS.

BAIRD, Nov. 14. — War on stray dogs and wolves is being waged on the big Griggs Ranch south of town. Dr. R. L. Griggs, pioneer Callahan county physician said one dog had been killed and another sought after several head of goats had been killed. He is running nearly two thousand head on his ranch near here. Also a prairie-dog "town" is being poisoned.

WAR VETS DISMISSED.

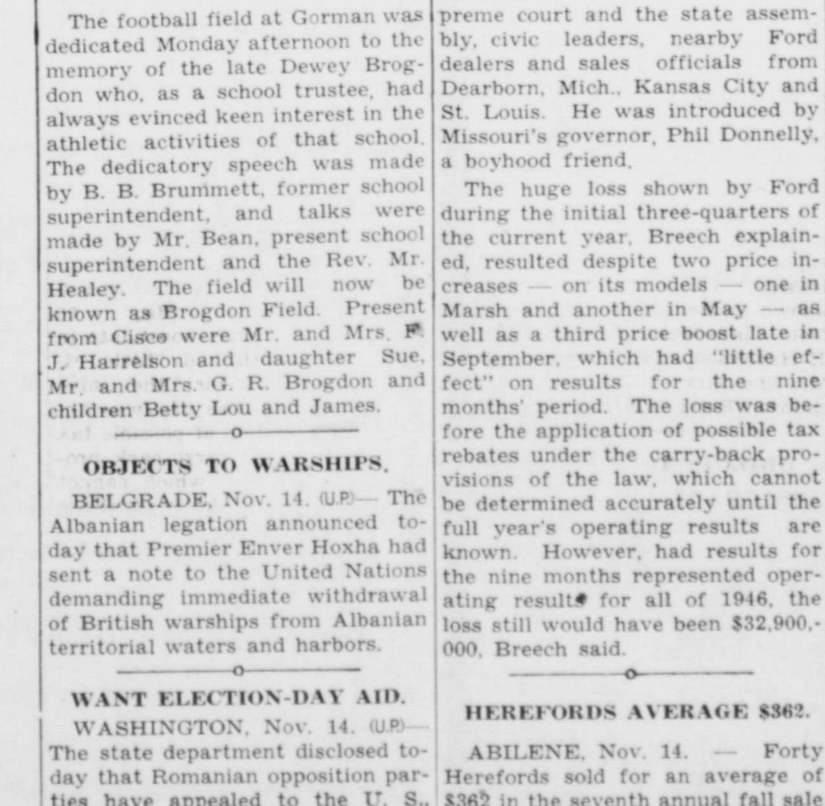

THE VERY GROUND MOVES.

There has been almost an epidemic throughout the country of new college presidents. In their inaugural speeches these men and women have emphasized the solemn obligations resting on higher education at this period when colleges and universities are packed as never before with youthful seekers after knowledge and training.

One of the new presidents is Sarah Gibson Blanding, elected as the first woman to head 85-year-old Vassar College at Poughkeepsie, N. Y. She was former dean of women at Cornell University, and graduate of the University of Kentucky. Dr. Blanding in her acceptance speech said:

"The blitz reduced to rubble more than the churches of Europe and the atom bomb wiped out more than Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Man's relation to the universe was profoundly changed. If a college is to serve this changing world it cannot stand still. As Alice in Wonderland discovered in the world behind the looking glass, you must run very fast indeed just to stay where you are, when the very ground under your feet is moving."

Education is in safe hands when leaders have opened their minds to a realization that this is an era of new patterns of living—new as man has never known newness before.

No one wants to scrap all heritages from the past. Those need to be retained which offer sure and steady foundation for the new superstructure. But old academic claptrap which does nothing but clutter up the mind is out.

BEFORE THE INCAS.

Ancient Peruvian civilization did not begin with the Incas. This fact, known to archaeologists, has just been confirmed by the discovery of a priest's tomb belonging to the Incas' predecessors, the Mochicas. They were at their height about A. D. 1000, and achieved a rather high standard in art. In the tomb was a string of beads with perforations so small that a hair could not pass through them, yet they were evidently meant to be strung.

Where did the Mochicas get their civilization? Was it self-developed, or did it go back in turn to some earlier race? Students of early South American history will have a good deal of investigation to do before they answer that one.

NEWSPAPER SEMINARS.

All newspapers will be benefited by the three and four-week seminars being conducted at Columbia University, New York City, under the American Press Institute. Coming from all over the country, about 30 practicing newspaper men and women at each session exchange experiences and study improvement possibilities in journalism. Only a strong group dares to undertake such self-analysis, and it becomes stronger thereby.

The press, if it is truly free, is one of the fundamentals in a democracy. This is one of the ideals of the institute. It is to be hoped consideration will be given in these meetings to the charges so often made against American newspapers, that they are on one hand dominated by the paid advertiser, or on the other, that news reports are stunted by reporters-affiliation with unions. A free press and good journalism both require that news columns be open to all sides of an issue, whatever may be the editorial conviction.

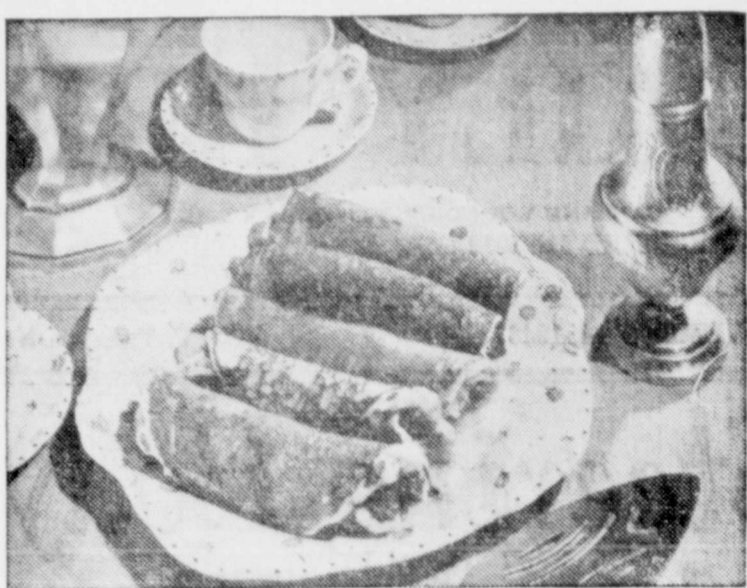

BRAN GRIDDLE CAKE ROLLS

- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 2 tablespoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 3 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1/2 cup bran

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg and milk; add to dry ingredients stirring until partially mixed. Add shortening and bran; stir until batter is fairly smooth. Bake at once on hot griddle, turning only once. As soon as baked, remove from griddle, spread with softened butter, sprinkle with brown sugar. Roll up like a jelly roll.

Yield: 8 griddle cake rolls (5 1/2 inches in diameter).

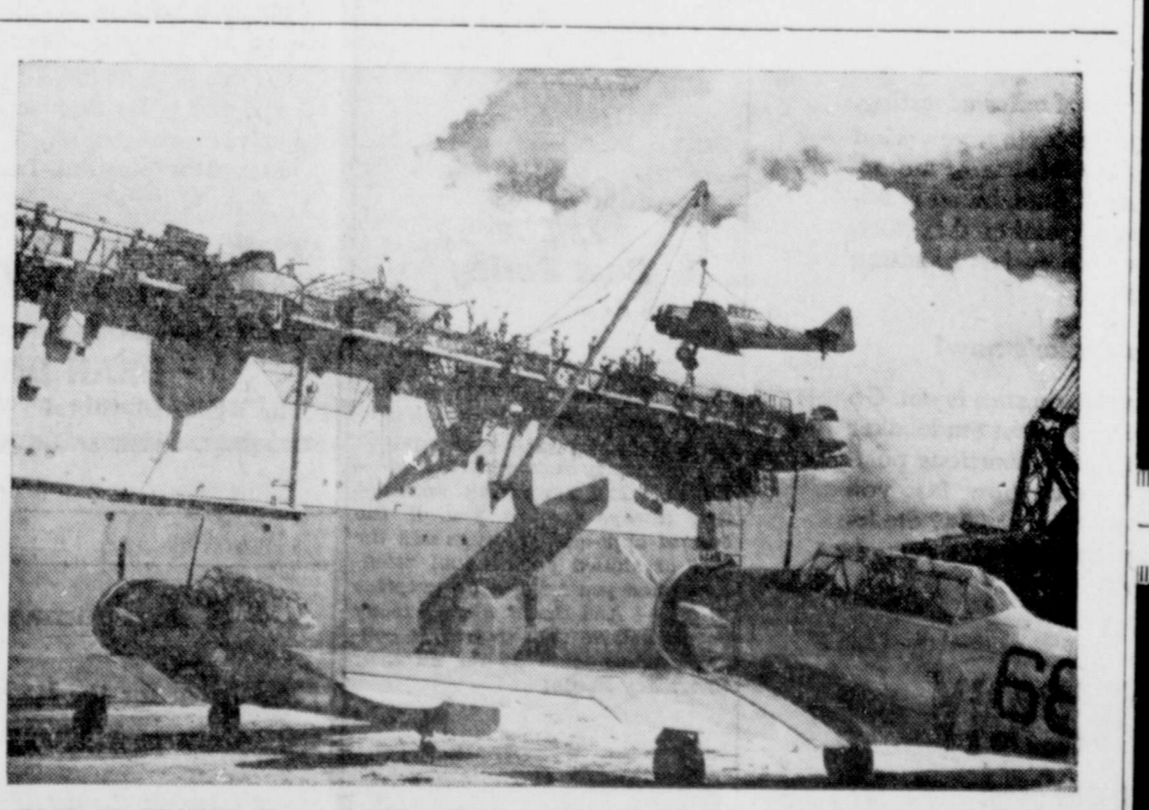
