Lewis Keeps U. S. Government on Anxious Seat

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. — The government today clamped tight controls on soft coal deliveries and retail sales as John L. Lewis ignored veiled threats of federal prosecution if he shuts down mine operations.

Britain Says Russia Out of Step With the World

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 16. (U.P.) — Great Britain, charging that Russia was out of step with the rest of the world in its use of the veto, joined the United States, France and China today in favoring voluntary restrictions on the great powers' UN voting rights.

Noting how many times the Soviet Union had stood alone, or with one of its satellites, in casting negative votes in the Security Council, Philip Noel-Baker of Great Britain told the UN Political and Security committee—

"I wonder if Mr. Vishinsky — Andrei Vishinsky of Russia — ever heard of the story of the Irish mother, watching the military parade, who said that all the soldiers were out of step except her Johnny."

"There could have been unanimity on nearly every occasion if our Soviet colleagues had decided unanimity."

The British delegate drew the most applause of any of the parade of speakers in the past three days of heated debate about the veto.

He spoke after Ambassador Alexandre Parodi of France and Ambassador V. K. Wellington Koo of China came out in favor of restricted use of the veto. The United States previously had taken the same stand, but Vishinsky yesterday opposed any modification of the veto right.

The five powers will consult among themselves during the break in the veto debate, and it appeared tonight that they would be able to come up with a compromise which would appease the Little Nations now in revolt against the Big Five's preponderant power.

FLEWELLEN IN CISCO.

L. H. Flewellen of Ranger, who served in the attorney general's department under both Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers, but is now a member of the industrial accident board at Austin, called at the Daily Press office Saturday while enroute to Ranger, where he still maintains his official residence. In the gubernatorial race Mr. Flewellen was for Grover Sellers, his long-time associate, in the first primary, but went his full length for Beauford Jester in the finals. He predicts that Governor-elect Jester will make one of the state's most constructive chief executives.

800 California Pickets Hauled to Jail Houses

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 16. (U.P.) — Police, brandishing night-clubs, waded into a massed studio picket line today and arrested 123 AFL studio union marchers, bringing the two-day jail-haul of illegal pickets to nearly 800, described as the largest mass arrests in California history.

Picketing and arrests were without violence, police reported as a fleet of "black marias" carted the singing, shouting marchers off to jail.

WYATT MAY QUIT.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. — Wilson Wyatt will quit as housing expediter if he fails to get White House support in forcing RFC to grant loans for assemblyline homes, and in forcing War Assets Administration to provide factories. Wyatt program already is badly battered by removal of price ceilings on materials. With those gone, other controls such as ceiling prices on completed homes and allocations of materials can't be held long.

BEVIN BE OKAYED.

LONDON, Nov. 16. (U.P.) — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has demanded — and will get — a vote of confidence Monday when Commons debates a rebel labor amendment providing for a re-assert of British foreign policy, reliable sources said tonight. The vote of confidence is expected to give an overwhelming majority to support him in his New York discussions at the Big Four council of foreign ministers and the United Nations general assembly.

PLAYING POLITICS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. — OPA approval of residential rent boost is due before Jan. 1. Administration plans to beat Congress to draw, hopes thereby to keep increases moderate. Ten per cent is being talked, hasn't yet been agreed on. (OPA industry advisory committee this week recommended 15 per cent).

Jaycees to Take Lead in Important Boys' Work

The Junior chamber of commerce is now beginning its latest project, the organization of a Cub Scout Pack in Cisco. A Jaycee committee composed of Chas. M. Burke, Wallace Smith, H. Chief Brown and Jack Lauderdale, who will have charge of the organization and its direction, met with the future Cubs at the Methodist church Thursday night to explain the program to the boys.

It was explained that Cubbing is different from Scouting in many ways. During the war Boy Scouts sponsored paper drives, scrap metal drives, etc., but projects of that nature are not undertaken by Cub Scouts. Cubbing is carried on mainly in the home, under the supervision of parents. Once a month there will be a pack meeting under the supervision of the Cub Master. The parents are always urged to attend these meetings, where there will be shown evidences of completed Cub projects, together with plans for the next month's work.

Then, once each week, the Cubs will meet in their respective dens. The dens will be the home of one of the Cubs, where boys will begin their projects under the direction of a den chief, who is a member of the Boy Scouts. The den chief will be helped by the den mother, who will always be present.

There will be a meeting next Tuesday night at First Methodist church, 7:30, and it is urged that all boys, age 9 to 11 inclusive, who are interested in becoming Cub Scouts, be present so that they may complete an application. The three grades of Cub Scouts are determined by age. Boys age 9 are Wolf Cub Scouts, boys age 10 are Bear Cub Scouts and those age 11 are Lion Cub Scouts.

On the following Tuesday, Nov. 26, there will be another meeting at the Methodist church, 7:30. At this meeting all the Cubs and their parents will be present, and Guy Smith, assistant director of scouting in this district, will explain Cubbing in detail and show a moving picture of Cubs in action.

It is requested that those interested in working with these boys contact Jack Lauderdale at once, since very soon the Cub Master and the Den Mothers will be selected.

GIRLS 4-H CLUBS.

Thirteen girls 4-H clubs have been organized in Eastland county, with 272 members. They are Gorman, Olden High, Olden Grade, Ranger, Hodges Oak, Ranger Young, Scranton, Desdemona Grade, Desdemona High, Carbon Grade, Carbon High, Morton Valley, Pioneer and Rising Star. Four-H club girls selected food preparation and clothing as the two demonstrations for the year. Each club plans to have two meetings a month. The home demonstration agent meets with the club once a month, and the sponsors once a month. In planning programs for the year, girls made plans to work on a point basis. Club members will score each goal completed and points will be given. Demonstrations on stenciling with textile paints and making aprons are being given this month.

No Liaison Between President and GOP Heads

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (U.P.) — Republican congressional leaders tonight slapped down the idea that it might be a good thing if, in the interests of harmony during the next two years, they had weekly legislative pow-wows with President Truman.

They put the coup de grace to

such a notion as the senate resolved and the house further snarled problems of leadership in the GOP congress which convenes January 3.

Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., who will be speaker of the new house, already had brushed aside informal suggestions that Republican congressional leaders maintain close liaison with the white house to prevent a legislative-executive stalemate.

Martin curtly remarked that it wasn't up to the Republicans to tell President Truman what to do.

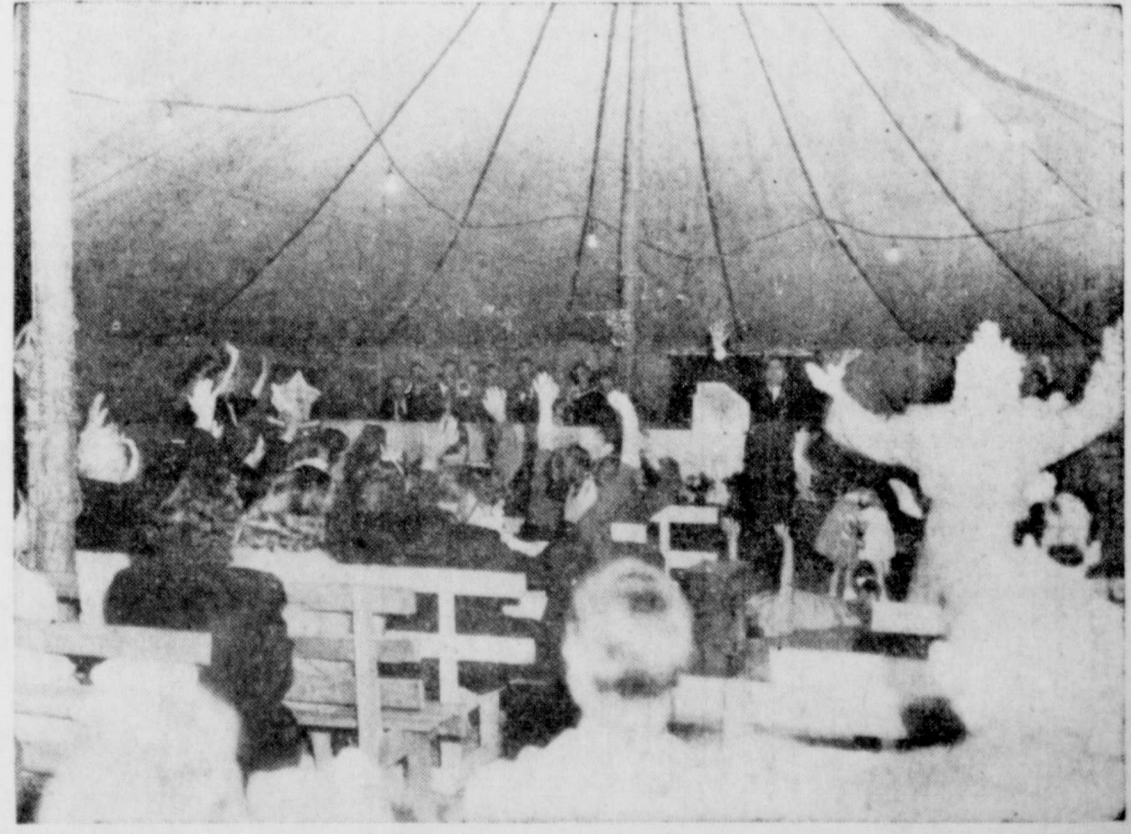
Cisco Young Lady in Violin Concert at Dallas, Tuesday

ROYALTY AND MOVIES.

Londoners surged in such numbers to attend the first performance of the motion picture, "A Matter of Life and Death" that more than 100 had to have first aid treatments. The king and queen and the two princesses were the star guests at this, their first film premiere. Even they could not push through the jam until mounted police, three abreast, manned the very steps of the theater to clear a passage. Their automobile was held up 15 minutes and nearly pushed off its wheels on the way.

Prime Minister Attlee managed to get into the theater by following an actress. Screen stars in the audience included Ray Milland and Joan Bennett, as well as the Britishers, Laurence Olivier and Vivien Leigh. Hundreds of ticket holders—some having paid as much as \$40 a seat—were turned away. The show, a benefit for the Cinematograph Trade Benevolent Fund, raised almost a quarter of a million dollars.

Were the crowds battling to see the royal family, or the motion picture actors? It doesn't matter which. And probably the fact that they could see both at once added to the attraction. But it is good to know that Londoners, after all they have been through during the war, have enough energy and enthusiasm left to get so worked up over a movie event.

WHAT EGYPT WANTS.

The Egyptians want two things: independence from Great Britain, which they are getting, and control of the Sudan, which is what most of the trouble with the British is about. They have a good deal of excuse for their desire to own the Sudan. It is an immense territory, three or four times as large as Texas, lying directly south of them, with valuable natural resources, including cotton. More than that, it controls the level of the river Nile, on which Egypt's life depends. The Egyptians also advance historical reasons for owning the Sudan. Ever since the great days of ancient Egypt, this territory has been ruled off and on by the Egyptians.

The one flaw is that the Sudanese want none of Egyptian rule. Their experience leads them to agree with the writer in the Encyclopedia Britannica who said dryly that the Egyptians "did not conceive that the welfare of the people was any part of the task of the government." The Sudanese would like independence and would prefer British rule to Egyptian. They are willing to promise not to interfere with the Nile. If the Egyptians get this assurance, they will have all that they are immediately likely to get.

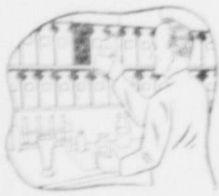
