LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 26 (U.P.)—The United States demanded today that Russia stop "shilly-shallying" and agree to publish figures on its armies at home, and the Soviet Union proposed that the powers reveal an inventory of all their arms, including atomic bombs.

Two Post-Season Games Between Lobos, Buckaroos

Rivalries of other years will be revived upon Cisco and Breckenridge gridirons December 13 and 20 when teams of former Lobos and Buckaroos clash in spectacles devoted to philanthropy and fun. This was assured at a meeting of representatives of the Cisco Exes and Buckaroo Exes at the Cisco chamber of commerce offices Monday evening.

In a pre-meeting conference with the Cisco team to discuss the proposition.

Under the rules adopted players on the Exes teams must be former students of their respective high schools. No player who has played in college within the last two years or who is now a member of a high school team may participate.

Breckenridge won the first game by correctly calling the toss. It will be played at Buckaroo stadium, Breckenridge, beginning at 7:30 on the evening of Friday, December 13. The second game will be played at Chesley Field, Cisco, December 20.

MONOPOLISM.

Norway has little government managed industry, as such. The only things wholly owned and operated by the government are the post office, telephone and telegraph, electric power, and railroads, some of which are poorly managed. There seems to be no agitation for extension of government ownership and management. In fact some leaders feel the trend is in the other direction and that the government has shown no ability to provide efficient service.

However, cooperatives are numerous in Norway. Entirely different from government management, they nevertheless control the buying and selling of almost everything and are monopolistic in nature. The effective organizations of the co-ops, while individually owned, have been used in some instances for extension of government control. Subsidies have been offered to farmers cooperatives in an effort to please everybody; the producers with higher prices and the purchasers with low prices. The government now pays half the cost of grain which goes into bread.

Wait 'Till You're Old.

The completeness of the cooperative monopoly may be seen in the association of drug store operators, to which all operators belong. To open a new drug store a man would first have to become a member of the association and get their approval, after which he would appeal to the government for a license. The government could never grant a license unless the applicant were admitted to the association.

Violence Continues.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 26. — The Milwaukee sheriff's department prepared today to pit another strong force of deputies and police against pickets at the strikebound Allis-Chalmers plant in case of further disturbances after disorders during a mass demonstration Monday when six persons were injured and 16 arrested.

Studebaker Advance.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 26 (U.P.)—The Studebaker Corporation has advanced list prices of its new passenger models an average of 3 1/2 per cent effective immediately. The increase ranged from \$32 to \$64 on all models. Truck prices were unaffected by the boost.

Zionists Adjourn.

FORT WORTH, Nov. 26. — The 42nd Southwest Zionist convention had adjourned today after endorsing the national goal of an undivided and undiminished Jewish commonwealth in Palestine.

Plenty of Frontiers.

A successful business man in Oslo, who was a prominent leader of the resistance during the war, is in charge of an old firm with an excellent reputation. Said he: "The regulations have come to interfere with everything. I am no longer really doing business. I just sit here and do what they tell me I can do. In my opinion, the controls are a failure. They make production more expensive and prices higher."

There is a Way Out.

When forward looking Norwegians try to modernize an industry, they are met squarely with the deadening hand of monopoly, either private or public. If one fishing company manages to find a way to sell its products at a good price, while another company exports its fish to Europe for a lower price, the former company pays a tax which goes to the second company for the sake of equalization.

Krug Subpoenaed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (U.P.)—Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug today was subpoenaed to appear Monday before the House Committee investigating surplus property after he failed to answer an invitation to testify this afternoon.

Huge Embezzlement.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26 (U.P.)—W. Arthur Nicksel, a \$64-a-week cashier, three other persons and one corporation were indicted today by a Kings county grand jury on charges of grand larceny and forgery in the embezzlement of \$780,000 from the Mergenthaler Linotype company.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. —The coal strike is costing the nation 1,885,865 tons of coal a day, the government reported today as it stood firm in its determination to force John L. Lewis to send the 400,000 members of his United Mine Workers back to their jobs.

An authoritative source indicated meanwhile that some government officials are exploring the possibility of promoting direct talks between Lewis and the coal operators to induce a settlement of the six-day walkout after the government has finished its legal battle with Lewis.

But it was emphasized that the administration has no intention of easing the legal pressure on Lewis or retreating in any way from its firm stand.

Lewis must stand trial at 10 a. m. tomorrow for contempt of court in failing to call off the walkout.

Despite the spreading impact of the strike on the nation's economy, the trial might extend into next week. The federal district court where it will be held cannot meet on Thanksgiving Day and must adjourn for the weekend at noon Saturday.

The Solid Fuels Administration said 3,613 soft coal mines are idle east of the Mississippi river, with only 652 open. The 27,648 miners working at these mines are producing only 300,929 tons of coal daily, SFA said.

Steel production dropped more than 20 per cent in the first six days of the strike, and the banking of even more hearths and furnaces was imminent.

An estimated 1,000,000 workers were expected to be idle as result of the strike by next week.

A House Committee investigating surplus property called Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug to testify on possible emergency use of the war-built Big Inch and Little Big Inch pipelines to carry natural gas.

STEELS, MOTORS GAIN.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. — Steels and motors led a general recovery push in today's stock market with favorites advancing fractions to 2 or more points. Buying was said to have been based mainly on hopes for a break in the coal crisis and to the belief the list had been oversold and was due for a substantial technical comeback if the news should warrant.

Budget Bureau has Lots of Money for Public Works

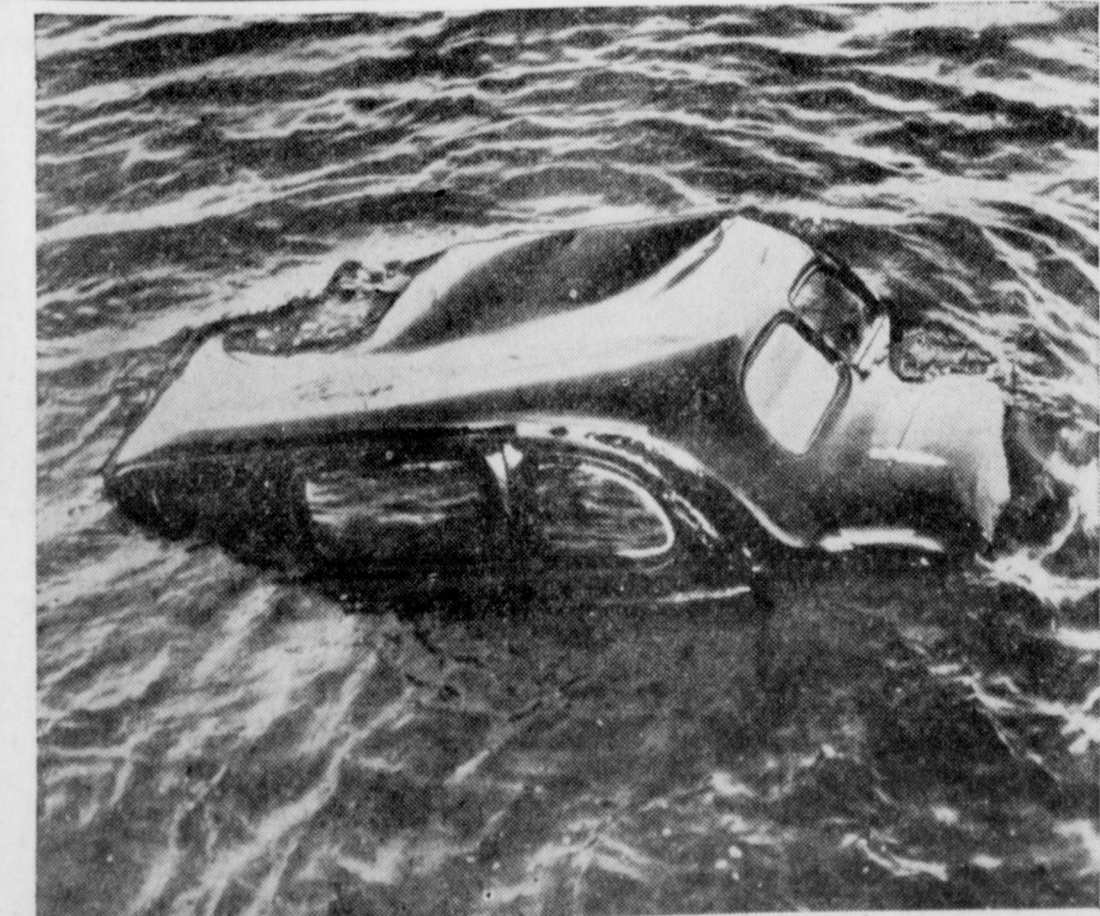
WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (U.P.)—James E. Webb, director of the budget bureau, today announced an increase of \$70,000,000 in funds available for public works in the current fiscal year.

Webb said a ceiling of \$90,000,000 established August 2 for river and harbor improvement has now been raised to \$105,000,000. An October 17 ceiling of \$130,000,000 for flood control projects has been raised to \$185,000,000.

More than 8000 teachers—from one room school instructors to college professors—will come to Houston on Friday and Saturday for the 68th State Teachers' Assn. convention with a higher salary the focal point of their interest.

CONTROLLING RELIEF.

In a dispatch from Athens by New York Times Correspondent C. L. Sulzberger, a disquieting picture of Yugoslavia is presented. War devastation is being cleared through UNRRA-donated railroad, building and heavy machinery to the enhancement of Marshall Tito's national reputation. The United States supplied 72 per cent of UNRRA funds and supplies.

Thus this careless country, in effect has backed a dictator who is anything but cordial to America and whose form of government is avowedly Soviet-dominated communism.

While there is widespread distrust of communism on the part of Yugoslavs, there is a growing fear, too. Tito's strength becomes greater as his country is rehabilitated, and opposition to him consequently weakens.

The Yugoslav situation is one reason why the State Department wants a country's international relief contribution, which will succeed UNRRA in 1947, to be administered directly through Washington and the nation aided. Such a plan has obvious short comings. It would, however, prevent American relief resources from being used to further political dictatorships that rob citizens of personal freedom.

RETIREMENT STANDARDS

A retirement board, composed of medical psychiatric officials, was recommended by Dr. Theodore G. Klumpp, speaking before a meeting of the American Public Health association.

The ordinary workman, who, in most plants today, is compelled to retire at a certain age, would be more fairly treated by this method. His abilities would be tested, his reactions to working conditions would be determined, and his health considered. If this were done when retirement age was reached, only the really unfit would be eliminated. Thus would be avoided much waste of ability and experience and untold loss of morale.

Men in executive positions occupy responsible posts long after the time when they would have been forced into inactivity had they been lower in the industrial scale. The factory worker also would like to have the privilege of leading a useful life as long as he is fitted to do so.

SAVING AN ABLE JUDGE.

Ohio voters recently went on a Democrat-hunt, sweeping them out when found, from every courthouse and township. Yet Democrat Charles B. Zimmerman, a highly esteemed judge of the state Supreme Court since 1933, was reelected by a wide margin. Why?

One cause may have been the advertisements placed by his opponent, who promised to give labor the better in his judicial decisions. Most people have a notion that a judge's function is to render justice, no matter who is affected. This admission of partiality by his opponent may have made some votes for Judge Zimmerman.

Yet in an election where all over the country millions of people voted the straight party ticket, utterly indifferent to who was on it, Judge Zimmerman would have had no chance, except for one thing. For 35 years Ohio has had a non-partisan ballot for all judges. There is no indication of party on the ballot. It takes intelligence and not mere party devotion to vote it. The nonpartisan ballot saved Judge Zimmerman.

The nonpartisan ballot is used elsewhere than in Ohio. States that do not have it may care to look into it.
