## Lewis Found Guilty; Be Sentenced at 10 Tomorrow

### Ickes Says Steelman Blocked Big Inch Conversion

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — John L. Lewis was convicted of contempt of Federal District Court today for refusing to call off the soft coal strike. Judge Goldsborough remanded him to the custody of his attorneys, without bail, until 10 a. m., tomorrow, when he will pass sentence on him and the UMW.

Lewis advanced to the bench and informed Federal Judge T. Allan Goldsborough that he deemed the conviction in violation of the constitution and of statutes. He predicted that any sentence imposed would be thrown out by the Supreme Court upon appeal.

Lewis indicated clearly that the strike will go on, even if he is jailed for his stand, and the Association of American Railroads promptly announced an embargo of all export freight traffic except food and fuel, effective at midnight tonight.

A spokesman, apparently preparing for a long strike, described the embargo as the most drastic measure taken to conserve coal since the bituminous miners walked out on Nov. 14.

Goldsborough pronounced Lewis and his United Mine Workers — AFL — guilty after an almost perfunctory trial. The celebrated defendant offered no formal defense against the charge that he ignored an injunction forbidding the mine strike — now in its 13th day.

Convicted of both civil and criminal contempt, Lewis faced a maximum sentence of one year in prison and a \$5,000 fine for criminal contempt, plus whatever punishment Goldsborough deems fit for civil contempt.

The judge deferred sentence for 24 hours in order to take the unusual step of discussing penalties with both government and union counsel.

The government reportedly is pressing for heavy fine and jail sentence in the belief that only a body blow at the UMW's \$13,000,000 treasury can force an end to the strike.

Some observers believed the government would ask a continuing fine of \$200,000 a day for each day the strike lasts. There was no talk of a retroactive fine dating back to when the injunction was violated.

The conviction was a crushing blow to Lewis and the powerful AFL and CIO leaders who had joined him in contending that the Norris-Laguardia Act outlaws the use of the injunction in labor disputes, even where the government is involved.

Goldsborough threw out that argument and, in effect, ruled that in a matter affecting the national welfare the government is above the anti-injunction law.

That was the position taken by President Truman, who ordered a showdown fight with Lewis on the issue "is John L. Lewis bigger than the government?"

In this connection Sen. Edwin C. Johnson, D., Colo., today called on the president to make a direct appeal to Lewis' miners to return to work.

## SANTA BE IN CISCO DEC. 14

Old Santa Claus will make his annual Christmas season visit to Cisco Saturday, December 14, at 2 p. m., it was announced by the Cisco chamber of commerce today, following a meeting of the committee in charge of this program.

The Christmas patron will appear with well filled bags of candy for distribution among the children, and will receive letters stating their wishes from those who wish to write him. The candy is being furnished by Motts No. 5 store, of which Ronald Rhodes is manager.

It is planned to have Santa make his appearance on a fire truck, and to parade through the business district preceded by the Lobo band.

All children of Cisco and the Cisco area are invited to greet Old Santa here on that afternoon.

Meanwhile the West Texas Utilities company is proceeding with the erection of colored lights on D avenue and these should be in place and ready to burn this week.

To heighten the Christmas decorative effect, merchants are requested to place five or six-foot fir trees in front of their stores. These trees must be obtained from grocery stores and other retail dealers in the city who are handling them, since no wholesale house has them for sale, and it was not practicable to purchase a quantity of the trees for this purpose alone. Almost all grocery stores are handling them, and merchants who will cooperate in the decorative program were requested to buy their trees early.

### J. B. Peck and Pete Barnes to Open a Nursery

The Cisco Floral and Nursery company, owned by J. B. Peck and Pete Barnes and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Peck, will begin business at 700 E. Twenty-third street, one block west of Graham hospital, within a short while, it was announced this week. This new business, which will meet an acute need in this area, will have a tract of 15 acres of land ideally suited to the growing of nursery stock.

The company will handle evergreens, fruit trees, flowering shrubs, pot plants and cuttings and other root stock. A forty-foot greenhouse has been ordered and should be here for erection January 1, Mr. Peck said.

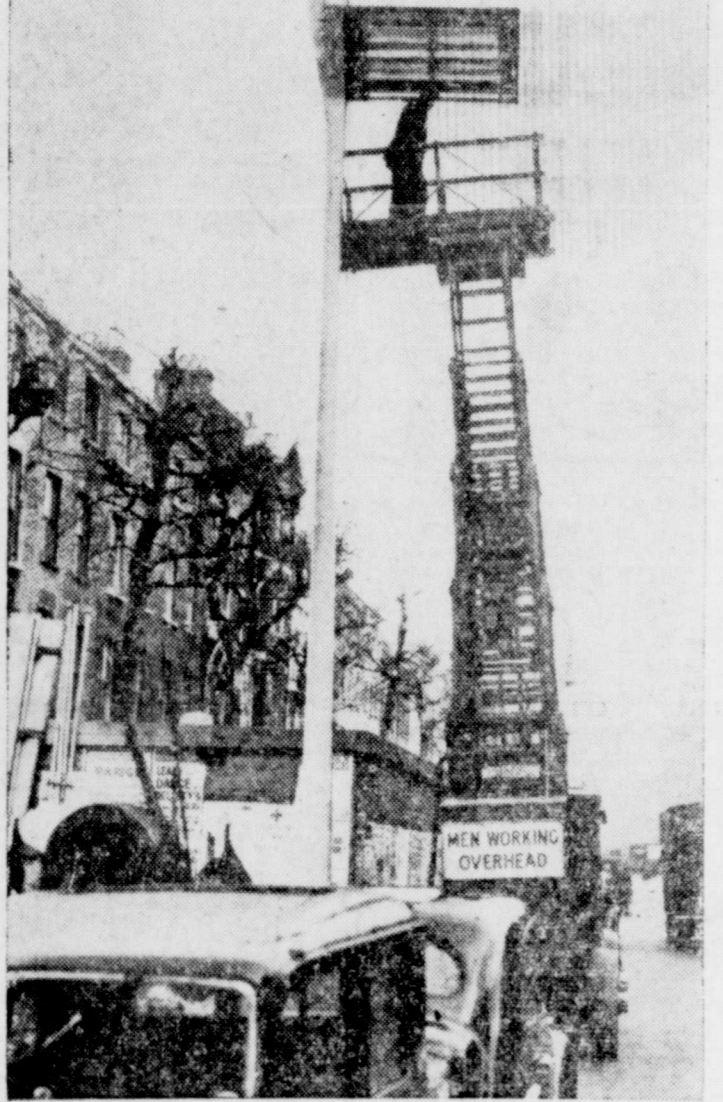
The company will secure its merchandise from large, established nurseries until its own stocks are developed in its fields and green house.

"We will be able to handle this merchandise as cheaply as our customers could go to other nurseries and pay the prices there plus transportation costs," Mr. Peck said.

The office of the company will be maintained temporarily in the residence at 700 East Twenty-third.

Mr. Peck is a veteran of World War II, serving 31 months in the navy, 12 months and five days of which he spent in the European theater.

### LOOKING AHEAD

#### INFLATE OR DEFLATE?

Inflation is one of those things you talk more about when you do not have it. We have a mild case of inflation now. We do not want it, but we are perhaps less scared about it now than we were before it came. Most of us do not mind adding to the spiral a little bit, though we may dislike to see other folks do so. We seem assured that there is "turn about for everybody" in the inflation spiral.

Some features of our spiraled-up labor-management relations, with the consequent paltry production and lower income for strikers, would represent deflation of a sort. But we must know that when we push our wages up and up, we simply must have production to justify these increased costs. If we do not, we may expect prices to follow or even shoot ahead, as the laws of economics begin to make adjustments.

#### Plain Economics.

Higher wages without increased production create a situation that bears some resemblance to strikes without production. Either one will cripple American industry, and this is a time when labor cannot afford to contribute to industrial chaos. People the world over need goods desperately, even people with an inflation already well past our own. The only answer is production! We must produce, produce, produce.

Without production, any wage premiums which labor asks and

wins represent the direst sort of inflation and public liability. We have already approached the danger point. Now, without price control, it is easier to see plain economics in operation. Labor costs represent most of the cost of our manufactured goods. Any increased cost as well as the costs of scarcities, will be passed directly to the people.

#### Coal, For Example.

Suppose the nation's coal supplies are shut off. Bituminous coal provides 55 per cent of our industrial energy, 62 per cent of our electric power, and 95 per cent of our industrial power. No coal means no steel, and the shortage pressures then begin operating to force up prices of everything we buy. Suppose the miners win a financial premium through striking, the possibility of which no one has yet discussed to any extent.

Higher prices for coal mean higher prices for steel. Steel is one of the basic ingredients of thousands of things we require daily, and soon up goes the general level of prices for consumer goods and for services as well.

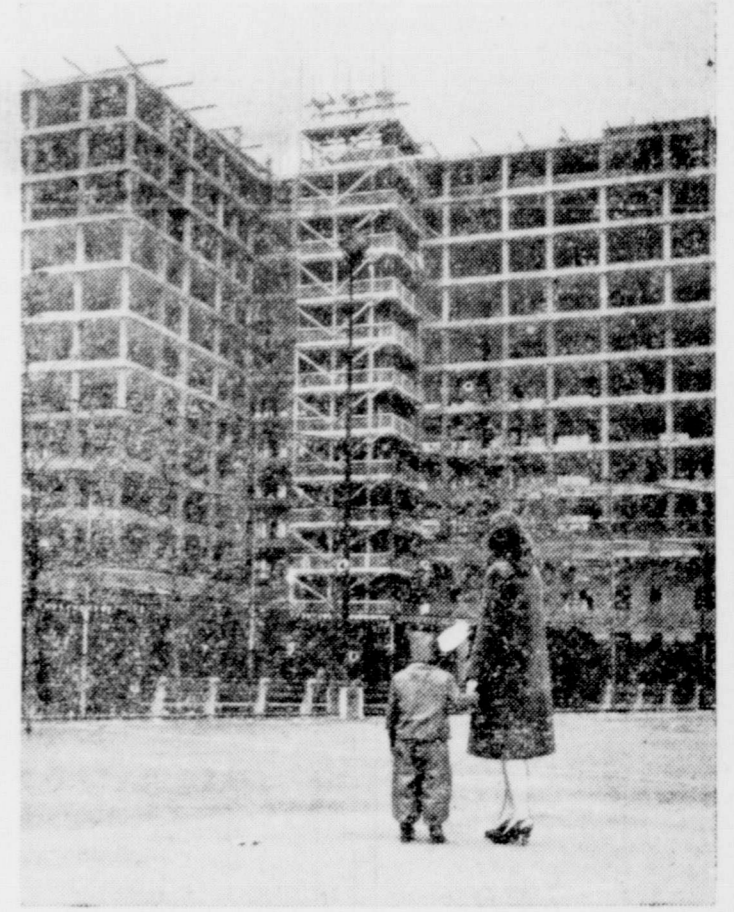
#### The Spiral Again.

Again suppose the miners win wage increases. Their success is eyed by wage earners in varied other industries and crafts. Already the industrial unions have made top billing of a new drive for increased wages. Up go prices again. That's plain economics.

We like inflation for ourselves, when it is going our way, but generally we prefer to deflate the thought of the Golden Rule. May I submit that production is the Golden Rule way to steer ourselves out of this jam and to keep the traditional American freedoms we so much cherish.
