### Katy Head Sees Great Future For Texas, Southwest

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 7. — Raymond J. Morfa, chairman of the board of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad, yesterday told San Antonio business men the Southwest, "by long odds, is the fastest growing industrial area in the nation."

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"There is every reason to believe," he said, "that this growth will accelerate rather than decline in the coming years as new industrial leaders see the many advantages to be had in the Southwest, and follow the lead others have already taken."

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 6. (U.P.)—The United Nations today framed another major part of its blueprint for world disarmament and atomic controls as the Soviet Union stuck to its path of compromise with the western powers.

Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov reaffirmed Russia's agreement to the principal of international inspection and controls over atomic energy, as well as the proposition that the projected international atomic control agency be empowered also to develop atomic energy for beneficial uses.

### UN-AMERICAN PROBERS.

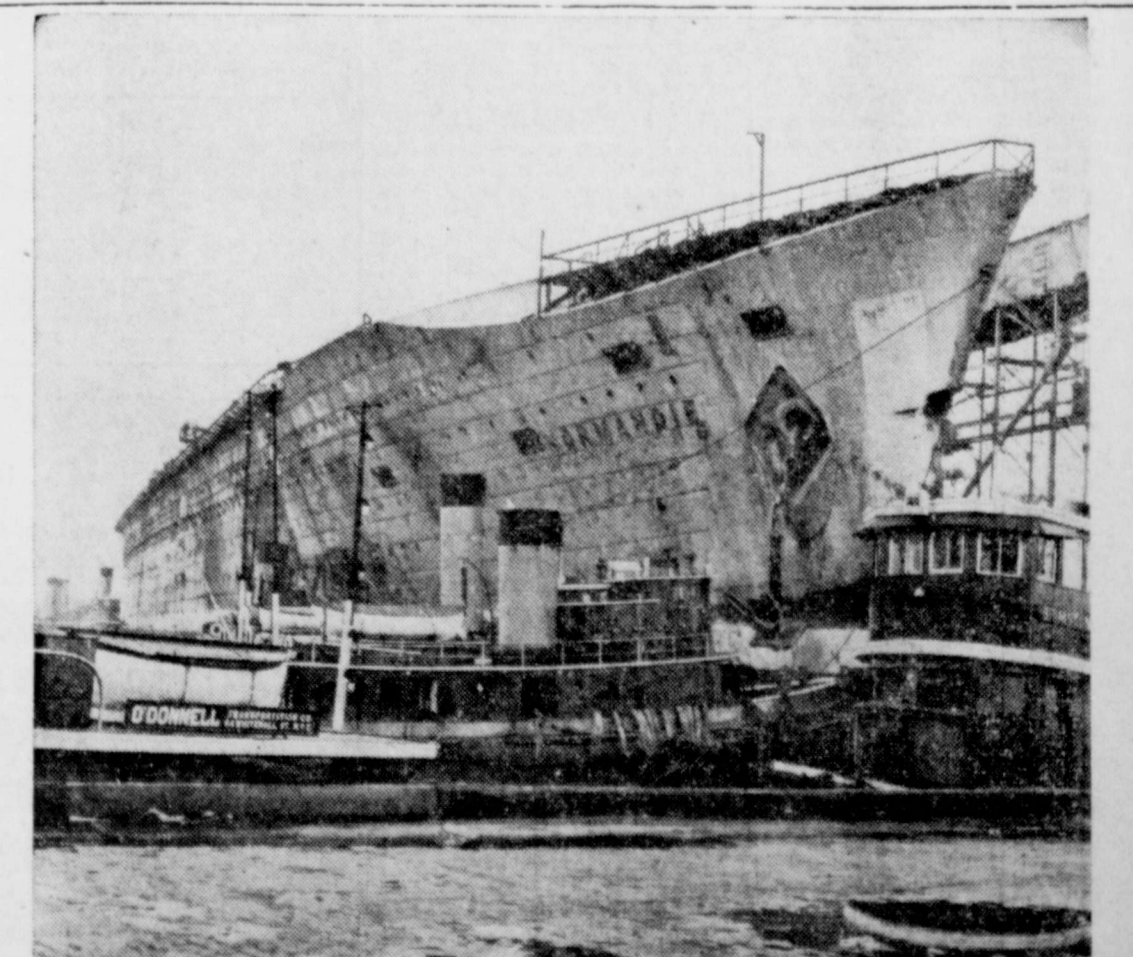

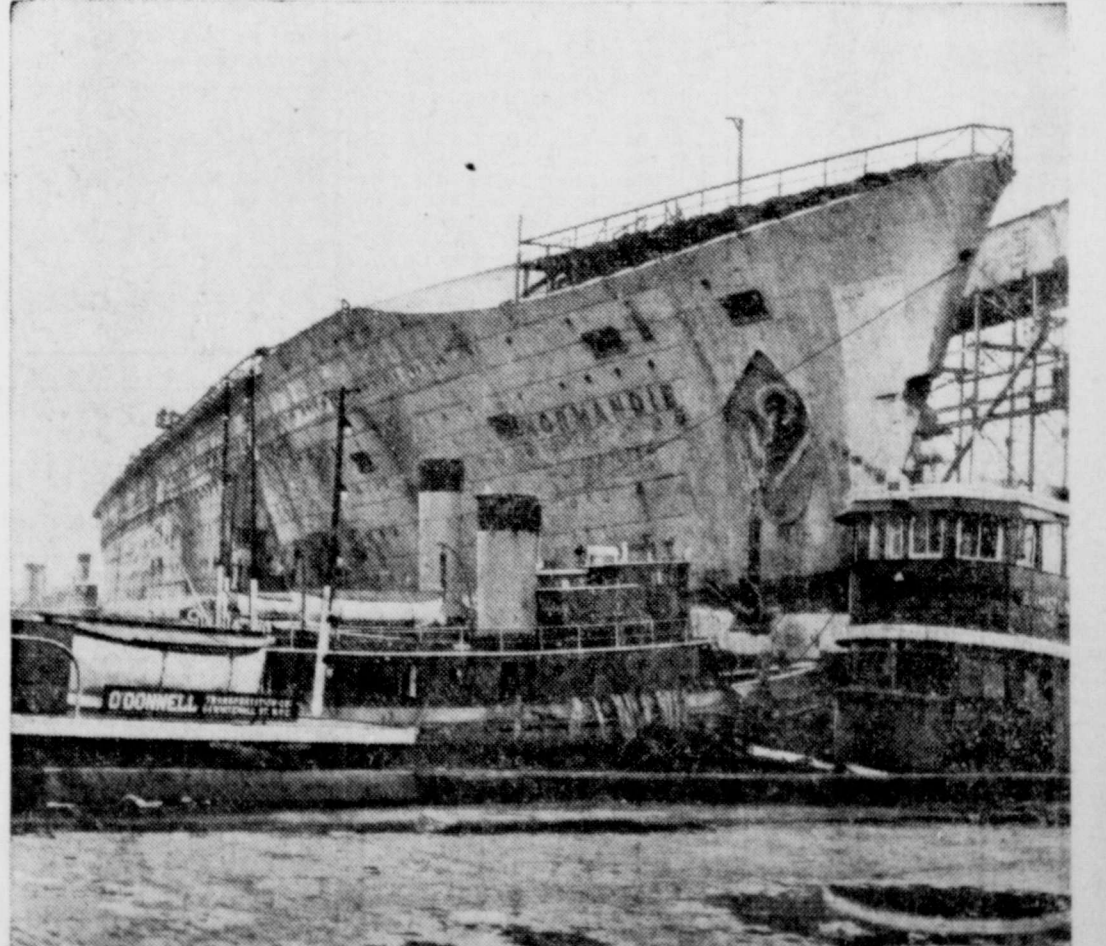

**IMPROVING GOVERNMENT.**

Amid all the political shouting and tumult of 1946, better city government made unspectacular gains. Thus 72 cities adopted the city manager form of government during the year, according to Alfred Willoughby, executive secretary of the National Municipal League. This is the largest ever added in a single year.

At the beginning of the year the "Municipal Yearbook" listed 609 cities governed by city managers. Unless some have backslid during the year, the number is now well towards 700. Cincinnati is the largest. Other large cities include Rochester, Houston, Miami, Toledo, Dayton, Dallas, Kansas City, Mo., Grand Rapids, Oklahoma City and Oakland, Abilene, Tex., voters, by the way, also recently adopted the city manager plan. Only six states have no city manager cities. These are Idaho, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi, Rhode Island and Washington.

The plan has grown through its simplicity and merit. An elected council appropriates funds and decides policies. The manager whom it names makes appointments and runs the city.

He devotes his WHOLE TIME TO THE JOB, leaving its social duties to the presiding officer of the council, who may have the title of mayor.

Even with cities of 5,000 to 7-

000 population, the city's business is usually the largest business, hence it would seem wise to have a man trained in city management devote his full time to its interests.

City government was once called by the English observer, Lord Brice, "the dark spot in American government." That distinction now belongs to counties.

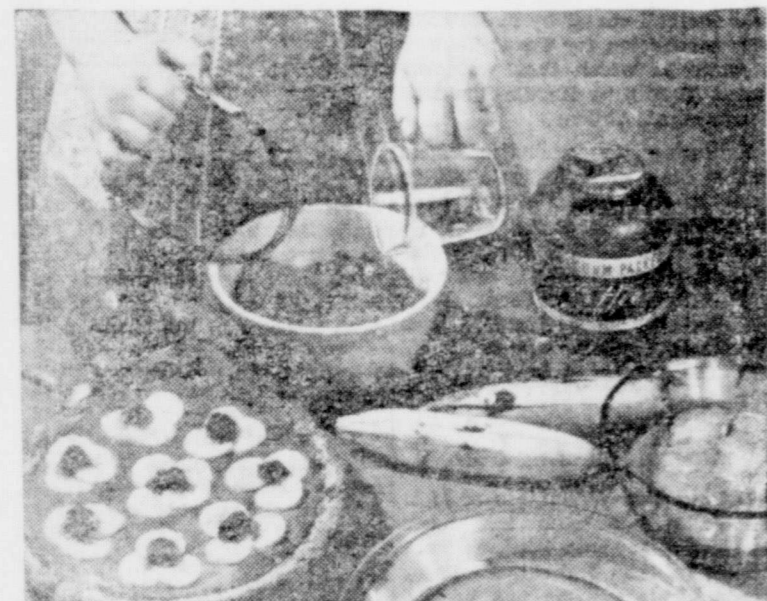

**Serve Coffee Banana Cream Pie As Treat for Guests or Family**



Coffee Banana Cream Pie, made with Graham Cracker Crust is a fitting finish to an elaborate meal; lends party air to a simple one.

Coffee Banana Cream Pie is an especial treat. A blending of chocolate, vacuum-packed coffee, and bottled milk gives the cream filling a delicate and unusual flavor.

By arranging the banana slices in rosettes, as shown, this tempting dessert will give a party air to the simplest meal.

A delicious variation is to spread the pie with a whipped banana topping. Make this with an egg white and crushed banana, sweetened with sugar, whip until light and fluffy.

**Coffee Banana Cream Pie**  
(Makes 1 9-inch pie)

- 1 9-inch crumb crust
- 1/2 ounce unsweetened chocolate
- 1/2 cups bottled milk
- 1/4 cup vacuum-packed ground coffee
- 4 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup bottled corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/2 large bananas
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons preserves

**Crumb Crust**

- 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 cup melted shortening
- 1 egg white

For crust, blend dry ingredients together, add melted shortening and mix thoroughly. Beat egg white very slightly with fork and add slowly to crumbs. Use fork or pastry blender to mix thoroughly. When finished the crumbs should resemble coarse sand. Grease a 9-inch pie pan and spread crumbs evenly over bottom and sides, about 1/4-inch in thickness. Pat into place. Bake in a moderate oven (325 deg. F.) for about five minutes. Remove and cool before filling is added.

For cream filling, melt chocolate in top of double boiler, add 2 cups milk and the ground coffee and heat to scalding temperature; remove from heat, let stand ten minutes and strain through several thicknesses of cheesecloth. Return strained mixture to double boiler. Make a smooth paste of cornstarch, sugar, salt and 1/2 cup cold milk. Add to hot milk and cook until it thickens.

Beat egg yolk and egg and corn syrup together; slowly stir in a small amount of hot custard. When well blended add this mixture slowly to remaining custard in double boiler. Cook for five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add vanilla and cool to lukewarm temperature. Cut half banana into thin slices and spread over bottom of pie crust; add coffee cream filling. Just before serving, garnish top of pie with rosettes of banana slices which have been dipped in lemon juice. Place dots of preserves in center of each rosette.

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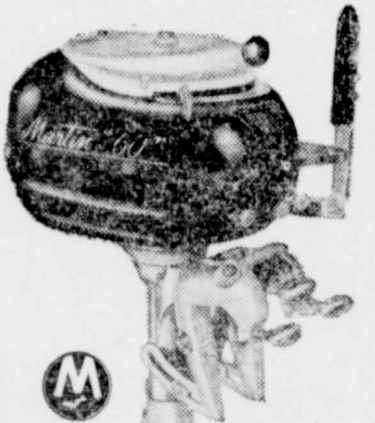
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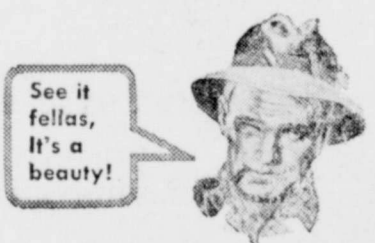


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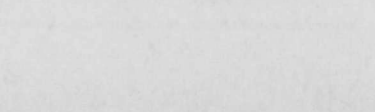
