POSTWAR.

We Americans, after winning the greatest war in human history, are now throwing away our victory and the fruits of our toil, and playing into the hands of our competitors. We are not doing this deliberately, but because we are tired and dumb, and want to forget the war and everything connected with it, and get back to normal life.

We do not realize that there is no longer any such thing, normal or abnormal, as the life we lived before the war, and we cannot return to it. Life marches on, and if we do not step it runs over us. While we were fighting abroad, and winning what we were then fighting for, a new world was in

the making. We have to accustom ourselves to it now or let it sweep us into the discard. This is far from the slow, kindly, familiar world that we used to know. It is not, except in spots and among children, a world of ball games and long vacations. It changes before our eyes, into what we have anticipated as growing leisure, but in actuality turns into new and unexpected responsibilities. Safety itself wanes, necessarily taking new and unexpected forms. A mechanized world that was to be a world of ease and gentleness eludes our sight.

One of the things the nation is learning is that it is unwise to have any kind of monopoly — even of the labor union type.

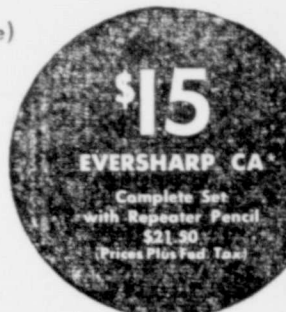

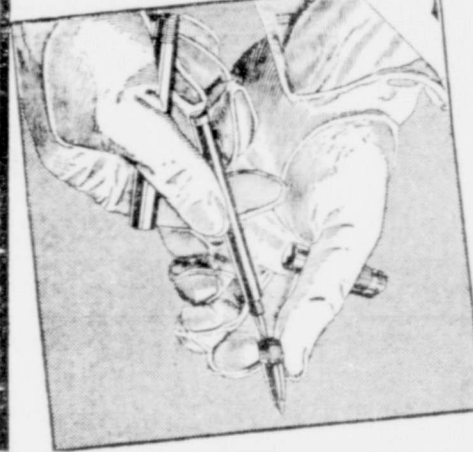
