## Cio Analysis Shows 25 Pct. Wage Increase Necessary

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The CIO threw into its wage drive today an independent analysis claiming that "lush" 1946 corporate profits of \$25,000,000,000 justified immediate 25 per cent wage increases to workers — without new price increases.

The report, entitled "A National Wage Policy for 1947," was prepared by Robert R. Nathan Associates at the request of the CIO. Nathan is a former deputy director of the office of war mobilization and reconversion.

Nathan's report said the present "imbalance" between wages and profits is unsound and warned that "unless there is an immediate increase in wages or a sharp drop in prices, we are flirting with collapse."

But there is no evidence that business will cut prices before a depression, he added, and labor therefore should not forego needed wage increases at this time. He said corporate business as a whole could grant 25 per cent raises without having to boost prices.

A CIO source said CIO unions would use the report as ammunition in their campaign to win "substantial" 1947 wage increases in the steel, automobile, electrical, rubber and other important industries.

## Rockefeller Offers UN \$8 Million to Buy Site

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 11. (U.P.)—The United States today proposed that the United Nations establish its permanent headquarters in a deluxe "city-within-a-city" in mid-town Manhattan.

The American delegation to UN for the first time gave its support to a specific location after revealing that John D. Rockefeller Jr. had offered to give UN \$8,500,000 to buy land for a headquarters along the East river between 42nd and 48th streets.

Russia also hailed the offer as a possible solution to UN's year-long wrangle over whether to set up its permanent home in San Francisco or the east. Rockefeller's offer was submitted to the UN headquarters committee, which promptly appointed a sub-committee to inspect the site later today.

## Big 3 Drop demand for Count of Armies, Armaments

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 11. (U.P.)—The United States, Russia and Britain agreed tentatively today to drop their demands for a count of the world's armies and armaments, and passed to the all-powerful United Nations Security Council responsibility for taking early steps to disarm and ban atomic weapons.

The surprise move, engineered by Paul Spaak of Belgium, president of the General Assembly, would supplant a British resolution for an immediate count on troops and armaments — including atomic bombs. The new plan would require no actual disarmament for at least a year.

Secretary of State James F. Byrnes announced later that he will make a personal statement to the United Nations general assembly before it adjourns, describing the United States position on the entire subject of disarmament.

Byrnes made the announcement after a long conference with Bernard M. Baruch, and after the UN debate on troop census, armament census and disarmament.

## Welding and Car-pentry Classes Mexico at Cisco Started for Vets Church of Christ

A part time welding class has been started in Cisco by the Eastland County Vocational School for the benefit of veterans of Cisco and vicinity who wish to learn this trade, or improve their skill in the trade.

Classes are being conducted at the Adams Welding Shop, 707 F avenue, with Vandal Earls as instructor. Class meetings are held Tuesday and Thursday nights of each week, 7 p. m.

The student will be assisted in learning the correct torch and electrode manipulation. Instruction will also be given in the proper setting up of apparatus, machine regulation and the correct preparation of the parts to be welded. Technical information will be given that will help in deciding upon the most suitable materials and the best process for welding various jobs.

A few additional men can be accepted in this class for enrollment. Veterans interested in this work should contact the instructor at the Adams shop in Cisco, or the Eastland County Vocational School.

A part time class in carpentry is also being conducted in Cisco, with J. H. Latson as instructor.

## Santa Claus to Be in Cisco Saturday Afternoon

The Cisco police force was reorganized today, following the recent appointment of G. E. ("Bit") Bedford as chief. The standing out feature was the appointment of a new assistant chief. G. A. Roberts, who has been connected with the Mancill Motor company and more recently with the Blease Motor company, accepted an appointment as assistant chief. He appears to have many friends here, as business men give him an excellent reputation. Following his selection, Chief Bedford got to work on the material he had at hand to form a force which he says he hopes will do effective work, that if they are not great in numbers they will make up in quality. Two men were let out this morning and another resigned, so that leaves eight men on the force, including the chief and the assistant chief. They have divided the force as follows: Day—G. E. Bedford, chief;

George W. Carmichael, sanitary patrolman; W. E. Hicks, W. B. Johnson, patrolman. Night — G. A. Roberts, assistant chief; A. W. Butler, Frank Pierce, Mack Harris, patrolmen. Chief Bedford says he will try to work out some reforms which he hopes will add materially to the efficiency of the force. One thing he will stop, will be the acceptance of fines, or bonds, by arresting officers, without taking the parties arrested to police headquarters. He said every person arrested is going to be registered at the desk and bonds will be accepted only after conference with the mayor.

## Garden Club sponsors Beautifying of Highway Approaches Christmas Tree Program Committees Are Named

A campaign to beautify Cisco, and particularly the highway approaches to the city, and in so doing to honor with living memorials the men and women who served in the armed forces, is being sponsored by the Cisco Garden club, Mrs. J. P. McCannles, president of the club, announced.

This campaign is in cooperation with the state highway commission and is part of a county-wide program utilizing the pecan and abelia as the basic tree and shrub for Eastland county planting. The two plants were chosen by a committee of women representing every town in the county.

During the current planting season, which will extend into 1947, every property owner living along a highway into Cisco, and for a distance of at least half a mile outside the city limit, is urged to plant pecan trees and abelias.

The campaign does not limit its emphasis to the planting of such trees and shrubs along the highway, Mrs. McCannles said. Instead a general planting of the character is being encouraged.

"People driving through the city will see more than the roadside," Mrs. McCannles explained. "Very often, too, strangers are so attracted by the appearance of the highways that they will leave main thoroughfares and drive through other parts of the city on sightseeing."

"The pecan and the abelia are especially adapted to our soil and climate and a general planting of this tree and shrub will result in a very effective appearance."

"We have been told that Eastland county led Texas in the number of men and women in service per capita. What can we do less than make our city and county the beauty spot of the state to honor our ex-service people?"

The abelia may be secured from the Cisco Floral and Nursery Co., said J. B. Peck, manager.
