## Cisco CofC Looks With Favor on Joint Eastland-Stephens Airport

### C. of C. to Buy Legume Seed For Test Planting

The Cisco chamber of commerce directors last night appropriated \$40 to be used for the purchase of legume seed for test planting in this area. T. G. Caudle, agriculture secretary, requested the appropriation and will be charged with its expenditure.

Thanks of the board were voted to Harry Schaefer, the Lobo band and its director, Fred Baumgardner, the Cisco fire department and Ronald Rhodes of the Motts No. 5 store for their assistance in the Santa Claus program Saturday, December 14.

The program in which Santa visited the children of this area and scattered candy among them, was one of the most successful that the chamber of commerce has ever sponsored. More children saw old Santa this year than in any other season, it was estimated.

## Ciscoans Attend Important Meets in Nearby Cities

Representatives of the Cisco chamber of commerce attended two important meetings held in this section of the state during the past ten days.  
President R. L. Ponsler and Secretary B. A. Butler were guests of the Fort Worth chamber of commerce at that body's annual meeting last Thursday night, when President Wm. K. Jackson of the U. S. chamber of commerce was the speaker.

Monday evening J. J. Callaway, R. N. Cluck and the secretary attended a regional conference of chambers of commerce at Sweetwater. The meeting, sponsored by the Sweetwater board of city development and Sweetwater club, was addressed by Ben Wooten, vice-president of the Republic National Bank of Dallas, under the auspices of the United States chamber of commerce.

**TAYLOR ENROUTE HOME.**  
ROME, Dec. 18.—Pope Pius XII held a farewell audience today with Myron C. Taylor, presidential representative to the Vatican, who is returning to the United States tomorrow.

The Cisco chamber of commerce board of directors, meeting Tuesday night, discussed a proposition for a joint Eastland and Stephens county airport to be located on the county line near the junction of the highways to Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Breckenridge — should it be found necessary to consolidate the traffic of all four cities in one port in order to guarantee continuance of air line service to this area.

Although the board took no formal action, it tacitly approved the arrangement whereby the Pioneer Air line will use the municipal airport at Eastland to give air service to Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. It was pointed out that the Eastland port is no further from Cisco than ports in most cities and that service to Cisco would be just as effective as though the port were located nearer. Efficient taxi service between Cisco and the port will be insisted upon, it was stated.

Under this arrangement Cisco will be spared the cost of installing an expensive port and paying the cost of its operation, it was pointed out. This cost, the board suggested, is likely to be high, since the maintenance of a constant schedule in and out of this area by the large Douglas planes which the Pioneer will use, will require paved runways and other costly airport services for which the city could receive but little revenue — not enough on present traffic potential to anywhere near meet the cost of operating and maintaining the port.

With only one line operating in and out of the area the income from such a port would be small, and the only value accruing to the communities will be the improved service for airmail, air express and possibly passenger traffic. The latter is not expected to be considerable.

Use of plane service between Cisco and Dallas and Fort Worth was not considered practical, since little time would be saved over automobile travel for that distance.

The fact that no one or two communities in this area originate sufficient air traffic to warrant air line service at this time prompted discussion of the proposition to locate a bi-county port to consolidate the business of Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger.

By this plan, it was suggested, sufficient volume might be accumulated to insure continuance of this service to all four towns and other communities in the area.  
No plans were made to push the project, however, the board preferring to wait and see what success can be accomplished with the port at Eastland.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18. — James A. Farley, former Democratic national chairman, said today that the Democratic party must be completely reorganized and persons in it who have "lost the public's confidence must step aside" if the party is to regain its leadership in the nation.

Farley disavowed any ambition to return to the chairmanship either of his party's national or New York state committee.

He declined to comment on whether he was a potential candidate in any future election including the presidential election of 1948.

## If Labor, Management Smart, Good Times Will Stay

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18. (U.P.)—President Truman's new council of economic advisers said today that national prosperity in 1947 depends primarily on management and labor getting together on wages without crippling strikes.

Even after a year and a half of peace, the council said, the nation stands in a situation of "misunderstanding and tension among the indispensable parties to our total economic life."

Under these circumstances, mishandling of economic affairs could cause a minor recession next year, the council said. But if things are handled properly, it felt that a long period of good times will surely result.

The economists viewed the outlook for production and jobs as "more than ordinarily favorable for a period of some years ahead."

On the other hand they admitted the possibility of a minor recession next year.

But they saw no reason for a deep or prolonged depression — "barring international tension verging on war or a persistent round of strikes."

The council said new legislation will not provide a cure-all for next year's economic problems.

### LOSS INCALCULABLE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18. (U.P.)—The American Foundation estimated in a report today that American workers lost \$998,640,000 in wages through strikes from September, 1945, to September, 1946. The Foundation reached the figure on the basis of an eight-hour day at \$1 an hour. It said that 124,830,000 man-days were lost by 5,292,000 strikers. The cost of lost production, it added, was incalculable.

Jake L. Lyerla, 92, for many years one of the substantial farmers of the Flatwoods area, but a resident of Eastland city since 1941, was buried in the Eastland cemetery this afternoon. The pastor of the Eastland Methodist church, assisted by Rev. L. C. Anderson of Cisco, conducted the services. By special request of deceased, made several years ago, Clyde Garrett of Dallas, former congressman, was the principal speaker. Mr. Garrett eulogized Mr. Lyerla as one of the most outstanding, serviceable citizens the county has ever had. Pallbearers were Earl Bender, Earl Conner Jr., Ott Hearn, Tobe Ernest, John Hart, Earl O'Brien, Ed T. Cox and John Williams.

Cisco's share of the proceeds will be given to the Lobo band.

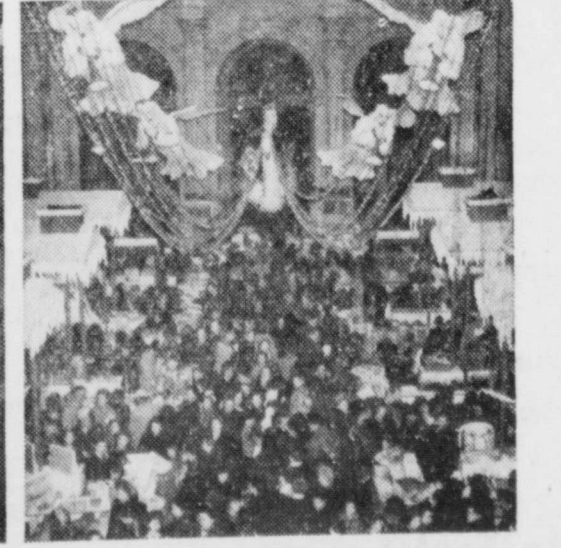
### SOCIAL SECURITY AGENT.
