Cio Unions to Carry Chaos Into 1947 Unless Checked; Harry Bridges Bobs Up

Million new homes in 1947 Will Not Meet the Demand

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. —Major Gen. Philip Fleming's estimate of yesterday that there will only be enough materials to build approximately one million new homes in 1947, falls far short of the rapidly increasing demand for homes and will almost certainly result in close scrutiny of the building materials outlook when congress meets next month.

"The building of new homes for American citizens will be looked upon by the new congress as this nation's No. 1 problem," a Republican congressman stated today.

He added: "There has been much talk about building, but little building. We must have early action. This country needs at least two million new homes."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19. — The CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, spearheading the CIO's nationwide drive for 1947 wage boosts, today demanded a 14 cent hourly "cost of living" increase from Pacific coast waterfront employers.

The specific "dollars and cents" demand was made by the unions' negotiating committee in a meeting with Federal Arbitrator Clark Kerr on behalf of the 20,000 longshoremen and cargo checkers on the West coast.

Presumably, the ILWU means to make their demand effective on January 15, the date when the 1946-47 contract automatically reopens for "wage discussions."

It was the third round of wage boost demands in the past year for the Longshoremen and the first time since September that the union has mentioned a specific figure.

Longshoremen Chieftain Harry Bridges notified the Waterfront Employers Association last week that his union intended to seek a wage increase, but he declined to mention the amount.

Government Drops Ban on Two Pants Suits After 4 Yrs.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — The government today abandoned its ridiculous four-year-old ban on the sale of two-pants suits.

A prohibition against inclusion of vests with double-breasted suits also was dropped. The orders were revoked effective tomorrow.

The Office of Temporary Controls said increased supplies of woolen goods and other fabrics made it possible to drop the style restrictions.

1,342 Persons Get Death Sentence for War Crimes

LONDON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — The United Nations War Crimes Commission announced today that 1,342 persons have been sentenced to death for war crimes in Europe, exclusive of Russia or the Soviet zone of Germany.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 19. — The world atomic now tags soaps, cereals, and movie actresses, and atomic babies may be the next on the radioactive list.

D. E. Franklin of Wichita Falls transacted business for Humble company in Cisco and vicinity today.

The cyclotron, which made the atomic bomb possible, is in use in the medical study of childbirth, Dr. George W. Corner, Baltimore, said in a lecture at the University of Louisville medical school. He said salt, made radioactive by the Carnegie cyclotron in Washington, was injected into pregnant monkeys, and by tracing the radioactivity, doctors are able to learn how embryos are nourished.

Since July U. S. 1947 Winter Wheat Took in More Cash Estimate Indicates Than It Spent All-time Record

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — Since July 1 the U. S. government has taken in nearly \$177,000,000 more than it has spent, the treasury disclosed today.

The treasury's daily statement of expenses and receipts through Tuesday listed government income for the fiscal year at \$16,546,311,628.05. Expenses were \$16,369,346,632.48.

Surpluses also were listed in September and August. Before that there had been none since 1930.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — The agriculture department today estimated the 1947 winter wheat crop at 946,527,000 bushels compared with 873,893,000 bushels this year.

Such a crop, if it materializes, would set a new all-time record. The department's estimate was based on farmers' reports on how much wheat they have planted for harvest next summer and on estimated yields per acre based on crop conditions as of Dec. 1.

Stassen to Campaign Against the Wagner Act

SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., Dec. 19. (U.P.) — Harold E. Stassen, first declared candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, said today he would campaign for an amendment of the Wagner Act to provide "a curb against strike abuses."

U. S. Military Government in Europe Inefficient

LONDON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne L. Morse, R., Ore., said today that budget cuts and lack of manpower impaired the efficiency of American military government in Europe and cost the American taxpayers needless additional millions.

Morse indicated that he would fight in congress on his return for increased appropriations and the transfer of more mature, fully-trained men to the occupation forces.

In Salty Language Bilbo Denies All Charges of Graft

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19. (U.P.) — Sen. Theodore G. Bilbo ticked off in salty Mississippi language today an angry, point by point denial of charges that he accepted money from war contractors.

A "traitorous" secretary whom he compared to Judas Iscariot, political foes, communists and negroes were responsible for the accusations, Bilbo told a senate war investigating sub-committee.

Baruch - Wallace Feud Keeps Latter in Public Eye

NEW YORK, Dec. 19. — Bernard M. Baruch for the second time in recent months accused Henry A. Wallace yesterday of responsibility for an error — this time in an article on the coal controversy in the New Republic magazine, of which Wallace just became editor.

In a letter to Wallace, Baruch termed "wholly false and deliberately so" a New Republic article which said that President Truman "delegated the leadership" in the legal battle against John L. Lewis "to the toughest men around him; General Counsel Clark Clifford and the ubiquitous George Allen, both reinforced by conservative Bernard Baruch."

Baruch declared "I never communicated with the president on this subject," and added: "I expect you to correct this error which, I should think, is an unfortunate way to begin a new job depending on public confidence."

The article was in the Dec. 16 issue of the magazine, the first under Wallace's direction. The former vice-president's secretary said he had not received Baruch's letter and therefore could not comment on it.

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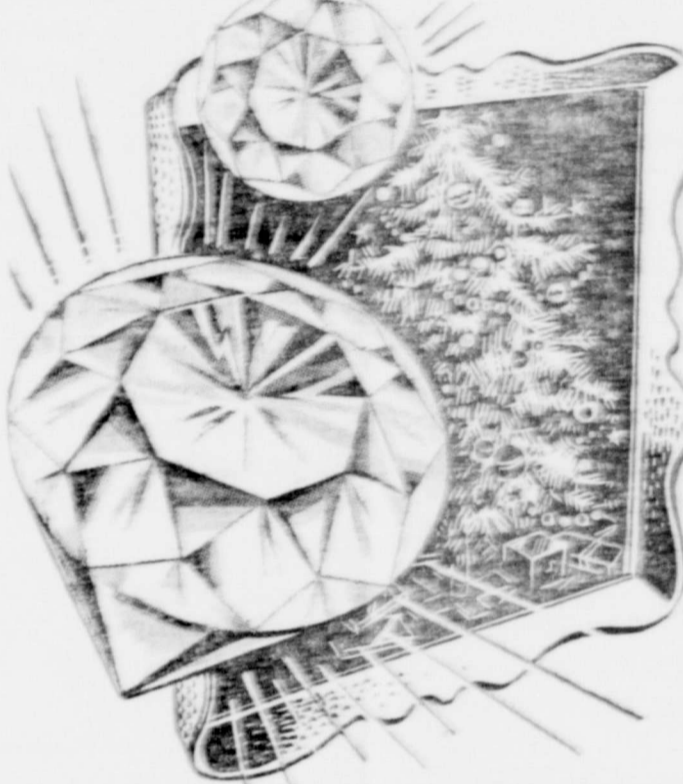
