Truman Urges Universal Training for U.S. Youth

Labor-Management Relations Must Rest on Basis of a 'Two-way Street'

FOOTBALL TONIGHT, CHESLEY

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 20. — Alfred P. Sloan Jr., board chairman of General Motors Corporation, said yesterday that labor has become a monopoly and the nation's big unions must be broken into pieces or otherwise stripped of their powers.

Byrnes picks deputy to Prepare German Peace Treaty

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—Secretary of State James F. Byrnes today named Ambassador Robert D. Murphy to be his deputy for preparation of the German peace treaty.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—President Truman today urged universal training for American youths as insurance for "the continuation of our form of government."
Mr. Truman spoke informally to his new advisory commission on universal training which was named yesterday.
The nine members of the commission held an organization meeting at the White House today and elected as chairman Dr. Karl T. Compton, president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology.
Mr. Truman stressed that he did not want the universal training program regarded as a military training program.
The president restated his aims for this country — "peace in the world and production at home."
"We don't want any territory," he said. "We don't want to hog the trade of the world. We do want an interchange of ideas and of merchandise and everything of that sort."
Mr. Truman envisioned a universal training program for giving "our young people a background in the disciplinary approach of getting along with one another, informing them of their physical make up. And what it means to take care of this temple which God gave us."

Former Ciscoan Goodman's Stage Badly Injured in Show Here Saturday and Sunday

C. A. "Red" Coldwell, former Ciscoan and son of W. P. Coldwell of this city, was seriously injured Tuesday when an abandoned army practice bomb exploded while he was making surface geological surveys for the Sun Oil company near the Flying H ranch, northeast of El Paso. He was rushed to an El Paso hospital and doctors there are said to be hopeful that his legs, both ripped by bomb fragments, can be saved. His father is with the young man.
The El Paso Herald-Post of Tuesday afternoon carried the following account of the accident:
C. A. "Red" Coldwell, former Ciscoan, today remained in a critical condition at Hotel Dieu from injuries received yesterday when an abandoned Army practice bomb exploded near the Flying H ranch, 95 miles northeast of El Paso.
Hospital attendants reported that condition of Mr. Coldwell was slightly improved after a blood transfusion late yesterday.
Mr. Coldwell is 37 and resides at 3723 Mobile street.
Former football teammates of Mr. Coldwell's were among blood donors.
Mr. Coldwell, a geologist for the Sun Oil Co., was making surface geological surveys when the bomb exploded. He said that most of the bomb was buried and that he touched the fins with his foot. Bomb fragments ripped into his legs.
He was rushed to Hotel Dieu by his companion, J. W. Harp, also of the Sun Oil Co., and by J. L. Glascock, ranch owner.

Following the game, the Lobo Exes will be entertained with a steak dinner at the Turner-Haynes Cafe, through the courtesy of Cisco Junior chamber of commerce.

STOCKHOLDERS MEETING.
There will be a call meeting of stockholders of Cisco Homes, Inc., at 7:30 o'clock Monday evening, December 23, at the chamber of commerce office. It was announced by President H. H. Tompkins. Every stockholder is urged to attend this meeting, if possible. Or, in the event a stockholder is unable to attend, he was requested to give a proxy.

"We can continue to accept the monopolistic position of labor and take the consequences," Sloan told the Boston chamber of commerce, "or we can deal with it with the objective of preserving our economic freedom by protecting our competitive economy."
"Something is now going to be done about it," he said.
Sloan, who is one of the country's leading industrialists, said new laws must be passed to limit the strength of the unions to the point where the public interest is not substantially prejudiced by strikes.
"This could be done, he said, in either of two ways:
1. "By dissolving existing unions into parts so no one part has the economic power substantially to affect the public interests.
2. "By limiting the power of any one union, as now constituted, to strike so large a part of any one industry as substantially to prejudice the public interests."

Once union power has been curbed, Sloan said, the government must adopt a hands-off policy and let collective bargaining proceed without restriction or interference.
Recalling that the Sherman anti-trust Act was invoked to prevent monopolies on the part of business, Sloan warned:
"Today labor has become a monopoly and something is now going to be done about it."
"The Sherman Act," he continued, "has not destroyed business nor any association of business. Its principles, if applied to unions, will not destroy unions. It is a fair and equitable means of requiring both business and unions to conform to the fundamental principles of the competitive system."

Sloan emphasized that the problem is not "to move the pendulum back in the opposite direction, but to stabilize it at a neutral point."

Labor-management relationships must be re-established on the basis of a "two-way street," he said. To adjust present inequalities, Sloan advocated these ten steps:
1. Employers should be allowed to talk freely with workers.
2. Decisions of all government agencies should be reviewed by the courts.
3. Labor unions should be made responsible for their acts.
4. Foremen should be recognized by law as part of management.
5. The closed shop should be outlawed.
6. Union questions should be passed on by a representative proportion of the entire membership.
7. Unions should be required to publicize financial operations and prohibited from contributing to political activities.
8. All forms of violence and coercion should be outlawed.
9. Unlimited right to petition for bargaining elections should be granted to employers.
10. Collective bargaining should be sharply defined.

NO BILLS RETURNED.
ATHENS, Ga., Dec. 20. — A federal grand jury, unable to establish the identity of any one in the mass lynching of four negroes last July, was in recess today, "subject to recall" if new information is uncovered. Twenty-one whites and two negroes are on the jury.

US. atomic control Plan Gets Ok, But Russia Objects

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 20. (AP)—The United Nations atomic energy commission adopted the principles of the United States atomic control plan today but Russia, objecting violently, refused to vote.
Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko announced just before the vote that his government would have no part of a vote on the American proposals now. The vote was 10 in favor with Poland abstaining and no vote recorded for Russia.
The decisive showdown paved the way for submission of the American atomic plan to the United Nations Security Council sometime next year. At that time Russia would be able, if she desired, to kill the plan with her big five veto power.

CIO Auto Workers Sue Ford Co. Causes Man to See For \$8 Million Evil Effect Liquor

CHICAGO, Dec. 20. (AP)—The CIO automobile workers sought \$8,000,000 from the Ford Motor Co., in a suit filed today in federal court for portal-to-portal pay.
The suit was filed by Attorney Ben Meyers on behalf of local 551, UAW-CIO, which represents about 2,000 workers at the company's Chicago plant known as Ford City.

DALLAS, Dec. 20. — Liquor drinking is blamed by William Hamilton Moody, 42, for his prospect of three decades in prison.
He stoically heard a jury in Judge Winter King's court find him guilty of the Sept. 1 pistol slaying of his neighbor, Eugene L. Ballard, 41, and assess a 30-year term in the penitentiary.
"Guess I would have felt the same way had I been on the jury," Moody, a former tavern operator, said. "I received a fair trial and, without funds now, expect I will accept sentence and not appeal."
Moody testified he and a woman companion turned in to the Ballard house believing it to be his own. He told the jury he fired thinking Ballard to be a hijacker after the latter had knocked him and the woman down on the porch. The couple lived two doors farther down the street. Moody admitted they were intoxicated.
From his jail cell Moody attributed his plight to excessive drinking. He pointed up and down the cell corridor, saying practically all the prisoners were there because of drinking.
"It would suit me if they closed up every liquor store in the country," he said. "At 42, I have learned a sad and costly lesson. It is my hope that every young man may profit by my experience and leave liquor alone."

CLYDE, Dec. 20. — E. J. Barton, prominent ranchman and Clyde civic leader, is critically ill in a Baird hospital. He was in an oxygen tent this morning. Barton has been in ill health for the past year and was admitted to the hospital two days ago.
