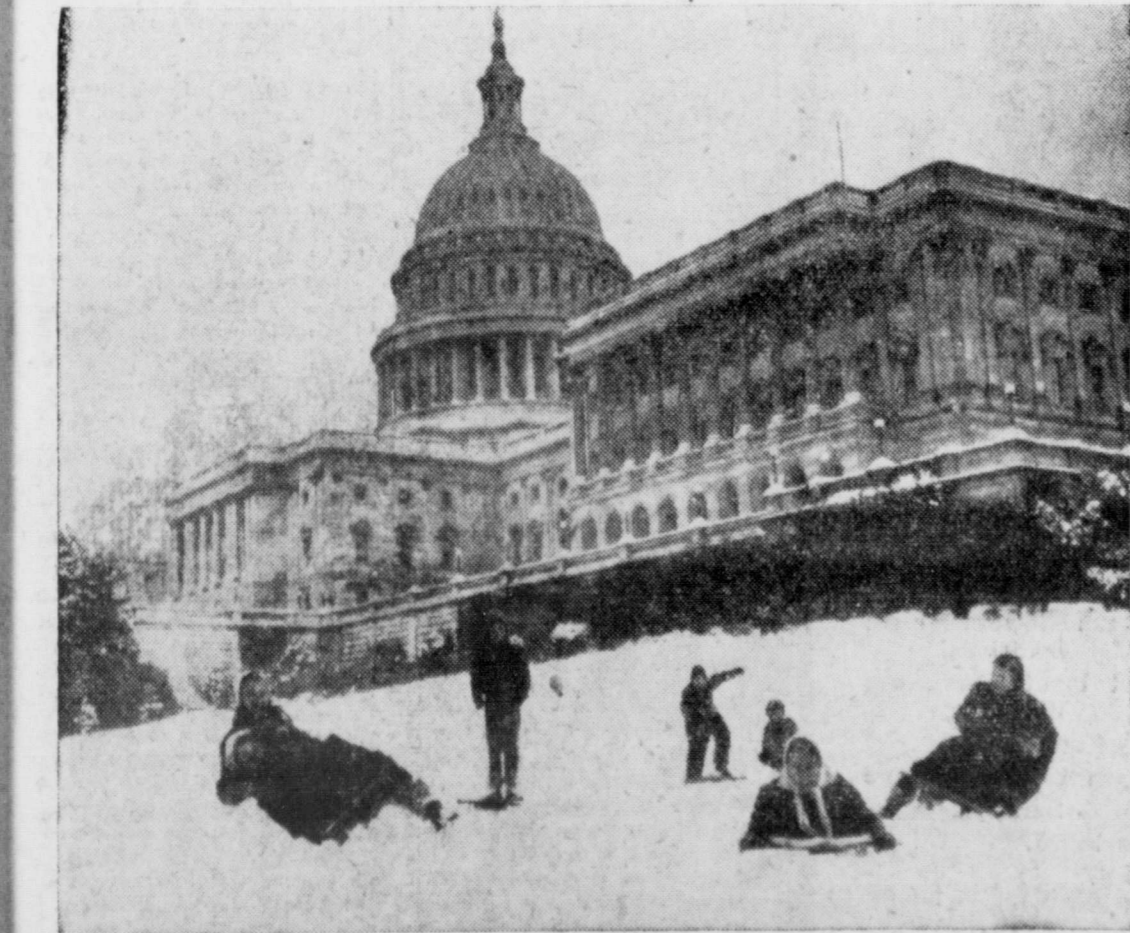
There are also 44 grandchildren, 40 great grandchildren and 10 great great grandchildren.

### GOP TAX CUT PLANS ARE POPULAR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (U.P.) — Republican leaders promised today to make good on their tax cut plans although President Truman was bringing up fresh ammunition to oppose them.

That the chief executive and the GOP majorities in the House and Senate were headed for a showdown battle over taxes appeared certain.

A struggle over the budget for fiscal 1948 also was in the cards.

The president's insistence that any budgetary surplus be used for debt retirement instead of tax reduction already has run into unyielding Republican determination to cut both personal and luxury assessments.

In his state of the union message yesterday Mr. Truman touched briefly on fiscal affairs, but made clear his opposition to tax cuts.

Tomorrow he is expected in a report on the country's economy to amplify his reasons for opposing tax cuts now.

Still further amplification will come on Friday when he presents his budget for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The budget is expected to call for expenditures in the neighborhood of \$36,000,000,000.

The Republicans are expected to whittle that figure.

Chairman John Taber, R., N. Y., of the House Appropriations Committee insists the budget could be cut to nearly \$29,000,000,000.

Chairman Robert A. Taft, O., of the Senate Republican policy committee used the expression "under \$34,000,000,000" in discussion of budgets and taxes.

Taft feels that income taxes may be cut 20 per cent if the budget is held under \$34,000,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (U.P.) — Gen. George C. Marshall today delivered a blistering "plague on both your houses" to China's warring factions — Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek's national government and the Chinese Communist party — raising strong doubts that he would return to Nanking as President Truman's peace envoy.

Never in recent diplomatic history has an American official, while still in his post in a foreign country, issued such a bitter indictment.

He blamed "extremist elements of both sides" for frustrating, "time and again," sincere efforts to achieve peace, and left no doubt that neither can expect American help until they put their houses in order.

His blast was issued by the state department 15 hours after the president had announced Marshall's recall for a personal report. The document was labeled "a personal statement" and it disclosed that Marshall was admitting failure of his 13-month mission.

He leaves Nanking tomorrow by plane.

### Football Stars Point Bribe Finger at Playboy

NEW YORK, Jan. 7. (U.P.) — Frank Filchock and Merle Hapes, stars of the New York Football Giants, put the finger on Broadway Playboy Alvin J. Paris today as the lavish spender who offered them \$3,500 each to throw the professional championship game with the Chicago Bears last Dec. 15.

They were the first two witnesses in the trial of Paris on a bribery charge.

### San Angelo Holds Out for 20 Pct. Cut in Gas Rate

SAN ANGELO, Jan. 7. — San Angelo's city commission brought its differences with the Lone Star gas company to a head yesterday by instructing City Manager Sam Lawhorn to extend, replace or enlarge gas lines where urgently needed and to charge it to the gas company or its successors.

The company's franchise with the city expired as of Oct. 12, 1946, and the firm contends it cannot make improvements without a franchise.

The commission offered the company a twenty-year franchise yesterday — provided Lone Star will grant a 20 per cent rate reduction to domestic consumers.

The present domestic rate here is 67.23c per thousand cubic feet.

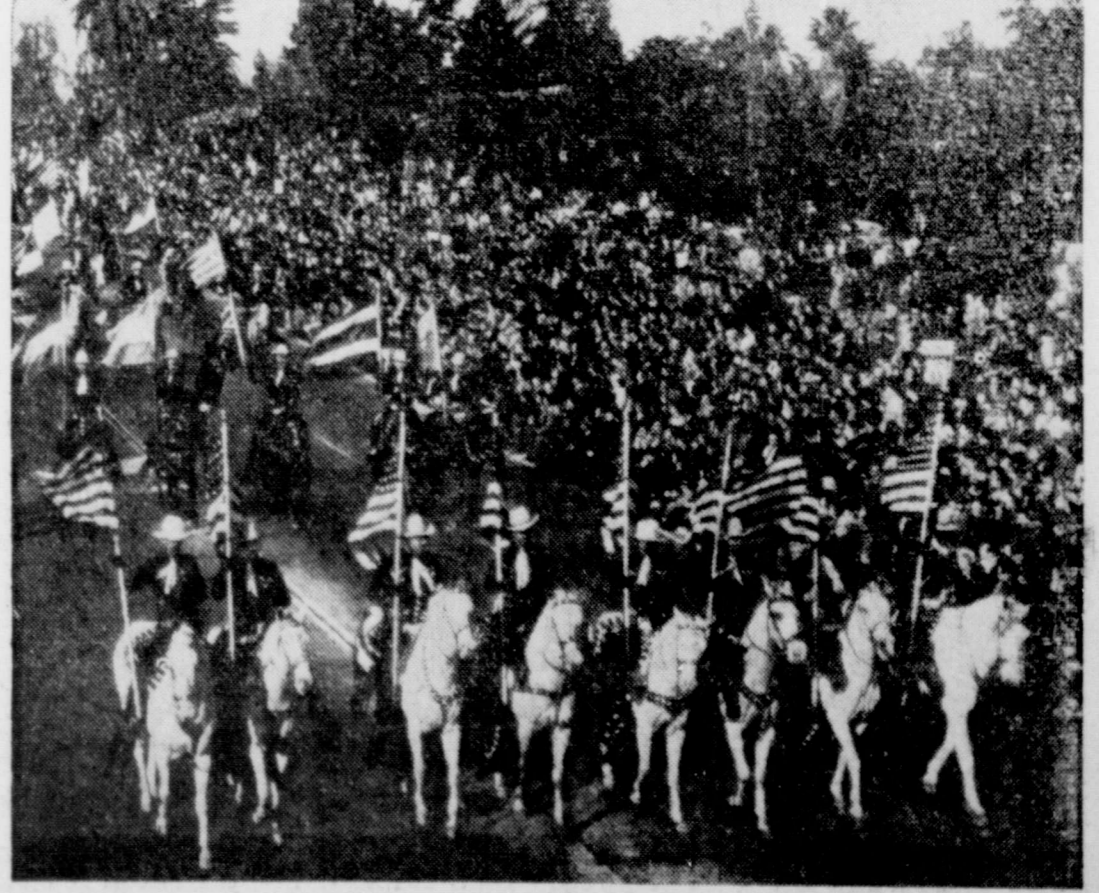

## END OF EMPIRE.

Premier Leon Blum of France repeats France's recognition of an independent Annam or Viet Nam. Premier Attlee of Great Britain concedes Burmese independence. The reason in both cases is the same. Neither France nor Great Britain is able to maintain its authority by force. If the two colonial dominions want freedom enough to fight for it, the mother country is in no position to resist.

On this account Winston Churchill's denunciation of the Labor government's relinquishment of Burma is mere campaign oratory. All his talk of "the decline and fall of the British empire" is true enough, but there is nothing that can be done about it, short of war which Great Britain is not strong enough to carry on. It may be humiliating, but it is unavoidable. The era of European supremacy in the Far East is ending, and not even Churchill could prolong its life if he were in power.

## MODERN ROBIN HOODS.

All unsuspected by the stay-at-homes, a new national sport has edged its way into prominence. This is bow-and-arrow hunting. Ten years ago bows and arrows had only a handful of followers who used the ancient weapons to stalk big game. In 1945 there were 10,000 hunters. In a few years the number will grow to hundreds of thousands, according to one enthusiast, P. J. Hoffmann.

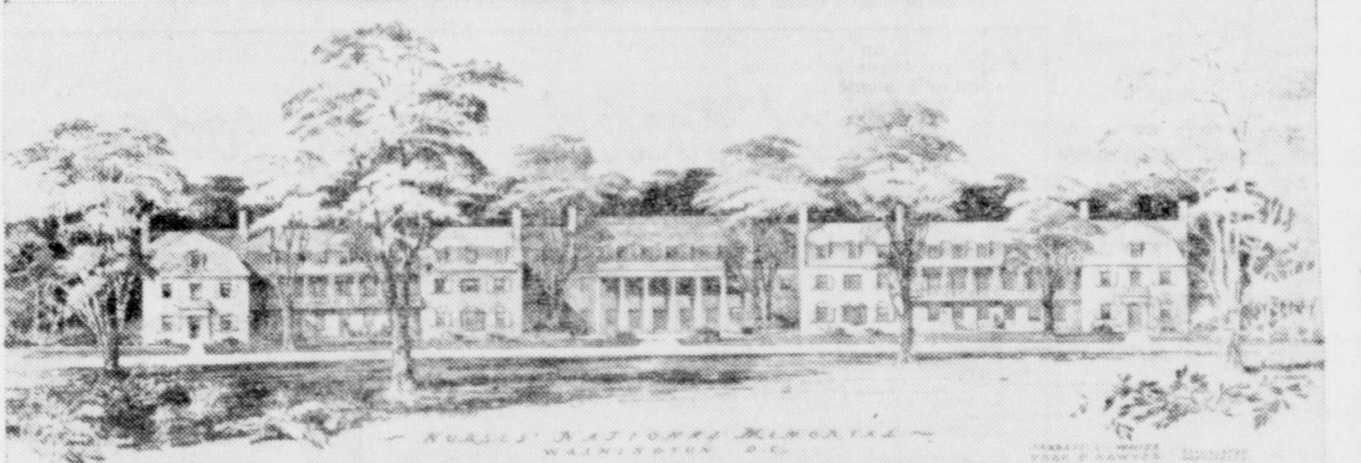

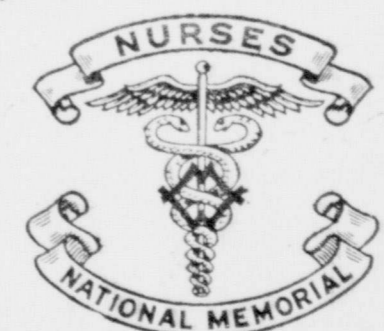
