### MOHAMMEDAN BLOC.

A grand Mohammedan alliance is urged by the King of Trans-Jordan. He envisions Iran, Turkey, Iraq and Afghanistan joining with Pakistan, the proposed Mohammedan areas of India, Egypt and Morocco. If all these states acted in concert they could pretty nearly have their way in their part of the world.

An interesting dream which might come true, but in 1917 it still looks like a dream. Arabs and Turks have long been unopposed in the Turkish rule from which the Turkish freed Arabia did not endear the Turks to their subjects. Iran and Turkey apart from their many wars, belong to radically different sects of Islam, as far apart as Preterians and Catholics. Iran and Afghanistan are old enemies. Much blood has been shed in the past between the proposed allies, and in the Mohammedan world bloodshed is long remembered.

Christian nations unfortunately have found their common religion insufficient ground for friendship. Why should it be thought otherwise with Mohammedans?

### WHY TEACHERS LEAVE.

Everywhere there is a shortage of teachers, and school boards are raising salaries to keep the schools from closing. Money, however, is not the whole story, as Carl T. Peshaber, president of the Iowa state educational association, has just pointed out. Interference with teachers' private lives has driven as many out of the profession as low pay.

"When eyebrows are raised over playing cards by teachers, dancing or engaging in other forms of widely accepted social behavior which the 'best' parents enjoy as a matter of course," says Mr. Peshaber, "it becomes for many teachers not only an irritation upon their private lives but an obnoxious discrimination."

Every community, large or small, has byproducts. They probably cannot be reformed, but at least they could be kept from interfering with the schools.

### FRIENDLY VISITS.

A picture in Business Week shows two business men in friendly conference. Sir George Nelson, board chairman of English Electric Co. Ltd. and Frank M. Folson, executive vice-president of R. C. A. Victor Division. The former, prominent in the electronics industry in Great Britain, is visiting R. C. A. with the idea of getting acquainted with American workers in his line and observing methods of manufacturing and merchandising here. Among the first passengers to Europe when travel became possible were American business men with similar purpose in view.

Student-exchange, teacher-exchange and exchange of business ideas cannot be reformed, but at least there is understanding and friendship among nations.

### NEW BUT NOT GREEN.

More able legislative performance than usual can be expected of the 80th Congress. While there are a lot of new senators and representatives, there are among them many experienced public servants, many seasoned business men.

The senate has the following former state governors as new members: Raymond Baldwin of Connecticut; Edward Martin of Pennsylvania; John Bricker of Ohio; Edward J. Tamm of Minnesota; McGraph of Rhode Island and Herbert R. O'Connor of Maryland. Democrats. Other new senators who know their way around include Wisconsin's Joseph R. McCarty, a former Marine who directed Lafayette; New York's Irving M. Tamm, close to Dewey; Ralph M. Flinders, member Committee for Economic Development and a Vermont businessman; Zalus N. Eaton, with long political service behind him in the native state; Virginia's Democrat, A. W. Robertson, inducted through service in the House.

At this time the nation needs the talents of its able citizens. It is heartening to find men of wide experience in the senate. The nation will be watching them.

## PEOPLE ARE ASKING THESE QUESTIONS ABOUT ARMY ENLISTMENT



Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights?

A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days, one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-incurred injury or disability incurred within that first 90-day period, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the end of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months. Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$99 a month if you have dependents.

Q. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas?

A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may be selected to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in?

A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled, if you enlist for 3 years.

Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade?

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.

Q. Is there any other way I can reenlist in grade?

A. Yes, if you held one of certain military occupational specialties, and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, you can reenlist in a grade depending on the length of time you held the desired M. O. S.

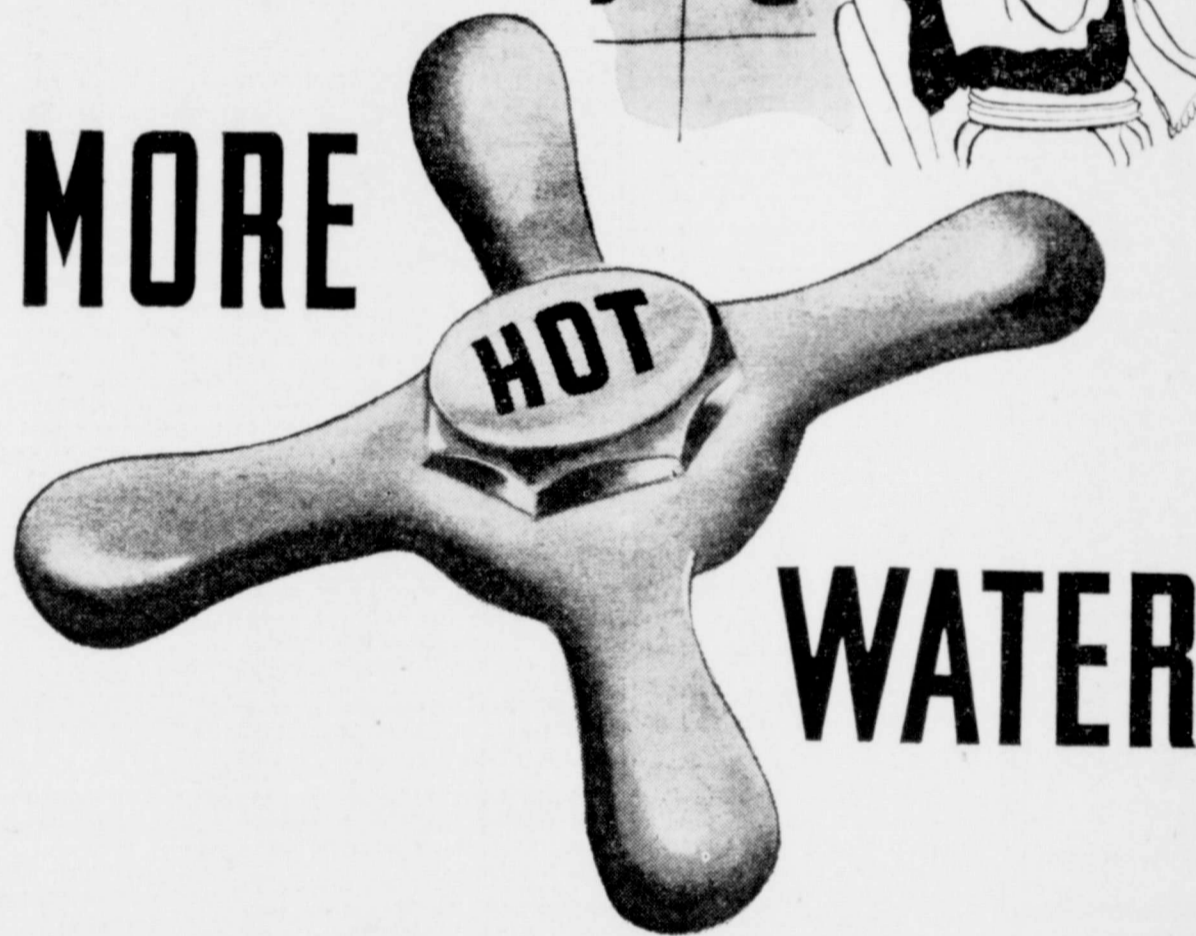
