## Summer-long Sessions to Be Dropped Says Halleck

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck, Ind., said tonight that the House is "ready to roll" with a legislative program which should be wound up in time for a congressional adjournment July 31.

The GOP leader struck back at "some people, uninformed as to the workings here, who think that we have not been moving fast enough." He promised to give top priority and expedition — but not haste — consideration to port-to-port, strike control and tax reduction legislation.

He pointed out that Republicans took control of congress at a time when the reorganization act had shrunk the number of House standing committees from 48 to 19. The act also called for a whole new arrangement of committee staffs.

"That we got done with preliminary organization work as quickly as we did certainly ought to be a credit to us," Halleck said. "The labor committee has just been organized and it can be expected to begin hearings on legislation dealing with labor-management relations in the not too distant future."

"Also of great public interest is the matter of taxes. The excise tax extension bill — to continue \$1,130,000,000 in wartime excises — is coming up in the House on Wednesday."

Halleck made it clear that Republican leaders are determined to break away from the trend of the past decade to summer-long sessions.

## McKellar Wants to Be Sure of No "Red" Taint

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Senator McKellar, D. Tenn., apparently intends to try to smear David E. Lilienthal as a "Red" or "Red sympathizer" when he begins his fight on Lilienthal's confirmation as chairman of the atomic energy commission. Hearings start Monday.

McKellar tipped his hand this week when he started his fight on Gordon Clapp, Lilienthal's successor as chairman of TVA. He accused Clapp of attending Chattanooga meeting of Southern Conference for Human Welfare, which, he charged, was Communist-front organizations. He also accused Clapp of asking draft deferment for TVA men alleged to be Communists. Clapp denied this, said calling the Southern conference a Communist-front organization didn't make it so.

McKellar quoted former Dies committee investigator as saying a Knoxville woman had told committee Herbert Marks, formerly of TVA, had attended Communist meetings with her. Marks, who was later with state department, assisted Acheson-Lilienthal committee prepare report on international atomic energy control, has since been employed by Atomic Energy Commission—which means he was cleared by FBI.

**SUPPORT OF EDUCATION.** Paul H. Good, manager of the department of education of the U. S. chamber of commerce, will speak to a gathering of businessmen and educators from this section of Texas at a meeting in the Cisco Country club at 3 p. m. Friday, Jan. 31. His talk will be on public support of education, and other allied topics.

**POLL TAX PAYMENTS.** County poll tax payments were estimated Saturday to be right at 2,800, as compared with approximately 6,600 last year, when state county and congressional elections were held. January 31 is the final date on which they may be paid. The only elections that will be held in Cisco this year are in April, when city commissioners and members of the school board will be chosen. Poll tax receipts are being issued at Cisco chamber of commerce for the convenience of purchasers.

## Jr. College Enrollment Shows Steady Increase

Enrollment of both veterans and non-veteran students at Cisco Junior College is showing a substantial increase as the opening of the second semester on January 28 draws near, according to President R. N. Cluck.

All students interested in enrolling for the second half of the year were urged to call Mr. Cluck or R. F. Webb, registrar, at 418 or contact the Cisco chamber of commerce as soon as possible.

In addition to regular day classes for all students, the college offers courses in auto mechanics, welding, radio-electricity, carpentry and plumbing for veterans in night school. There are still a few facilities available in the college dormitory.

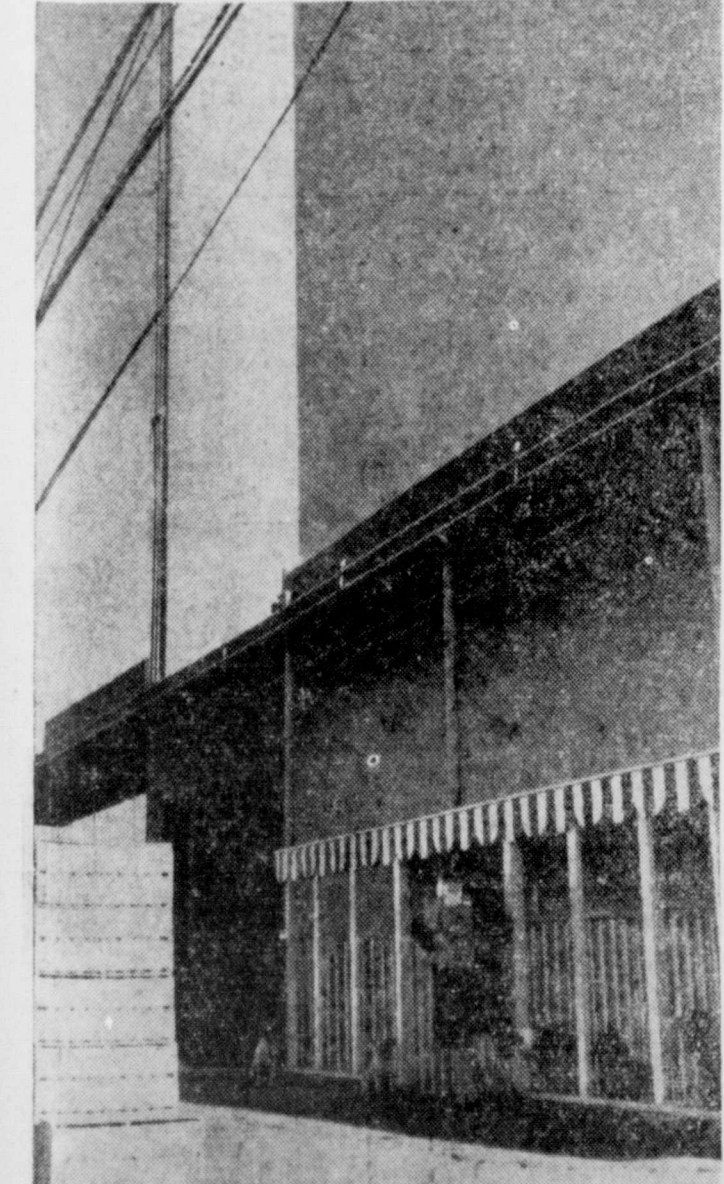

WOODSON THE VICTOR.

EASTLAND, Jan. 25.—In a game that was almost decided the other way in the final seconds of play, Woodson Wednesday night beat Eastland to win the first Eastland high school invitational basketball tournament. The score was 19 to 18, and the "almost" came when Bill Brasher of Eastland flipped in a one-handed field goal just before the final whistle and apparently put Eastland ahead 20 to 19. But Referee Overall of Cisco had blown his whistle for an out-of-bounds ball just before Brasher made his shot, and the whistle was not heard amid the din.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 25. (UP)—The CIO United Steel Workers and U. S. Steel Corporation today announced agreements after two years of negotiations on a new standard of hourly wage scale rates.

The agreement will cost U. S. Steel \$32,000,000 in retroactive pay and groups 45,000 separate job titles under 30 general classifications.

The contract is wholly apart from negotiations between the company and the union for a new contract, which opened here Friday.

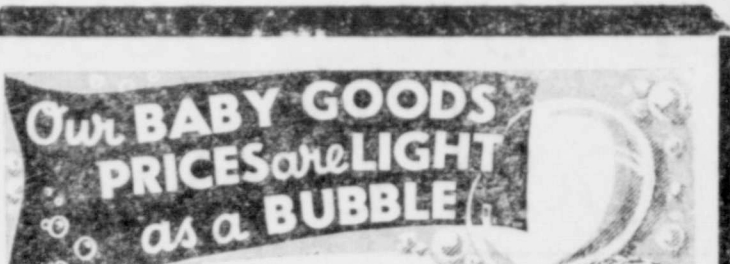

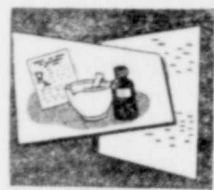
