Picard Struck Hard Blow at Labor's Multi-Billion Dollar Portal Pay Threat

Former Ciscoans College and High Visit Cisco on School Staffs Business Trip Busy on Annual

State Senator and Mrs. A. C. Stanton of Clifton, Ariz., former Ciscoans, departed for home Saturday after spending several days in the Cisco area on business.

Senator Stanton was born in Cisco, in 1885, but has spent much of his life in Arizona. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Stanton, settled here many years ago and owned and operated Cisco's first flour mill.

A. C. Stanton, the son, opened the M System grocery store here in the middle twenties, later selling it to the late L. A. (Buck) Harrison. He then returned to Arizona and was subsequently elected to the office of state senator, which position he still holds.

Both husband and wife still retain soft spots for Cisco and have ordered the Daily Press mailed to them for a year, that they may keep up with local friends and Cisco progress.

Lutheran Church Ground-breaking Ceremonies Today

Barring unforeseen delays, the construction of the new Lutheran church of Cisco should begin Monday.

Recently Grace Lutheran church of this city was awarded one of the surplus army chapels at Camp Berkeley, near Abilene. The size of the chapel makes it necessary to take down the building and rebuild it after it has been moved. A. T. Bontke, a Lutheran contractor of Abilene, has been put in charge of building and moving operations. He will subcontract most of the work to local men.

A ground-breaking ceremony will take place at the building site, corner of Eighteenth and D avenue at noon today after the regular morning services.

The chairman of the congregation, J. W. Gerhardt, will turn the first shovel of earth, while Rev. Gerh. T. Naumann, pastor of the church, will be in charge of the ceremony.

The public is cordially invited to attend this brief service.

Rohre Heard Presbyterian Midwinter Lectures

Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre returned home Friday from Austin where he attended Austin Presbyterian seminary midwinter lectures. The lectures were held from Feb. 3-7, and were sponsored by the committee of religious education, synod of Texas; the Alumni association of Austin Presbyterian seminary, and Austin Presbyterian theological seminary.

It has been decided to hold these lectures each year, enabling the ministers of the southwest to hear the outstanding men in the religious world. This year the lecturers were Dr. Paul Scherer, one of the nation's preachers par excellence and lecturer in homiletics; Dr. Scherer, a Lutheran, is with Union Seminary of New York; Dr. H. Shelton Smith, author of "Faith and Nurture," which has aptly been termed "A Twentieth Century Watershed in the Field of Religious Education." Dr. Smith in his lectures related these categories to contemporary Protestant thought. Dr. Smith, a Congregationalist, is head of the religious education department at Duke University. Dr. E. Frank Hall, successful pastor and forceful preacher, has served with distinction as pastor of the St. Louis church, and has been one of the leading forces of Protestant Christianity in that great city. Dr. Hall's general subject was "The Man and the Isotope." Dr. Hall was a student at Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Va., when Mr. Rohre was there. Mr. Rohre said over 150 ministers from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico attended the lectures.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Federal District Judge Frank A. Picard today struck a sweeping blow at labor's multi-billion dollar portal pay demands by tossing out the test claims of Mt. Clemens Pottery Company workers.

In a vital decision Picard ruled—

1. That so-called walking times and make-ready-for-work times involved in the Mt. Clemens case were too trifling to be the basis for damage payments.

2. That the concept of portal time did not apply to the general field of manufacture, except in a relatively small number of cases.

3. That if any portal claims were allowed, they should not be retroactive beyond June 10, 1946, date of the U. S. Supreme Court decision upholding portal pay for pottery workers.

Picard's opinions, if now upheld by the Supreme court, indicated that all or a large share of \$5,000,000,000 in retroactive claims filed by CIO unions might be dismissed.

Edward Lanb, attorney for the plaintiff CIO United Pottery Workers Union, said immediately that he would appeal the decision to the Supreme court. The justice department earlier said it also would appeal "no matter what the outcome."

The original high court ruling of last June directed Picard to compute walking and make-ready times in the case, but also to apply the doctrine of "de minimis," or the concept that the courts cannot be concerned with trifles.

President Tells Shackelford Co. Americans They Remains in the Live Too Fast Bone Dry Column

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8. (U.P.)—President Truman today asked the public to do something about a couple of killers which, on the basis of past performance, will take nearly 430,000 American lives this year.

Mr. Truman told his countrymen in effect that they are living too fast.

The toll he forecast will exceed the 393,000 deaths levied against this country by World War II. It will be as though bombs wiped out the population of Newark, N. J., or Kansas City, Mo.

The killers cited by the president are heart disease, which he said would destroy 400,000 Americans in 1947, and automobile accidents, which last year took a toll of 28,600 lives.

The president blamed the ravages of heart disease on "the increased tempo of modern life." The toll, he said, is steadily growing. Heart ailments are the leading cause of death in this country.

WILL PASS SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Betting here is that two-term amendment will pass senate. It has to pick up 12 or 13 Democratic votes, and a poll shows it has good chance of getting them. Ratification by states is something else again. Three-fourths of states must approve within seven years.

TROUBLE IS BREWING.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Diplomatic unpleasantness with Poland isn't over. Ambassador Lane is being recalled "to report." Chances are he'll not return to Warsaw, except perhaps to pack. Poles, taking cue from Moscow, may pull their ambassador back from Washington. Or, if they suspect U. S. may be intending to break relations entirely, they may jump gun.

TAX CUT DOUBTFUL.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Another reason why you shouldn't count on income tax cut this year: Any Republican-passed bill is almost certain to be vetoed. Two-thirds vote to override would be doubtful. Veto prospect largely has been overlooked amid Republican clamor for 20 per cent tax cut, yet Truman has said any budget saving should be applied to debt retirement.

The Merchants Credit association met Thursday night with 22 members present. The welcome booklet which the association is sponsoring was discussed and a report was made by a committee appointed to work out the details of the plan to welcome Cisco newcomers. Nick Miller, Charles Burke and A. D. Anderson compose the committee.

A special meeting was held by the committee to get this feature under way, and they announced that each member of the association will furnish the letterheads and turn in to the secretary the message they wish printed. All letters will be printed and attractively bound in leatherette binding with the words "You're Welcome to Cisco," underneath of which will appear a picture of Lake Cisco's Williamson dam. On the back of the cover will be a picture of the "Cisco Kid." This booklet will be presented to each new resident. There are no selfish interests involved in this plan, and the only motive is to help sell Cisco to those moving here from other places. Churches, schools and civic organizations will be invited to have a page in the booklet.

Tens of millions with empty stomachs, threadbare clothes and unheated homes existed miserably in the third week of the coldest weather Europe has had in 50 years.


