Kiwi Fruit Has Potential

An odd-looking fruit that looks non-edible promises to provide American consumers a nutritious new taste treat and American farmers a lucrative

It's kiwi, known to some as the Chinese gooseberry. Native to Asia, the fruit was first produced commercially in New Zealand where it was named 'kiwi" after the country's na-

About the size of a hen egg, it has a brownish skin with a covering of short, stiff hairs. When peeled and sliced, kiwi fruit has a green flesh that becomes a cream shade at the center. Its taste is described as a combination of strawberry, rhubarb, and pineapple.

The fruit has a higher Vitamin C content than citrus, is rich in iron, and its enzymes reportedly aid in digestion.

While most of the kiwi fruit now being sold in this country is imported, an estimated 300 growers planted about 2,000 acres of kiwi vines in California last year. Culture of kiwi plants is similar to that of

ED WOODARD of Bruegel & Sons Elevators reported that corn yields are a little better west of Dimmitt, with some yields averaging in the 8250-8700 pounds per acre range. "These yields are exception-

al this year, but we had one pounds," said Woodard. Farmers Grain Co.'s Aubrey

Myers reported that both corn and milo harvesting in the Hart area is nearly completed. "Milo yields are 1,500 to 2,000 pounds light compared to

last year, and the corn is about 1,000 pounds light. With a killing frost, we could be through with harvest by Saturday." said Myers. Another week to ten days

will be required to close out the corn harvest in the Nazareth area according to Kenneth Slough of the Nazareth branch of Dimmitt Agri-Industries.

"CORN YIELDS are running 1,500 to 2,000 pounds per acre under last year, and mile is a least 1,000 pounds per acre under last year," said Slough 'The milo isn't too bad south of Nazareth, but it's in rough shape north of Nazareth where it was so dry during the summer," he added.

A portion of this year's crop has been left lying in the fields due to borers, high winds and prolonged wetness. Some corn farmers have suffered field losses as high as 1,500 pounds per acre, despite their best efforts to pick up the fallen

Despite lower yields and high field losses, county farmers can be thankful for the clear sunny weather which has finally allowed them to salvage a

Last year was an exceptional year yieldwise for both corn and milo and county farmers are aware of that fact.

They are even more aware that this year's losses could have been far more severe had not the weather improved.

So as soon as a purchaser agrees to assume the loan on a home, the veteran should apply for a release from the VA office which guaranteed the loan.

Before hunting deer or turkey anywhere in Castro County, always get permission from the land owner first. If he runs you off, it's probably because he's had bad experiences with hunters before.
