Therefore, to comply with various state regulations, an insurance jargon was developed, eliminating the necessity of 50 different policy forms. Insurance companies would like to see plain talk policies since most companies maintain Policy Holder Service Departments which write to policy holders re-explaining the terms of the policy in layman's language. Companies would prefer to eliminate this additional expense and pass on the savings in premium payment reductions. Progress has been made in the last five years to simplify the language and better illustrate the benefits.

Regulation bans residue burning

Regulation I of the Texas Air Control Board which prohibits outdoor burning within the state of Texas, applies to outdoor burning of agricultural crop residue.

THERE ARE exceptions to the regulation in that certain outdoor burning is allowable, such as fire-fighting training, recreational campfires, etc.

Violators of this ban on outdoor burning are subject to fines of \$50 to \$1000 per day for each day of violation.

The Texas Air Control Board also has several other regulations concerning other types of air polution, permits for construction and operation of possible air pollution sources, and air pollution emergency episodes. 1. Acting on tips from neighbors that Patty Hearst was believed to be holed up in a certain apartment in a large city, two agents went to the apartment, knocked and announced hemselves.

Behind the locked door, they neard someone scurrying across the room. To an FBI agent, this means someone inside could be going for a gun. The prescribed reaction is to kick in the door quickly. This they did.

Inside, they found a girl who strongly resembled Patty Hearst. But she wasn't Patty Hearst, and the poor girl was frightened out of her wits.

The FBI was roundly criticized across the nation for its 'Gestapo tactics'' in this incident. Adams and other topranking FBI officials reviewed the incident step-by-step and concluded that the agents' actions had been reasonable under the circumstances, although the result had been unfortunate.

2. THE DAY before Adams spoke to us, two agents approached a house at Pine Ridge, S.D., as part of another 'routine' investigation, using the same procedure. Both were shot and killed without warn-

Adams used these two incidents to illustrate that investigation is an inexact science. Marvin Schulte of Nazareth and that any routine investifor any mistakes made, he said, but he appealed to the press to maintain a proper perspective in reporting or editorializing

about FBI activities. Adams had been in constant telephone contact with Washington ever since the Pine Ridge incident the previous his trip to Texas because of it. learned once again, hearing this thoroughly professional man speak of the two murdered agents and seeing the TV coverage of their funeral later, that the FBI doesn't consider its agents as computer numbers. Hoover always knew where every single agent was, every day, and it's still that way in FBI headquarters.

THE MEN of the FBI had the rug pulled from under them when Temporary Director L. Patrick Gray, a Nixon appointee, made like a political lackey by feeding the White House information about the Watergate investigation. Gray admitted full personal responsibility, but some of the taint of the incident naturally rubbed off on the bureau itself.

The men of the FBI are tryng to recapture the public trust the best way they know howby going about their jobs and maintaining the professionalism that has become the trademark of the FBI.

With men such as Adamswho is short, red-headed, brilliant, concerned and thoroughly objective-I'm convinced the FBI is still alive and well.

ADAMS told the state's newspaper editors and publishers that some of the underground organizations that have kept Patty Hearst at large have vowed to "put out the birthday candles" during our nation's Bicentennial.

Just before he spoke to us, he learned from FBI headquarters that the visitor center at Mount Rushmore had been blown up during the night. The explosion could have been related to the Pine Ridge incident, he said, or it could be the start of the underground's anti-Bicentennial efforts.

Blowing up public places is not the best way for our underground radicals to get their point across, or to gain the sympathy they think they need. 
