SCHOOL OPENING AT THE COLLEGE Parents and Pupils are Urged to Be Present at the Opening


Exercises.





The state tax board has fixed the advalorem tax rate at 25 cents on the \$100 property valuation, which is an increase of 13 cents over last year. The school tax rate was fixed at 17 cents, againt 16 2-3 cents last year. The board also fixed a 5-cent special tax or Confederate pension, as provided for under a recent constitutional amendment. The total state taxes therefore, will be 45 cents, as against 26 2-3 cents last year. an increse of 181-3 cents.






