HUERTA NOTIFIED COURSE OFFENSIVE

United States Informed Him that it Looked With Abhorence on His Course.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.-The United States government informed the Mexican provisional president, Huerta, today that it looked with abhorence and amazement upon his asshmption of both the executive and legislative powers of the government, and that in view of such action it could not recognize as constitutional the election planned for October 26.

Two notes were sent, one by Secretary Bryan in strong language, inquiring after the safety of the members of the Mexicon congress. The other note was drawn in forcible language by Wilson himself, and is said to constitute practically the last eftorts of the Washington government to deal with Huerta authorities in a diplomatic way.

The steps taken by the United States government were communicated to all foreign governments.

It would not be surprising if John Lind should be recalled to the United States at once.

The cabinet was appraised of the two notes and approved of the vigorous representation. The cabinet meeting was about to adjourn when press dispatches announced that Senor Moheno, Mexican minister of Foreign Affairs characterized the American communications as "intemperate." Official Washington awaited tonight the formal reply being


Syndicate Brings **More Prospectors**







The comprador is an important factor in the treaty ports of China. Many large foreign firms are engaged in the import and export trade at these ports, and each emmerchants in the various lines of trade in which his house is interested, in Tientsin, Peking and the other cities of north China. He receives a commission on all that he buys or sells for the firm. In return, if credit be given to any Chinese shop or firm, the comprador guarantees the obligation, and if the shopkeeper does not pay at the appointed time he must pay out of his own pocket,

CALIFORNIA'S FIRST RICE CROP.


