Mexico Citv, Nov, 9.-Prov sional President Huerta at mid night Saturday night, issued ormal statement to the diplomats stating that it is now fore seen that the recentelections are null on account of too few pre cincts having participated in the voting and that, therefore, when congress convenes it will naturally annul the elections.
President Huerta explains that the program then will be to cal new elections, he in the mean time continuing his program of
pacification.
The statement to the diplo mats was given to the press for publication at 12:30 o'clock Sunday morning.
N ) reference is made in the statement to the recent repre sentations by the United States, but by many people here it is taken as an answer. The statement recites at length the effort President Huerta has made to establish peace and place his suc cessor in the presidential chair by free and fair elections.
From the feelers being put out over the district it seems Hon John H.
