Chamber of Commerce Holds Meeting

Lockney Chamber of Commerce held a very important meeting at the First National Bank Monday night. While the attendance was not large on account of the weather, yet those that did come out was enthusiastic. Among other matters attended to was the adoption of the By-Laws and Constitution and perfecting organization. D. C. Lowe was elected Vice-President and an executive Committee Chosen as follows: E. P. Thompson, J. C. Garrison and J. H. Gruver, A Welfare Committee of five was elected as follows: B. F. Smith, J. B. Dawson, Carl McAdams, S. A. Henry and Grady Brewster. The duty of this Committee shall be to look after the welfare of the town and country and report and recommend to the Chamber of Commerce such enterprises or improvements as are needed in the town and country. The President and Secretary are ex-officio members of the Committee.

One new member was elected to membership at Monday night's meeting, bringing the total membership up to 25.

The regular meeting nights of the Chamber as provided for in the Constitution will be the 2nd and 4th Monday nights in each Month. At the next meeting, Monday night, December 8th, we want 25 new members. Hand in your name.

Be Careful With Fire Works During Xmas.

There is a state law against shooting fire works in the business section of a town and near a home, and this law should be enforced in Lockney to the letter as a protection and precaution against fire. A night watchman should be employed until after the holidays. Lockney cannot stand another fire.

Our Mexican Policy

The Mexican policy is now being discussed by all classes of our American people. The war in Mexico has been in progress three years, and there is now more destruction of life and property in that country than at any time since the trouble began. Two administrations have had to deal with the situation and ultimatum after ultimatum have been issued, warning the Mexicans against the destruction of American property. But the destruction continues.

The last National Democratic Convention at Baltimore adopted this plank:

"The constitutional rights of American citizens should protect them on our borders and go with them throughout the world, and every American citizen residing or having property in any foreign country is entitled to and must be given the full protection of the United States government both for himself and his property."

Now has President Wilson carried out this plank of his party? We say he has not, but on the other hand his warnings to both sides to the controversy in Mexico has been thrown back in his face, and told to mind his own business.

In a recent interview with those high in authority in the Mexican government, they say that Mr. Wilson is bluffing, the Americans are blies, cowards, etc. This is a pretty hard jolt coming from a people that has showed no regard for Americans lives and property in Mexico.

The issue as is now presented, in view of President Wilson's recent ultimatum, demanding Huerta resignation and his defiance, is that if this government don't take some action and make good its threats we will become a despised nation for cowardise, and the President will loose the respect of all the American people. The democratic party in the plank herein quoted is pledged to the restoration of peace in Mexico, and the protection of American interest. We realize that war is a serious matter, but which is worse, "To be despised in the eyes of the nation or kill a few thousand Mexicans."

While the plant can send messages for only 1,500 miles, it can catch messages from more powerful plants from a greater distance.

Northwest Texas Methodists To Establish Summer Encampment in Plainview.

For Custody of Children.

A suit filed here this week styled "Susan A. Muncy vs. Bertie Muncy et al." is set for trial before Judge Kinder, Dec. 10. This suit is for the custody of the minor children, Elbert and Myrtle Muncy, son and daughter of the late James Muncy, who was killed at Lockney in the earlier part of this year, for which Mrs. Bertie Muncy stands charged. At the inquest the boy, Elbert's testimony was very incriminating against his mother, but at the habeas corpus proceedings later on he refused to testify, and for this was sent to jail for contempt of court. The case was appealed to the higher court, pending a decision of this court the boy was out on bond, and during his interim, the children were adopted by their maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Baker, of Floydada. The suit just instituted is to set aside this adoption and give their custody to Mrs. Susan A. Muncy, the paternal grandmother.--Tulia Enterprise.

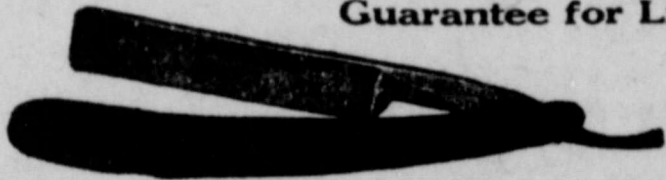
