keep cost records who can tell HOW I am not saying farmers don't know definitely whether the loss was due to poor farming, a bad year, poor or that of your own teams, or whether the particular crop or kind of stock doesn't pay. In other words you have got to STUDY your farm business to find out how to improve it, and when you study it you must use facts and figures and not rely on guesses. If you learn this one lesson ? from the Club work it will have paid you well for all the work you have done.

So the cost record I have asked you to keep in connection with the raising of your pig or crop are not a foolish waste of time. They are designated to show you how much it cost you to raise a bushel of grain or a pound of pork so that next year you will better be able to figure a cheaper way of doing it. It is designed to show you the principle items of expense in raising crops and stock, and it should teach you that your own time and the time of your team is as much an item of cost as the seed you buy. If you can't pay yourself and team wages for working your crop. then you had better learn a better way of growing your corp, or hire out to some one who can afford to pay **** you wages.

So important is the keeping of the record book that the competition rules for the Boy Club Contest at the County Fair make necessary for you to have your record book complete in order to try for a prize.
