Note that I have divided the maize club and pig contests into several parts in order to give each boy a better chance to win a prize. Read the conditions carefully, and note that in every contest the record book, history and exhibit counts heavily in awarding the prize. The yield or gain alone that you are producing will not in itself win for you.

I am also enclosing for your benefit explicit instructions, telling you just how to complete the work in each contest so that you will be eligible for a prize at the Fair. Stop right now and read this, and when you think you understand, tack the whole sheet up on the wall to refer to later.

We are about to close up the first year's work of the Boys' Agricultural Clubs in Floyd Count . We are about to finish the job we set out to do, we are on the lastlap of the race. Did you ever watch a good foot race? Did you ever see a runner who started out strong but who fell behind as the race progressed and who finally dropped out because he thought he couldn't win it? What do men call such a runner? A QUITTER. Are you a quitter? I don't think so or I wouldn't send you this letter. The man who wins is the man who sets out to do a thing and finishes it. The winner is the one who plugs along all through the race and then at the end puts his whole thought andstrength and will into it. He may not win first place but he's a winner, because he finished what he started.

Instructions for Completing Club Work

MAIZE, KAFFIR OR FETERITA

1-Get a neighbor or your father to measure with you exactly one acre of your crop. In the back of your record book you will find a pince to put down the number of yards long and the number of yards wide your acre is, and these measurements multiplied together must equal 4,840 sq. yards (1 acre) Have the party that helps you measure sign at the place provided, thus showing that an outside party has witnessed that your measurement is correct. You may measure from row to row instead of middle to middle.

2-Head all of the grain included in your acre AND NO MORE. At the end of five days or later weigh the entire crop from the sore. Then weigh 100 pounds of heads and thresh them out by hand. Weigh the threshed grain and from this compute the number of pounds of threshed grain you have in the eimire crop. Reduce this to terms of bushels (50 lbs to the bushel) and enter it under "Business Showing." Do not enter the price per bushel until you come to the Fair.

3-Add up all the items of expense that you have been keeping record of during the season and enter them in their proper places under "Business Showing." Reduce all these items of expense to terms of one acre. Example: If it cost you \$5 for preparing and planting 5 acres, enter the cost of same in "Business Showing" as \$1 or what it cost to prepare and plant 1 acre. If you fail to finish this all up don't let it keep you from coming to the Fair. If you have all the necessary costs entered but have notbalanced the book ap, come to my office the first day of the Fair and I will help you finish.

4-Write fully, under the space provided for "History of the Crop." about your work with the crop from the time the land was prepared until Fair time, including the best methods of selecting seed. This will count quite heavily in awarding the prize. Don't put it off.

5-Prepare an exhibit of at least 10 good heads of your crop, using as a guide the paper I sent you some time ago on "Seed Selection for Club Members," and bring this exhibit to the Fair the first day. , Space will be privided for your exhibit, and you cannot compete for a prize without showing one. If youwant to exhibit more than 10 heads, that is your privilege. COTTON

See Sections 1, 3 and 4 under Maize, Kaffir and Feterita. These apply to cotton as well as toother crops.

YIELD- Your yield will not be determined by actually weighing the entire acre because the lateness of cotton prohibits this. Pick 2 fbs of cotton any place in your acre field provided you pick it along 1 row in other words skipping around will notanswer. When you do this get a neighbor or your father to witness it. When you have picked exactly 2 lbs along one average row, measure carefully the number of feet of row it took to make the 2 lbs. Then write on a piece of paper very neatly the following: "I certify that I picked 2 lbs of cotton along feet of one continuous row." Fill in the number of feet of row it took to make 2 lbs of cotton, sign your name at bottom, and have the party that witness you do it sign below your name. Paste this in the back of your record book.

EXHIBIT- Bring in to the Fair for your exhibit the 2 lbs of cotton mentioned above, also 10 good boils. Space will be provided for you. Bring this in the first day of the Fair, October 2nd. PIG, BABY BEEF, DAIRY CALF, AND SHEEP

1-Count up all items of expense, such as feed, pasture, slop, green stuff, and your own labor, and enter these in the space provided in the record book. Do not weigh the animal until you get to the Fair, and then weigh on the Public Scales.

2-Write up before you come to the Fair the Story of the Pig in the place provided in the record book, or in the case of calves, or sheep, write the story on a separate sheet of paper and pin it to your record sheet.

3-It is absolutely necessary that you bring your animal to the Fair, otherwise it cannot be judged with the others. Bring it in the morning of the first day, Oct. 2nd, and provision will be made for taking care of it the entire time. Get your animal looking as fine and silky and sleek as possible by cleaning up and then curryig or oiling. Brig feed enough to last three days. CORN

Instructions for finishing the Corn Contest are the same as for theGrain Sorghums (Maize etc.) except that you weigh out 100 lbs of ears, shell them, weigh the shelled grain, and from that figure what the entire yield is, (56 lbs corn to bushel).

Look over the prize list carefully-over \$425 will be given to you boys in prizes-note very carefully just what things you will have to do to finish your work-observe that many things are counted in when the prize is determined.

Don't stay away from the Fair with your record and exhibit because you didn't have time to finish-hustle up, do all you can before the Fair, and then come in with your record book and exhibit as it is. Are you a quitter? NO!






