

BOUNDARY SHOWDOWN

Austin, Texas, Nov. 17 .- It was said at the Attorney General's Department today that the Attorney General has | accepted the challenge of Oklahoma and other adjoining states for a 'fight' on boundary lines. This becme known following a Washington dispatch advising that Attorney General Cureton had obtained data in the Federal records by which Texas will claim part of Louisana and Arkansas.

As a result of atempted encroachment by other states, Texas may resurrect the original and historical boundary lines. The Attorney General's Department is making ready for it. Originally Texas territory ran up through the eastern haif of New Mexico, part of Colorado and up to Wyoming on the west and nearly to the Mississippi on the east.

What Oklahoma will have to face as result of disturbing the boundary along Red River will be a Texas contention for the observance of the 100th meridian as the Texas-Oklahoma line on the esat side of the Panhandle. This involves a claim by Texas for 3796 feet for the entire distance of

Louisana threatened to make claims for Texas territory and Mr. Cureton is making answer by his Washington discoveries, and Miller county, Arkansas, also becomes involved.

Mr. Cureton is en route home from Washington and efforts are being made to divert him to Fort Worth for Thursday's conference between the Governors and Attorneys General of Texas and Okalhoma with regard to the controversy over the Burk-Senator oil well on the south side of Red River, claimed by Oklahoma. Firts Assistant Attorney General W. A. Keeling will go to Fort Worth with Governor for Thursday conference.

Washington, Nov. 21 .- In an effort to meet the situation resulting from the present acute shortage of sugar President Wilson today revived the war-time power of the Federal Govtransferred to Attorney General Pal-Food Administator Hoover during the While it is Palmer's present is prepared to use it to mest any similar situations affecting other food supplies which might arise.

Among the first acts of the Department of Justice, it is understood, will be the establishment of a price of 12 cents a pound wholesale for all sugar, except the Louisana crop, the price of which already has been fixed at 17 cents. This increase of price was said to be necessary to prevent a famine during the early part of next year.

Sharp curtailment of sugar consumption by candy and soft dring manufacturers also will be ordered as ofwhich has followed the enforcement of prohibition. Details to the curtailment remains to be worked out. While the margin between the wholesale and retail price of sugar has not yet been determined, officials are known to have tentatively considered 1.54 cents, making the retail price approximately 14 cents pound. This, however, is subject to change, depending upon a variety of conditions.
