TWO BANK CHANGES IN FLOYD COUNTY THIS WEEK

This week there has been bank changes in Floyd county, whereby Mr. Jim Houston, of the First National Bank of Plainview, becomes assistant cashier of the Lockney State Bank. Houston takes the place at the window of Mr. Turner Stevenson, who goes to the First State Bank of Floydada as active vice-president and cashier. Mr. Stevenson and associates, Messrs. R. E. L. Muncey and W. D. Long have purchased a large block of shares in the Floydada State Bank, Mr. J. K. Green and N. W. McClesky selling their interest to the Lockney parties. Mr. Long becomes vice-president and Mr. Muncey a director in the new combination at Floydada.

Mr. Stevenson has been with the Lockney State Bank for about nine months as cashier, and formerly with the Silverton National Bank nine years. He is a capable banker, and the First State at Floydada is fortunate in securing his services. Lockney people regret to lose Mr. Stevenson, but wish him well in his new position. Messrs. Green and McClesky are informed will remain with the Floyd Bank for a short time, then retiring.

Mr. Jim Houston is one of the best known and qualified young bankers in the Panhandle. He was formerly connected with the Lockney State as assistant cashier, and has many friends in Lockney and community both in business and in a social way. The Beacon welcomes him back to our city. Mr. Brown will act as both president and cashier of the Lockney State Bank.

HEAVY CARS WASTE THEIR OWNERS' MONEY

Several years ago some long staple cotton was grown as a test on the Anderson farm, west of Plainview, and it did well. It seems that long staple can be grown here about as successfully as the short. AMARILLO GASSER 50,000,000 FEET

Amarillo, Nov. 29.—Estimates of the production of the Amarillo Oil Company's Masterson No. 4, which struck a strong gas flow Sunday at about 1,700 feet, place the production at between 50,000,000 and 100,000,000 cubic feet a day. The well is considered the best in this district.—Plainview News.

3 MILLION FOR CARSON & GRAY

Three million dollars is available through the First State Bank of White Deer, for loans to Carson and Gray county farmers, following arrangements just completed with the Dallas Joint Stock Land Bank of Dallas.

Loans will be made from \$1,000 to \$37,000 at 6 per cent interest on 33 years time.

The money is borrowed under the "Amortization plan," whereby the borrower pays 6 per cent interest semi-annually and one per cent of the principal paid each year.

The borrower pays the same sum over six months more and more of which represents the principal and less and less interest as time goes on.

According to the plans the farmers borrowing the money do not necessarily have to take 33 years to pay it off.

If they so desire they have the option after five years to pay the unpaid portion entirely or by increasing payments.

The payment of this money before hand does not involve any penalty or omission of any kind.

The farmers will know what it means not to go through expensive renewals, commissions and the like.

They will know that their debt is being paid off gradually, just like rent and that there is no danger of the money lender shutting down upon them the entire value of the farm.

The farm is the best security there is and therefore furnishes the cheapest money to the borrower; that can be obtained.—Panhandle Herald.

The State Teachers Association held a meeting in Houston last week, and among other things passed a resolution asking for an increase of teachers salaries in Texas amounting to ten million dollars. This increase ought to be brought about, but the question of how it is to be done is all-important.

From what we gather from the Washington dispatches the condition of President Wilson is all but encouraging. He is still a very sick man. It is a deplorable state of affairs, as his wise council is badly needed in the present crisis. Had he been able to take charge of the situation the miners strike would have been settled amicably, the reds deported and the backbone of anarchy broken in this country.

Congress convened Tuesday in regular session. The greatest labors that have ever faced a previous congress will fall to the lot of our national law makers on this occasion. With an industrial upheaval in this country, and anarchy stalking abroad, with the high cost of living going still higher the work to furnish a solution to these perplexing problems is indeed great. If partisanship could be laid aside for a season, and all work as Americans, a proper solution can be found not only for these but all other questions of public importance.

Senator Newberry of Michigan is now under indictment, charged with election frauds and with illegally spending one million dollars to become United States Senator. He is the man that defeated Henry Ford, the maker of the tin lizzies. Ford should have been elected in the first place as he had proven himself a man of affairs and one hundred per cent American. The Panhandle of Texas needed a man to push thier general interests, and called upon Jamison. The farmers were short on wheat cars and Jamison secured them. The coal strike has hit the United States and we are calling on Jamison for coal. They are now asking him to set the sun back an hour or have the time run up and he is trying, if he succeeds in this we are hereby making application to him for a passport to heaven.—Miami Chief.

Jamison may be able to set the sun back an hour as did Joshua when he commanded the sun to stand still until he whipped his enemies, but we doubt seriously if he will ever be able to help you along the heavenly route. There are some things a man cannot do, and we are of the opinion that when Frank undertakes to drag one of these North Plains editors into heaven he will have his hands full. Having once lived in Canadian, Frank Jamison will have all he can do to get himself admitted.

For the past year conditions in Mexico in reference to American citizens have been going from bad to worse, and now it looks like there is nothing left but for Uncle Sam to go into Mexico and whip the socks off Carranza and his bunch of outlaws. The American people are ready for the job and will take hold of the situation with zeal. The government will not have to resort to the draft to get sufficient man-power to whip Mexico. Now comes Egypt to protest against the protectorate England is exercising over that country. It is claimed that England is over-doing the matter and civil liberties is practically at an end in that country. The authorities of Egypt protest to this country with the statement that she fought alongside of England in the world war, and she expected absolute freedom as a reward.

The Governor of Kansas has begun the operation of the coal mines of that state. He called for volunteers and promptly got sufficient men to operate the mines. He will use state and federal troops to protect those who enter the mines to supply the public with coal. This should have been the course of each coal producing state several weeks ago. Instead of doing something practical like the governor of Kansas, the federal government is trying out technical plans, injunctions, etc. In the meantime the available supply of coal is dwindling away at the beginning of the worse winter we probably have had in years. We feel sure that the other states will

follow the lead of Kansas and open the mines with non-union labor. Are the American people to freeze while the miners and operators quibble over a few cents increase in wages? We need common sense brought into this matter, and stop some of the government's experiments and get down to business.

It is now said that the Allies are unable to pay the interest on their indebtedness to this country for borrowed money during the war. They owe this government ten billions of dollars and the interest amounts to a billion annually. Thus it is proven that Europe is practically bankrupt. Our collateral is not the best that could be had. Arrangements are being made to waive the first year's interest and carry same over. If Europe, and especially England, France and Italy don't get down to business she will never be able to pay her obligations.

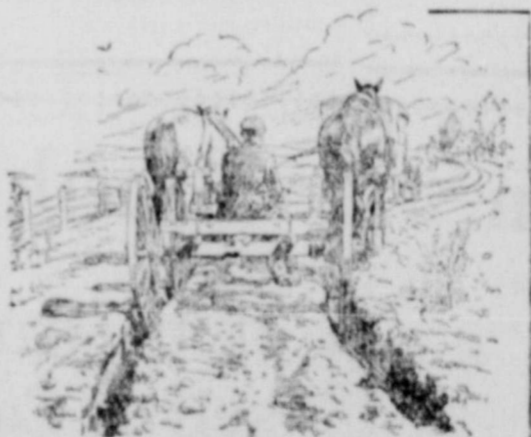

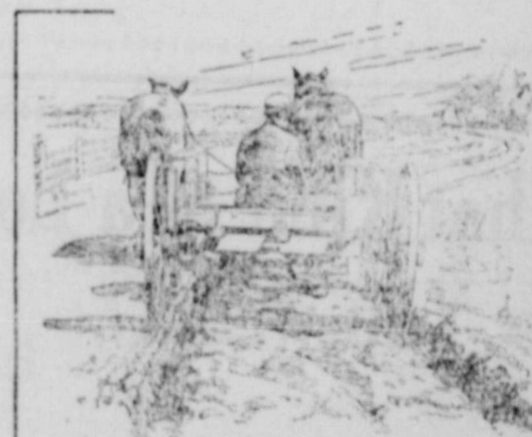

CLAIM OYSTERS ARE BEING TREATED WITH FORMALDEHYDE

Austin, Texas, Nov. 29.—R. H. Hoffman, Drug and Food Commissioner, said today that a vigorous campaign is to be started next week in conjunction with the State Game, Fish and Oyster Department against violation of the Fish and Oyster laws of the state, more particularly in the handling of oysters. He says a number of complaints have been received alleging violation of the statute which forbids the use of formaldehyde in shipping oysters or in sanitary containers; also the practice of "floating, drinking and bloating" oysters. This must stop, said the commissioner, and the new law makes it the duty of both departments to engage in its enforcement. Attention is called by Mr. Hoffman to the fact that the federal law forbids oysters being similarly treated and that interstate shipments which contain treated oysters will promptly be reported to the federal government for prosecution.

AMARILLO THEATRE BURNS

The Olympic moving picture theatre in Amarillo was destroyed by fire last night about seven o'clock. The building was owned by Ray, Britton & Johnson of Amarillo, and the loss was about \$75,000 with \$20,000 insurance. The theatre was leased by Dye, Ford & Rogers, who own a chain of theatres in this section, and their loss was considerable. Ross D. Rogers, formerly of Plainview, was manager. Dr. E. L. Dye went to Amarillo this morning to see about the matter.

About two thousand people were in the theatre at the time, but they all marched out very orderly and nobody was injured.

The Olympic Theatre, the Olympic Drug Company, the Fairsex Store, Gosser's Cigar Factory, the Amarillo Business College, the Olympic Oil Lease and Realty Company, the Amarillo Improvement Company were tenants of the building.—Plainview News.

TO ENCOURAGE SALE OF LOW PRICED FLOUR

New York, Dec. 2.—Encouraging the sale of lower priced wheat flours and urging the purchase of "United States Grain Corporation standard

pure wheat flour," Julius H. Barnes, United States wheat director, tonight in an open letter to the housewives of America asked that they co-operate in the adjustment of the present flour situation.

Mr. Barnes said that within the next

two weeks the Government will place on the market, "straight flour in small packages at a nominal cost". This flour, he asserted, was being sold in order to get the "individual consumer and our backers to readapt their consumption to use of the product which is in ample supply this year."

The readaptation of the habits of "our flour consumers" is necessary. Mr. Barnes explained, because of the increase in flour and bread consumption and a "shrinkage in the crop yield of spring sown hard wheats by 150,000,000 bushels and a corresponding increase in the yield of winter wheats." He said this made it necessary for a balanced consumption, a shifting of part of the demand from one kind to the other.

Although flour production has increased in this country in five months over 10,000,000 barrels above last year, all of which has been either eaten or stored away. Mr. Barnes declared our large crop of wheat will care for the increased consumption.

The new standard flour to be replaced on the market by the Government, Mr. Barnes explained, will be sold "at about 75c" for one-sixteenth barrel (twelve and one-quarter pounds). The Bureau of Labor retail price reports indicated, he said, that for 20 months the average price of flour in this country for the same quantity has been 81 to 89c.

CONVERTING TENANTS TO HOME OWNERS THRU FEDERAL AID

Through the courtesy of G. C. Hutchison, secretary-treasurer of the Tullia Federal Farm Loan Association, we learn some interesting data concerning the report of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, in its drive for October for converting tenants to home owners by means of the loans of the Federal Land Bank.

Mr. S. A. Lindsey, secretary of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, says: "Of the 997 applications for loans approved during October, 182 or practically 18 per cent were those of landless persons who sought loans for the purpose of purchasing homes. The oldest applicant was 73 years of age; the youngest 19; the average age of all is 37 1-2 years.

"Eastern Texas, where lands are cheapest furnish the highest per cent (about 3-4 of the total.) The Black Land Belt, where lands are highest in value, furnish the smallest per cent. While in South Texas and West Texas

the per cent. was better than in the Black Land Belt, though not so good as that of East Texas.

"The importance of this drive will be appreciated when we remember the rapid and I might say abnormal growth of tenancy of Texas as shown by Agricultural Bulletin for Texas, Thirtieth Census of the United States:—Farms operated by owners year 1880, 108,716; by tenants, 65,468. Year 1890, by owners, 132,616; tenants, 95,510. Year 1900, owners 177,190; tenants, 174,991. Year 1910, owners, 195,863; tenants, 219,575.

"These figures show that in the last thirty years the proportion of tenants in Texas has increased from 37.6 per cent. of all farms in 1880, to 52.6 per cent. in 1910. In these thirty years farm owners have increased at the rate of a little less than 3,000 a year, while tenants have increased at the rate at little over 5,000 per year. I believe that we should make every effort to reduce the per cent of tenants to farm owners in this state, at least to the average proportion of tenants to farm owners of the United States—which is 37 per cent."

The Herald is glad to unite with our Federal officials and with our county officials in bringing this matter to the attention of all, and thereby increasing the benefits of the Federal Land Bank. The question of making a tenant a home owner is of vital and public good, and we believe Mr. Lindsey's desire to reduce tenancy will be accomplished when our people more fully understand the excellencies of the plan offered by the Federal Land Bank. Mr. Hutchison, or any other officer or member of the Tullia Association, will gladly furnish all information in their power when called on by any one interested.—Tullia Herald.
