TWO DAYS SET APART FOR WOMEN TO PAY POLL TAX

Tax collector, John Grigsby, has set apart Friday and Saturday, January 23 and 24 in which the women will be allowed to pay their poll tax. Mr. Harve Bolin will be in charge for the county and state and Mr. Anderson for the city. None but women will be permitted to pay their poll tax on this occasion. The place of payment will be in the director's rooms of the First National Bank.

So take notice of these dates, Jan. 23 and 24 and come to town and pay your poll tax so that you will be able to vote in coming primaries. The poll tax will cost you \$1.75. The payment on the above occasion will be private, no men folks will be present except the two officers, and if you have any scruples about telling your age the embarrassment will be eliminated on this occasion.

June 28th is set for the date of the National Democratic Convention, and San Francisco is the chosen city.

The man that continuously finds fault with some one else, will bear watching himself.

A man at Amarillo got chocked on a piece of beef one day last week and the fire department was called out as a result. We have seen lots of tough beef, but have not experienced any on the Plains that would necessitate the presence of a fire company.

One of the best seasons in the history of the Plains country is now in evidence. The recent snow has given us just such a season that will insure us a wheat crop next summer and bumper crops of row stuff and cotton. The outlook for the Plains and Panhandle country were never more promising than at present.

Secretary Daniels, speaking before the Jackson Day Dinner in Washington last Thursday, says that William Jennings Bryan is responsible for the League of Nations. He stated that the Ex-Secretary laid the foundation for the League of Nations covenant through arbitration treaties negotiated while he (Bryan) was Secretary of State.

One of the most beneficial acts of the last Legislature is the law going into effect January 1st, requiring each commissioners' court in Texas to mark all public roads at crossings and intersection. This will prove of lasting benefit to the traveling public, especially to those who are strangers in the country.

E. W. Winfrey, chairman of the Penitentiary Commission, who recently submitted his resignation to Governor Hobby with charges of graft, failed to produce the evidence of his charges demanded by the Governor. It now looks like Mr. Winfrey can not make good his charges, which will put him in bad light before the Texas people. He states that he will give this evidence at the proper time, provided Governor Hobby calls the Penitentiary Legislative Investigation Committee together. If we were Governor Hobby we would surely and promptly call this committee together and give Mr. Winfrey an opportunity to prove his case. Give him a chance to either put up or shut up.

The editor of the Beacon, who has weak eyes, should at once begin negotiating for a pair of smoked glasses, for the fashion journals tell us the girls will wear their skirts knee high next spring.—Plainview News.

The Beacon will add other equipment in the near future in the way of job office equipment. We will install a 10x15 job press in addition to our 8x12, with job type and other material. This will give the Beacon one of the best equipped plants in the Panhandle and Plains country for

newspaper making and job work. The people of this community have shown their appreciation of our investment by a most liberal patronage, for which we are thankful. Democratic leaders at the Jackson Day Dinner, expected some expression from President Wilson as to his future course in regard to the Presidency, but in his message to the diners he did not mention the matter. In this he has erred according to our view point. The democrats of this nation is waiting for President Wilson to say whether or not he is going to be a candidate for a third term. One writer from Washington intimates his indecision is purposely in the interest of his son-in-law, Mr. McAdoo. This writer points to the action of Ex-President Cleveland, who kept his party waiting many months as to his future course, and the result was that the Republicans took the democrats to a cleaning. The Presidential campaign will not shape itself properly until President Wilson declares his intentions towards a third term.

Herbert Hoover, one of the best posted men on two continents on economics, says the time has come when Europe will have to finance her own countries. Europe must be impressed with the necessity of returning to pre-war production. European powers should be dissuaded from seeking inter-governmental help, and should teach their subjects the dire needs of increase production. Commenting further on this subject, Mr. Hoover says: "I disagree emphatically with the statement being circulated by European propagandists, both as to the volume of European financial needs from the United States, and the contention that the bulk of these needs cannot be met by ordinary commercial credits, and that therefore our Treasury must be further drawn upon for new loans," Hoover said. "Our taxes are now 600 per cent over pre-war rates, and we simply cannot add more to this burden. Rather, the problem is one of reduction," the statement concludes.

Whenever you hear a politician attacking the preachers you can put it down he is a discarded politician, a liquerite, a chronic grouch or weak in the upperstory—and maybe afflicted with all these complaints.—Plainview News.

Evidence has been presented to this country to prove beyond a question the Carranza government and soldiers are in league with the bandits in murdering Americans in Mexico. We can't see how the honor and integrity of this nation is upheld for the murder of American citizens in Mexico by a mere protest and a demand that criminals of that country be brought to justice. If the Washington government is not going to protect American lives in Mexico it should at once make this announcement so that Americans could get out of that country. Doubtless Ameri-

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try. Organized labor virtually says that it is in sympathy with anarchy. And we are inclined to believe that their protest is only a reflection of their true sympathies and character. Organized labor is not far removed from the anarchist bunch. They are headed break-neck speed in that direction, and in an event the Radicals were successful in this country in starting a revolution organized labor would join them almost to a man. When a man or an organization alines themselves along with criminal they are as a rule criminals themselves at heart.

At the Jackson Day Dinner in Washington last week, William Jennings Bryan and President Wilson split in their views on the League of Nations. The President in his letter to the diners, went on record as favoring taking the matter into politics and making it an issue in the present presidential campaign, standing for a full and complete ratification of the amendment. Mr. Bryan stands for ratification with reservations, and suggests that it would be a crime against civilization to force another wait of fourteen months as a result of taking the question into politics. Mr. Bryan endorses the League as a whole and compliments President Wilson in his splendor did work, but says that if we can't get the League ratification just as we would like we should accept the Republican views of the situation and go ahead and ratify the treaty. He further says that if Congress has the right to end it and pass on the terms bringing about this peace. Without detracting from President Wilson's great work we think Mr. Bryan's position is correct. The President has done all he can do, and if a majority of Congress does not see the matter as he does, then he should accept the verdict of this peace making body. What the world wants is peace, whether it is the kind we want, yet peace is the one thing that will check the spread of Bolshevism in Europe and radicalism in this country. It would be a crime against civilization to force the world to wait another fourteen months

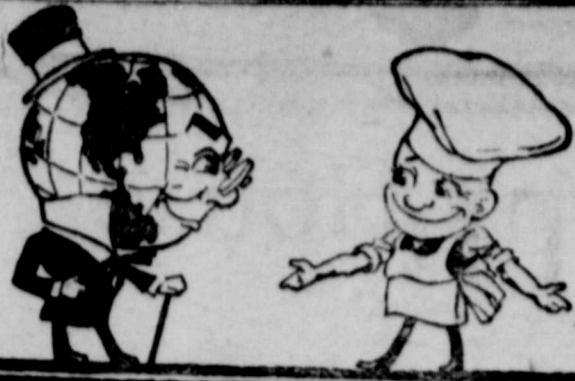

grand-stand. The Hunt county man
is about as much an extremist as the
former Senator. Bailey has come
back into Texas and will doubtless en-
deavor to be made governor, and from
the governor's office he will try to go
to the United States Senate. Looney
wants to be governor, and from govern-
or he will doubtless want to go
on up higher. Its the way of all of
them.

The Houston Post neatly refutes
the arguments of Joe Bailey when
he dwelt upon the cost of state govern-
ment now and during the time of
Sul Ros. Most of the money we pay
for taxes goes to schools. We are
taking better care of our sick and in-
sane, and in a thousand ways we have
a far better government than we had
in the early days. And the difference
in cost should not be compared in dol-
lars, which have greatly depreciated,
but in labor. While it took the value
of 60,000 bales of cotton to run Texas
under Ross it took only 70,000 bales
to pay the expense of the Hobby ad-
ministration, an expense divided a-
mong three times as many people.—
Quanah Tribune-Chief.

We wish to say as comment that
Senator Bailey was not far from
wrong in his comparison, not that we

are defending Bailey in his political
aspirations. We are not a Bailey
man. The appropriation for state
government for the year 1920-21 is
nineteen million dollars. There were
no such figures as these in Ross' day,
population considered. The difference
in governmental expense today and in
the days of Ross, Hogg, et al we are
a government of commissions and
boards. In those days legislatures
were conservative in appropriations,
today new Departments are created,
new salaries fixed, with a long string
of incidental expenses attached to the
office. In those days our government
was stationary, today it is on wheels.
According to the figures contained in
the appropriation bill for 1920-21 the
traveling expenses of the various de-
partments will total nearly a half
million dollars. Texas is too big for
one thing for economical administra-
tion of government affairs, and there
are too many people living off the gov-
ernment for another thing. Let's
divide Texas. You can count us in.

MRS. H. T. OWEN KILLED IN ACCIDENT LAST NIGHT

Mrs. Horace T. Owens was fatally
injured last night about 5:30 when
she fell from a bundle wagon on the
highway near the Owen home north-
west of Floydada four miles, sustain-
ing internal injuries from which she
died within a few minutes after she
was brought to Floydada.

Funeral arrangements had not been
settled this morning at 10:30, but will
be held tomorrow afternoon or Sat-
urday afternoon. The body is being
held awaiting the arrival of her father,
G. W. Davis, of Lubbock and her
brothers, S. L. Davis, of Prescott,
Ariz., and Orville Davis, of Amarillo.
The first and last mentioned of these
should reach Floydada this afternoon.
The Arizona brother cannot reach
this place before Friday, however,
and it will possibly be Saturday after-
noon.

Besides these relatives Mrs. Owen
is survived by her husband and two
little sons, 5 and 3 years old. The
body is being held at the home of Mr.
and Mrs. C. W. Mitchell on West
California Street.—Hesperian.

COUNTY AGENT ACTIVITIES

The county agent has been busy the past few weeks in organizing the boys of the schools into pig, sheep, grain, sorghum and cotton clubs. The following schools have been visited, all but one of which responded with enthusiasm: Center, Fairview, Campbell, Lakeview, Floydada, Pleasant Valley, Muncy, Irick, Meteor, Sandhill and Harmony. The storm interrupted visits to the schools in the north end of the county, but these will be organized very soon.

Stock raising appeals to the greatest number of boys this year, most of them enrolling for pig club work. A great many of them have already secured registered pigs, and many more are looking for good gilts. Improvement in the quality of the hogs of this country can be effected most quickly through the efforts of the pig club boys, both because they serve as a constant source of supply of good breeding animals and because their success is a striking demonstration to the farmers of what good breeding and care will do. The exhibit of fine hogs at the Fair next fall is expected to be a great advance over last year, because of the great interest taken by boys in hog raising.

One of the features of the work this year will be a sheep club provided arrangements can be made soon enough to start each boy off with two bred ewes. The contest would be to see which boy could raise the best pair of lambs at the least cost, counting in labor feed for ewes and lambs, wool, etc. Bob Smith of Floydada has made a special offer of a prize to the boy that can make the best showing from two of his ewes, the offer to hold if enough boys accept the challenge.

The county agent is preparing a series of club reading lesson for the use of the boys in each general line of work, namely: pig club, sheep club, grain and sorghum club, and cotton club. The readings are written especially for the needs of Floyd county boys and will, when completed, constitute a simple course of instructions in the various lines. These readings will be mailed regularly to every boy. It is believed that this is the only county in Texas where a complete reading course is offered club members and it is expected to prove a success.

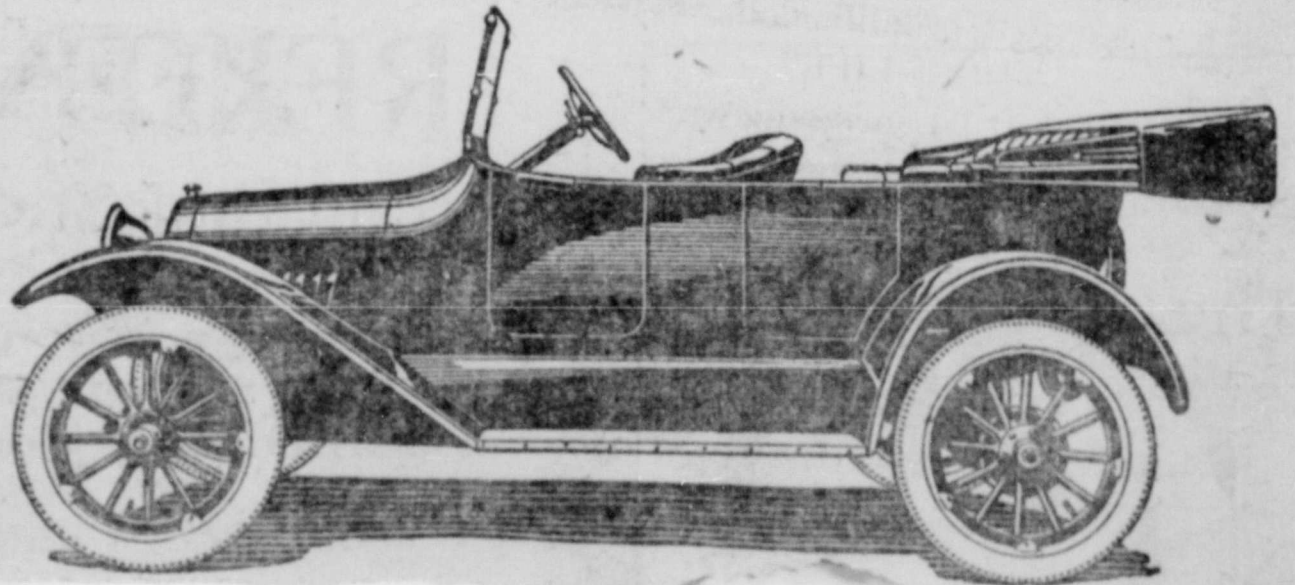

"Except for the interruptions of strikes," says Mr. France Baker, President of the First National Bank, "business continues at the topnotch of activity.
