Work is well underway on the extension of the Floyd County Elevator. Mr. Burton Thornton, the manager, now has a force of men at work on the building. They are doubling their stor age capacity also, and will have a combined storage of 33,000 bushels.



KEEPING SEED PURE

The time has come when we must give more attention to the kinds of seed we plant. Unless we are to depend on others who breed seed and sell them to us, it would pay us to begin this year with the best seed we can buy and endeavor to keep them pure and improve them.

If you have good corn, cotton, grain sorghums, peas, soy beans, peanuts or in fact any good field seed to begin with, it would pay you to begin in a systematic way to improve these seed or at least keep them pure. To do this you might plant a seed plat where the crop will not mix with other varieties and kinds, then select the best from this seed plat to use for your seed next year. By doing this a few years, you can hand pick the seed, tak ing such specimens as promise most for your seed plat the next year. Then the general crop from this seed plat will be pure and worth planting in

You will find this interesting work and the best constructive farm work you can do. So many interesting things will appear as to the variations of the plants in the seed plat and the possibilities of greater production will be so great that you will never regret the work and worry, if there should be any worry, in doing this work.- Farm

W. B. Yeary, Cotton Marketing Speci alist of the State Department of Agriulture has returned to Austin from an extended trip of inspection and investigation of cotton conditions over the state, and finds general disatisfaction among the farmers and business men as to grade and price placed on the cotton by the buyers. Mr. Yeary states that "While the general market price is at the top for the season at interior points, the prices offered, generally speaking, are much below that paid for the staple in November. Men not satisfied with prices paid at home, have shipped to Houston and Galveston, receiving from \$25 to \$85 per bale more than it was offered at points of is classed two grades below the actual grade; besides the price is cut heavily There are several Government graders claiming the staple around the former towns are shorter than at the latter:

Because of these conditions and a further fact that it is a strain on European customers to buy heary stocks of cotton which is costing them from 65 to 75 cents per pound for upland, as compared to 12 to 14 cents before the war when money was easy and plentiful and observing that spinners all over the world attempt to stay out of the markets as soon as they an get a few weeks supply, in an effort to lower the price. Mr. Yeary is convinced that the proper thing to do is:

Mr. Yeary says "some farmers and bankers have double 'wants' They want' to sell at once and 'want' the top price. They can get either of their wants' but not both. They can sell at once,' or rather give it away; or they can ignore any price below their own and get it in a few weeks or months. If they will systematically cease selling, 50 cents may look cheap for good cotton in a short time." This is why his advice is to "close up like a clam and let selling cease."

As to bollies and very low grades, they have no class or grade and can only be sold on type. They should be bulked, samples drawn and sent to the ports for bids. This is all any buyer can do, and the President of the local Farmers' Institute can do it as well as the buyer. Quit selling cotton now until you can get the price.

OLDEST UNIVERSITY IN STATE TO CELEBRATE 75TH ANNIVERSARY

The oldest educational institution in the state of Texas, Baylor University at Waco, is to celebrate its seventy-fifth anniversary at its commencement exercises, to be held in June. For several weeks now plans have been materializing to make this event in the educational history of the state one of the most unique celebrations ever staged. Invitations are being sent out to every student who ever attended Baylor, to return to his alma materical this occasion.

Ex-Tresident Taft to Be Present

Many prominent speakers will be present to speak, among them ex-President William Howard Taft. Secretary of the Navy Danlels has been appointed by President Wilson to act as his personal representative at the celebration. Among the noted preachers who will be commencement speakers are Dr. Geo. W. Truett, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dallas, and one of the most distinguished ministers in the United States; and Dr. Geo. W. McDaniel, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Richmond, Va.

Among the features of the diamond jubilee celebration will be the presentation of Bach's masterpiece. The Passion According to St. Matthew. To present this great musical program will require a massed chorus of five hundred voices, and it will be the first time in the history of the South that a college or university has attempted to give The Passion.

Other preparations include the erection of a huge rustic arbor which will seat 10,000 people. A staff of trained newspaper men will be present at the celebration to cover all the program, and from these reports a book reciting the history of the occasion will be published.

BRITISH PREMIER CANNOT VISIT AMERICA THIS YEAR

David Lloyd George, British Premier, who was invited to attend the annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Washington next May will not be able to attend the meeting, according to a letter to Dr. J. B. Gambrell of Fort Worth, who is the president of the Southern Baptist Convention. At the last meeting of the convention in Atlanta last year, the body of 4200 Baptists voted to invite the distinguished premier to visit America during the meeting of its next session at Washington, Dr. Gambrell was appointed to head the committee which sent the invitation. In reply Lloyd George wrote as follows:

"I shall be grateful if you will kindly convey to the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention my sincere thanks for their kind invitation to me to be present at the convention which is to meet this year in Washington. I should cordially welcome such an opportunity of meeting my fellow Baptists in America and of paving tribute to their devotion to those principles which are essential in the life of the community. The cordial relations which have for many years existed between your great country and the British Empire, and which have been considerably strengthened by their common experiences during the last five years of struggle and turmoil, are full of promise for the future. It would give me great pleasure to visit the United States, but I very much regiet that the damands upon my time are such as to make it impossible for me to promise to visit your convention this year."

BAPTIST CAMPAIGN WILL EMPHASIZE EVANGELISM

The new campaign which the Baptists of the state are to conduct during the next sixty days will emphasize the winning of souls, according to a statement issued by Dr. F. S. Groner, of Dallas, the general secretary of the Baptist Executive Board. Though an effort will be made during the latter part of April to increase the subscriptions to the 75 millions, the effort will largely be confined to churches that were not reached in the other campaign, and the evangelistic feature of the campaign will be stressed.

Simultaneous revival campaigns in the larger cities in which all the churches will conduct 'heir meetings at the same time, are planned during the next two months. "The campaign for the 75 million was a glorious success," continued Dr. Groner in his interview. "More than ninety million: was subscribed, and with this en tempt to reach \$160,000,000. How ever, this effort to reach this huge sum will not in any way interfere with the main object of the campaign to reach the unevangelized of the state. It is planned that in the period of March and April, every church of the cities and larger towns will hold special revival meetings The smaller churches of the country will probably prefer to hold their evangelistic services in the summer and early fall. To meet this preference, the summer months of 1920 were designated for the evangelistie period for the smaller churches."
