Mr. Alexander also was directed to transmit his findings to the Georgia Commissioner of Agriculture and Georgia State Bureau of Markets.



RLOAD EGGS SENT FROM PLAINVIEW TO CUBA

Piainview, March 30.—The Panhandle Produce Company of this city ship ped a full carload of eggs to Havana, Cuba, Wednesday morning of last week. This is the second car of eggs to be shipped directly from this city to Cuba. The order for the car was received on Tuesday and on Wednesday morning the car was cleared from the local vards.

Three years ago 643 cases of eggs were shipped from Plainview by freight and express. Two years ago nearly 6,000 cases were so forwarded. Last year over 12,000 cases were shipped by freight alone. This year the shipments have been much heavier and it is predicted that fully 25,00 cases will go forward from this point.
