





DIVORCE QUESTION BEING DISCUSSED AT CONVENTION

Washington, May 17 .- Moving pie tures, lax laws and intemperance are damed for the numerous divorces in the United States by the committee of temperance and social service in its report to the Southern Baptist' convention today. Enactment of a uniform code or of marriage and divorce laws are recommended as a remedy. Quoting from government statistics

number of divorces obtained an country, the report shows 916, when the last figures were there were 112.036 divorces. were later figures available, the report continues, "the picture doubtless would be darker, though certainly this would be true of 1919 owing to the large number of hasty and foolish marraiges contracted during the war."

Liquor has been one prolific cause of divorce, according to the report, but this cause is now removed, it says, "if we shall demand the enforcement of the law.'

Laxness of the laws of marriage and divorce is unquestionally one of the most fruitful causes and prevalent and growing divorce evil." the report states, emphasizing the need of better laws regulating marriage. Many of the marriage and divorce laws of the state are described as "foolishly absurd.'


Amendment to the constitution to give the federal government, control over the matter is suggested, but owing to the time this would require legislative enactment in the several states is recommended in the meantime

The beginning of the end of the Villa Zapata party as a military power folowed swiftly the heavy defeats of Vila by General Alvaro Obregon, Villa was forced to give up Torren and concentrate his dwindling forces in North ern Chihuahua and Eastern Sonora. making occasional forays and raids which culminated in the attack on Columbus, N M., that resulted in the nvasion of Mexican territory by Gen eral Pershing.

In the diplomatic exchanges that ensned between President Wilson and Carranza, who had been officially recognized as the head of the de facto government by the United States in October 1915, he insisted on the respect by the United States of Mexico's overeignty and the concession to his government of reciprocal rights of invasion. He maintained his position despite the crisis caused by the clashs between Mexican and American oldiers at Parral and Carrizal, but when war seemed unavoidable Carranza succeeded in stemming the tide by his proposal for the appointment of a joint commission to settle the difficul ties amicably. The proposal was ac cepted by President Wilson and the deliberations of the commission result ed in the withdrawal of the American army and the restoration of friendly relations between the two countries In the meantime Carranza had called a constitutional congress, which ac cepted most of the reforms he outlined On March 11, 1917, he was elected More than 1,500,000 votes were cast for him. "Madero's revolution was political." Carranza is quoted as having said. Mine is a social one.

Born of parents in comfortable circumstances in Cuatro Cienagas, state of Coahuila, Dec. 29, 1859, Venustiano Carranza was educated in the public schools of his native state and later studied law at the Mexican capital. When he was admitted to the bar however, affection of the eyes prevented him from practicing and he return ed to his native state to become a rancher. His experiences as a rancher first, then as judge, senator and finally governor of Coahuila, made Carranza familiar with the agrarian problem, the root of political unrest in Mexico. Having defied Huerta, Carranza callied a small band of 600 followers. which grew into a sizable army when he won the support of Francisco Villa. influence spread rapidly. he military victories of his chief aid. Villa, rallying the various factions of Northern Mexico around his banner. For a time however, real progress was slow. Huerta's machinations had embroiled Mexico with the United States and intervention seemed imminent. The killing of W. S. Benton, a British subject, by a staff officer of Villa, further complicated the situation.

Then came Villa's victory at Torreon, the first real success of the war Carranza was presseing Huerra hard when the A-B-C conference to discuss the differences between the United States and Huerta was called in Buffalo. General Carranza refused to sus pend hostilities and declined to abide by the result of those diplomatic negotiations. The fighting went on with the result that General Huerta resigned the provisional presidency July 15, 1914, and a month later General Carrauza made his triumphal entry into Mexico City. Huerta in the meantime having fied to Spain.

Shortly afterward independent revolutionists led by Zapata, General Pascual Orozco and others, commenced. Dissension between Villa and Carranza, which began at the Torreon conference reached a climax Sept. 23, 1914, when Villa declared war on Carranza. General Alvaro Obregon became Carranza's leading general. The Villa generals met at Agucal-



THE rapidly increasing popularity of closed cars of Oakland character is strong proof of the comfort, convenience, and practical everyday utility of this type of car. These features in unusual measure, due to advanced design and correct construction, typify the Oakland Sensible Six Sedan.

The highly developed design of the Oakland Sedan provides for a long wheelbase, long springs, and a low center of gravity-factors which insure comfortable riding. The Oakland standard practice of placing the body directly upon the frame side members and he use of long, semi-elliptic springs which ride almost flat, eliminates the sensation of top-heaviness often experienced while riding in many closed CRTS.

The resulting low center of gravity makes the Oakland Sedan ride steadily and smoothly at all speeds. There is no side sway and the car handles easily in heavy traffic or on the open road, up hill or down.

Another advantage of the low placement of the body is found in the ease with which passengers may enter or leave the car. The running boards are broad and low and it is but a short step from them nto the car through the wide, free-swinging doors. Ladies and elderly persons especially appreciate these features whch add so much to the pleasure of motor travel.

Still another feature of the akland four-door Sedan which has caused many buyers to select it in preference to higher priced cars is the unexpected roominess, both in size and width of seats and in the front-to-rear roominess of the body.

Ample inside capacity is secured by the compact motor design and the use of very long springs which allow a greater body length on the 115-inch Oakliand wheelbase than is possible with the shorter frame and shorter springs used in many cars of even greate wheelbase.

A half turn of the window regulators opens or closes the four door windows easily and quickly. An easily regulated heater keeps the interior warm on cold days and avoids the necessity of heavy wraps. Silk roller curtans afford and additional sense of privacy and protection and a dome light provides interior illumination when needed.
