BILLION DOLLARS FOR YEAR

Washington, June 14.—Approxima tely five billion dollars was approriated by the sixty-sixth congress at ts session ending June 5, according to a statement prepared today by Chairman Good of the house appropriations committee for the final issue of the congressional record. The exact total as given by Mr. Good was \$4,859,800,327 of this \$4,373,395,279 is for government expenses in the fiscal year beginning on July 1, and \$486,495.048 is to meet the deficiency for the fiscal year ending with this month.

Chairman Good said congress had reduced estimates of government departments for next year by \$1,474.422, 602, the total appropriations in only two of measures exceeding the estimates. Congress added \$64,120,000 to the pension bill and \$70,861,000 to the postal bill. The latter increase was to meet advances in pay to postal employes while the pension increase was obsorbed in part by increased pen-

PASSED AT SPECIAL SESSION

thirty bills of a general nature were enacted into laws during the special ssion of the Thirty-sixth Legislature which adjourned sine die today, although 310 bills were introduced during the session, 200 in he House and 110 in the Senate. With the exception of the thirty general measues all others were of a local nature.

The two measures of greatest im potance were the pink boll worm and the one making an appropriations of \$4,000,000 for the public schools of Texas for the next fiscal year. The Legislature in fact dealt liberally with the educational interests of Texas, hav ing also passed a bill appropriating \$1,057,000 for the educational institutions for their emergency needs. Meas ures were enacted inceasing the salaries of county school superintendents approxmitely 50 per cent and teachers over 30 per cent, also authorizing recipocity with other states in granting certificates and emphasizing professional training.

Sheriff's Get Raise.

Sheriffs of Texas were granted an ncrease of slightly over 50 per cent in fees, also allowed additional compensa ion for ex-officio services, while deputy county officials were granted an increase of \$25 per month in the counties of Dallas, Tarrant, Travis, Bexar, El Paso and McLennan. Salaries of Bexar, Harris counties were granted an increase from \$2,000 to \$2,700 a
