TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES

The Beacon is pleased to state that the shipping facilities is greatly reliev ed, and cars have been coming to handle this and last year's crops in numbers to enable the shipment of quite a lot of grain. Nothing like a normal situation has been reached, or anything nearing that point, yet the cars received and loaded out from this point is a large improvement over the stagnated situation that existed here and elsewhere a few weeks ago. The situation is yet to be remedied before we can look foward to the time when we can market this year's crop speedily.

It is estimated that it will take 1000 cars to handle this year and last year crop, and the rate the cars are coming in it will be a long time before all of same has been placed on the market. However, we believe that all is being done that can be done to relieve the situation when we take into consideration the general car shortage through out the country, and the great increase in our commerce.

Compensation of Publie Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive a compensation for their services a salary, the amount of which, the terms and methods of payent and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascerfined, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Legislature may make such xeeptions as it may deem advisable.

This section shall supersede all othr provisions of this constitution fixing hereunder. and declaring the compensation of offi eers by salary, fees or otherwise and all provisions for salaries or other com ensation for public officials, executive, gislative or judicial



SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation there

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3. One-fourth + of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of this state between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the lo cal notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may be embrace parts of of two or more counties. And the legis lature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public or schools of such districts, whether such district are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts here tofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax here in authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting eparate and independent school dist general or special law ricts, nor to indepednent or common special law.


