#### MOTOR TRUCKS HAVE A LOGICAL PLACE ON MANY FARMS





Austin, Sept. 4 .- A 500 pound bale of cotton, worth \$150 at thirty cents a ound, if made into Valenciennes lace, of the most expensive forms in which cotton is used, would be worth \$3,000,000, according to an estimate by officials of the Texas Bureau of Markets and Warehouse

The same bale made into baby ribon would be worth \$1,500 at the prevailing prices. Made into ginghams it vould bring \$730 at the mills, and as heesecloth, the cheapest product of the om, would be worth \$1.10 a pound. It was pointed out, however, that the

grade of cotton used to make cheesecloth now sells on the market at about fifteen cents a pound.



GAS FROM CORN COBS MAY TAKE PLACE OF GASOLINE

Weshington, Sept. 5.-Gas, made from corncobs may soon light the home cook the food and run the engines of American farmers. Department of Agriculture scientists, it was announce ed today, are experimenting with the manufacture of such gas.

The experiments have been ful enough to warrant their continua tion, as the gas, which was made from wheat, oats and rye straw by a process of destructive distillation, used for cooking, lighting and run an automobile

Price engineer in charge of the net development work, a subdivis of the bureau of chemistry, design ed to belp commercial and industrial new processes and disthe bureau, has Jr., in charge of oparatus at Arlington. The work can be carried on but slow owing to the limited supply availresent, but it planned to do uch to determine the quantity and na ure of gas that may be obtained from traws, conrstalks, cobs and other vege able matter usually burned as waste





WOMEN IN PANTS

The time has come when a good many women and girls are donning the style of dress which properly belongs exclusively to men and boys, and going forth to work or play. The writer recognizes the fact that, in discussing this subject, he s apt to expose himself to the wrath of some of the fair sex whose friendliness he sincerely desires to retain unimpaired. This article is not written in the spirit of harsh criticism but rather for the purpose of suggesting a few things for consideration. Come, kind friends, lut us sit down and reason together about this matter. In the very beginning the writer admits that Texas has no law against the practice. Why should such a law e necessary? There is, however, a moral law against it, which is as folows: The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, neither shall a man put on a womans garment for all that do so are an abomination to the Lord thy God." (Deut. 22:5). Thus the all-wise Father, infinite in wisdom, justice and goodness lays down a very important rule for the guidance of both sexes in this very mportant matter of dress. Certainly there is a good and sufficient reason for this. Let us look at it.

In the first place the practice has a strong tendency to draw the woman down from her high social plane to the common level occupied by men. The line of distinction is no onger clearly drawn. It adds a touch of coarseness which will inevitably grow and intensify as the years go Women and girls thus attired are certain to be exposed to coarse and immoral conditions and influences. They will very often see things they ought not to see, and hear things they ought not to hear for the imple reason that the sex is not readly recognizable.

Thisnaturally and unavoidably brings about a familiarity and coarseness of manner and speech between boys and giria and men and women. Any thoughtful person can readily see the drift of this whole matter, so clearly foreseen by our most benificent Father thousands of years ago.

In this, as in almost any other case, I think some reasonable and just exceptions may be made. For instance, when a woman is doing farm work, handling machinery, such as might entangle her skirts and cause serious injury to her person, she may be readly excused for donning trousers. In such a case, however, she is in a large measure in private; she is in the field away from the public, and usually in ompany with members of her own family. Even this practice, while evidently, should be carefully guarded ; for, as we all know, such practice is apt to become a fad and rapidly grow into popularity. Such a fashion would certainly deal a serious blow to good morals



#### SUFFICIENT CARS TO MOVE THE GRAIN CROP

The Panhandle-Plains country should recieve enough cars within the next week or so to move a large part of the grain crop." declared J. W. Mulhern of the Car Service Department of the Interstate Commerce Commission in a brief conference Friday with Congressman Marvin Jones and Secretary F. R. Jamison of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Mulhern is direct from the port of Galveston en route to his home at Seattle, Wash., and stopped off at the Fort Worth and Denver Station to confer with Amarillo men.

Twenty-six ships are now in port at Galveston and 4,600,000 bushels of grain will be moved from there this week according to Mr. Mulhern There are more than 2,500 cars of grain in the Galveston Railroad yards and they are being unloaded and released at the rate of 410 cars a day. The maximium port capacity is 425 cars and the unloading crews are working almost to the limit of capa-

city. Mr. Mulhern declared that he be lieved the embargo situation is permanently relieved and that no difficulty will be experienced in getting the grain through the port with reasonable dispatch. He says that the officials in charge of the Car Service hand and there should be no reason

for an extreme car shortage. The car service official is very much interested in this section of the country and was very solicitious as to the

condition of the grain crops and the service being rendered to the Panhandle-Plains country .- Amarillo Tribune.
