

CONVICTS IN STATE PEN DE-CREASE 58, ESCAPES TOTAL 33

Austin, Oct. 21.—Convicts in the State penal institutions decreased in number fifty-eight during September. The total number on October 1 was 2.606, as compared with 2.664 on September 1.

During September thirty-six convicts were pardoned and sixty-eight wew convicts were received. Of these Harris County contributed twelve, which is the highest number of any one county. Grayson was second with seven, while Dallas and Tarrant each contributed six. None were from Bexar

County.

Twenty-one convicts were recaptufed, fifty-nine discharged, thirty-three
escaped, six returned from parole and
five died.



CABLED PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographs have been successfuly cabled across the Atlantic. The first pictures actually transmitted probably those taken in New York of the recent international yacht race and reproduced a few hours later in a London newspaper. There are several methods of transmitting photographs by wire and even by wireless electricity, but the system followed in cabling the yacht pictures is probably the best. The negative containing the photographs is "coded" or prepared for transmission by an inginious device which reduces the picture to an arbles an ordinary cable code and can be transmitted as such. This message can be handed into a telegraph office for transmission like any other mes writer and is in turn reproduced by series of holes in a long tape. The machine with an undeveloped plate is placed in a developing bath which reproduces the original picture in every detail. Some details are lost in the sending, but it is promised that the machine will soon be perfected, and long distance transmission of photographs will be commonplace.-October


