

31 arrested in racing operation

A raid on an illegal horse racing operation in northern Castro County resulted in 31 arrests Sunday afternoon.

Sheriff CD Fitzgerald said a multi-agency law enforcement group executed a search warrant on the operation, located two miles east of Summerfield and a little over a mile south on the southeast corner of the intersection of County Road 504 and County Road 602.

A total of 27 law enforcement officers participated in the raid, including members of the Castro County Sheriff's Dept., Earth Police Dept., Hale County Sheriff's Dept., Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and the US Immigration and Naturalization Service's Border Patrol. Also included were members of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety Narcotics Service and Intelligence Service and the Highway Patrol. K-9 units (dogs) from the Littlefield Police Dept., Oldham County Sheriff's Dept., and the Panhandle Regional Narcotics Task Force were also on hand.

An estimated 350 persons were on the premises of the horse racing arena when law officers closed in, according to Fitzgerald. He said that attendance at the racing events had reached as high as 1,500 to 2,000. All 350 persons were screened for possible law violations and for outstanding arrest warrants.

One suspect, a 43-year-old Hereford man, remained in jail Wednesday under \$750 bond on Class A misdemeanor charges of evading arrest or detention. Two other men were released on \$750 bond each on Monday. Of the two, a 36-year-old Dimmitt man was charged with unlawful carrying of a weapon; and a Friona man, 24, was arrested on an outstanding warrant for violation of probation on an original charge of DWI.

Three additional arrests were expected late Tuesday or sometime Wednesday. Also, 25 of those netted in the raid were taken to Lubbock to face various immigration law violations. Other offenses charged against the

suspects included illegal operation of a racing facility, unlawful sales of alcohol in a dry area, possession of illegal drugs, and unlawful carrying of a weapon. The charges will go before the grand jury and district court in Castro County.

The illegal racing operation first came to the attention of the Sheriff's Dept. through a caller complaining about a dangerous situation involving children.

Fitzgerald said the execution of the search warrant culminated an eight-week investigation by undercover officers from multiple law enforcement agencies.

"Our number one priority was to close it down, and we've done that," Fitzgerald said.

Dimmitt to graduate 86 seniors tonight

Dimmitt High School will graduate 86 seniors tonight (Thursday) during commencement exercises at 8 p.m. in the DHS Auditorium.

Admission to the ceremony is by ticket only, according to school officials. And for the first time this year, the ceremony will be televised in the school's cafeteria, but admission to this also is by ticket.

Dwight Joiner and the Methodist Bell Choir, under the direction of Gainelle Minnick, will perform the processional.

Tisha Rice will offer the invocation, then Shad McDaniel will deliver the salutatory address and Nikki Kenley will give the valedictory address.

I Will Remember You, will be the special music performed by Kenley. Recognition of scholarship awards will be directed by Principal R.L. Stockstill.

Supt. Bob Barrett will present the class for graduation and seniors will receive their diplomas from John Nino, president of the school board.

Denicia Barrios will offer the invocation and Joiner will perform the recessional.

A drug-free graduation party will be held for Dimmitt seniors tonight (Thursday) beginning at 11 p.m.

The party will be open to members of the senior class and their guests. Tickets will be \$10 per couple and are available at the Dimmitt High School principal's office.

The party will be held from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. at the Expo Building in Dimmitt.

Miller named superintendent

Les Miller, 35, Principal of Dimmitt's Richardson Elementary School, has been selected as the new superintendent for DISD.

Miller was hired on a unanimous vote of the school board Monday night following interviews with the three candidates for the position. He will begin his duties July 1, when resigning Supt. Bob Barrett leaves to take a position with the Anahuac ISD in southeast Texas.

"I want to commend the board for their decision to fill this position from within the local system," Miller said. "I feel it shows a commitment to the teachers, faculty and administrators of DISD. It shows that a person can move up within the local system."

"I am very pleased that I have been selected," Miller said. "It has been my goal since I was in college to be a superintendent, and I have been able to fulfill that goal. I am really tickled that it was all able to take place in Dimmitt. I consider

this home, and I'm not planning on leaving."


Miller said, "I have grown up professionally in this town," adding that his first teaching job after he completed college was as a third grade teacher at Richardson, a position he held for five years. He was named principal at Richardson seven years ago.

A native of Las Vegas, N.M., Miller graduated from high school there in 1975. He obtained his bachelor's degree from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales in 1981 and received his master's degree there in 1985.

"He has done a good job here," Barrett said, "and he has the qualities that made him a good principal and that will make him a good superintendent."

Bennett to be ASCS state director

Hart farmer Harold Bob Bennett has been appointed the new state executive director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

Bennett's appointment was announced last Thursday by Sen. Bob Krueger (D-Texas); US Rep. Kika de la Garza (D-Mission), who is chairman of the House Agriculture Committee; and US Reps. John Bryant (D-Dallas) and Bill Sarpa (D-Amarillo).

Bennett will be moving to College Station (where the state ASCS headquarters is located) and will begin his new duties Tuesday. His wife, Ruth, and daughter, Shea, aren't sure if they will move to College Station right away, or if they will remain in Hart until Shea graduates in two years.

Ruth is a fifth grade teacher at

Dimmitt Middle School and Shea will be a junior at Hart High School this fall.

"The decision has not been made, yet, on whether Ruth and Shea will stay here or move," Bennett said.

Should his family decide to stay in Hart, Bennett said he will "commute" between College Station and Hart.

"I'll be able to come in on weekends or at least every other weekend and I plan to maintain my farming interests here, so I'll have to come back, regardless," Bennett said.


During his absence, Bennett said his two brothers will run the family's farming operation, which includes about 4,500 acres of farmland, some grassland and some cattle.

"My family has been very supportive in helping me reach the decision to accept the appointment," Bennett said. "Without their support, I couldn't have pursued this. I know it's going to cause them some hardship, especially with running the family business."

Bennett feels his farming experience was one factor in his earning the appointment, along with his experience working as Amarillo District Director for Texas Dept. of Agriculture (TDA), his work with the Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) and his membership on the Democratic National Committee.

He is a graduate of Hart High School and he attended Texas Tech University. He has been farming since 1970, and he also has served

Two retiring from cafeterias

Billie Moyers and Lucille Odom, both of Dimmitt, are retiring this year from service with the school cafeterias in Dimmitt.

Moyers said she began working part-time for the elementary-middle school cafeteria in 1966, when her son was 6. She said she liked the hours because it worked out for her to be home when her son got out of school.

Odom said she also started in 1966, working as a substitute on a part-time basis in both the high school and elementary-middle school cafeterias. For the last 10 years, she has worked full-time at the high school.

The ladies said the main change they have noticed over the years has been an increase in the number of children.

The elementary cafeteria averages about 335 at breakfast and 950 at lunch (including adults), according to Moyers. She said she sits at the cash register during the breakfast run and gets a chance to visit with some of the students.

"When the children see me around town, they always wave and say hi," Moyers said.

Moyers said she remembers when students used to help in the cafeteria to earn their lunch, but added that the free lunch program did away with that.

Other changes through the years include all of the new equipment at

the elementary cafeteria. Moyers also noted that the children seem to be showing fewer manners than children did a few years back.

Odom said that she has noticed the high school students are more polite than the younger students. She added that she enjoys seeing the students every day.

"I know a lot of faces, but not all the names," Odom said. "The kids do smile at me when they see me around town."

The two women said they have enjoyed working with the teachers, who have been "very cooperative and pleasant to work with." They said they have also enjoyed working with the three supervisors they have served under and have gotten along well with the other lunch-room workers.

Odom told about humorous incidents that happened during her days on the job. She said too much salt was added to the cornbread one time, and another time the baking powder was left out. She also told about her only on-the-job injury—a cut to her finger last year that required three stitches.

Moyers told about a co-worker who mistakenly put Worcestershire sauce in a cake mix instead of vanilla, and the whole recipe had to

be poured out. She said the second time around, the oil was forgotten, and the batter had to be discarded again.

Moyers recalled when she was new in the cafeteria she was assigned the job of putting sugar into shakers for students to sprinkle on their rice, but she mistakenly filled them with salt.

Odom said that she has seen a lot of nieces and nephews, as well as some of her grandchildren, go through the cafeteria lines during her years of service. Her retirement plans include having the grandkids over regularly and being with her husband, M.B., a retired farmer.

Moyers said her grandchildren haven't started school yet. She plans to spend part of her retirement time babysitting her grandkids, doing a little bit of traveling and "fussing" with her husband, Bill, a retired brick layer.

AQE plan gaining support

The Alliance for Quality Education (AQE), a statewide coalition of businesses and individuals, recently proposed that the school funding crisis in Texas can be and should be solved with a broader-based business tax.

Under the AQE plan, approximately 80% of the proceeds generated by expanding the business tax base would be constitutionally dedicated to funding the public schools.

The alliance's proposed solution obviously is gaining momentum and acceptance among the general public.

Results of a statewide opinion survey released recently indicate that nearly 75% of those contacted support spreading the business tax load to firms that are now exempt.

The survey, conducted March 1-3 by The Tarrance Group, polled 1,000 Texas households to determine the level of community support for solving Texas' school funding problem by expanding the tax load to cover companies that aren't paying into the system now.

AQE's Business Plan to Support Schools replaces two taxes that do not work in the modern Texas economy with a comprehensive tax that does.

The two taxes to be replaced—the business property tax for schools and the franchise/earned surplus tax—

each suffer from an inability to effectively tax all of the state's businesses. Some do not pay a full share for schools, according to Russell C. Poole of Dallas, AQE member and tax attorney for ARCO Oil and Gas Co.

As a result, says Mr. Poole, school districts and the state are limited in their ability to fund some needed programs. To remedy this inequity, the AQE-backed replacement tax would have all businesses pay in proportion to their business activity in Texas.

Almost three of four—74%—reported they would vote for a revised business tax system in the state so that "all businesses would pay a constitutionally dedicated tax to help fund public schools."

More than two-thirds of Democrats, Republicans, Independents and Perot supporters said they would vote for such a mandate. Meanwhile, 83% agreed that Texas businesses should help find a workable, doable and constitutionally acceptable solution to school finance.

One of the messages of this latest survey—results of which are accurate within a tolerance of plus or minus 3.5%—suggests that Texans are ready to support the AQE concept, if lawmakers will just place it on the legislative front burner for a full and impartial public airing of its merit and potential.

GUN CONTROL IS NOT THE ANSWER

Washington, D.C. is where much of our nation's history is made. This is also the city with the highest crime rate in the nation and the strictest gun control laws. If history is being made here, could it be that history is trying to tell us something?

How do we solve the problem of violent crime plaguing our great nation? Gun control is not the answer. The criminals will always find a way to bypass that system. I believe we need stiffer and surer punishment imposed on those convicted of crimes where firearms are used. We have got to be tough and enforce the laws that are already in existence.

It's obvious the criminal justice system isn't enough of a deterrent. Just read the paper or watch the evening news. Take a look at the large number of criminals being released from jail, only to commit another violent crime, many times taking away someone's precious life.

Why isn't jail something that criminals fear? Maybe jail has become the only place where criminals can feel at home. If that's the case, we've got to find a way to improve the penal system so that those who engage in a crime where a firearm is used are appropriately penalized.

While each state makes its own laws concerning the punishment for crimes, I hope Texas and other states will take a look at California's law concerning crimes committed with a firearm. In California, if a person uses a firearm in the commission of a felony, upon being convicted, that person would receive an enhanced jail sentence anywhere from three to five years. So if the normal punishment for

that crime was a 10-year jail term, the person could be sentenced to 15 years in prison. The California slogan "Use a gun, go to jail" really has teeth in it.

The Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act is one of several gun control bills that have been introduced in Congress again this year. I plan to oppose that bill along with all other gun control legislation. The Brady Bill would provide for a waiting period before a handgun is purchased, during which a criminal background check would be performed. Ultimately, this type of system would adversely affect only the sportsman, who owns a gun for recreational purposes. The criminals would purchase their firearms illegally, as most of them do already.

Several weeks ago I attended a hearing focusing on the increasing numbers of violent incidents involving children. One of the witnesses was an 18-year-old who had once fallen into the wrong crowd. The boy's only constant companion now is his wheelchair. Last summer, one of the teen's friends was killed and he was paralyzed following a drive-by shooting. He is now a member of a group called P.O.W.E.R., or People Opening the World's Eyes to Reality. The group hopes to warn children about the dangers of being involved with violent behavior.

I asked the teen if he had ever owned a gun, and his answer was no. I asked him if he could get one.

"Easily," he responded.

And then I asked this 18-year-old boy, who will spend the rest of his life in a wheelchair, "If we had a gun control law in this country where it was illegal, could you still get a gun?"

Without hesitation, this young man answered, "Yes."

Gun control clearly has not worked in the District of Columbia. Every day on the news I hear about another innocent human being whose life has been taken away by an unfeeling criminal with a gun. And we all know guns are not the only weapons used by criminals. Just as many people are injured or killed with knives, hammers, and other objects. So, would the killings stop if we outlawed knives and hammers? Let's start channelling our efforts to get at the real root of the problem. We don't need to control the guns, we need to control people who use them for illegal acts. The laws are there, they just need to be enforced.

Many times you hear about band-aid solutions to problems. I believe gun control would be the wrong medicine for the sickness. Instead, we should focus our attention on finding a cure for the disease, and I believe the right medicine is enforcing all of our current laws and making sure those convicted receive swift and sure punishment.

Stop lawsuit abuse

The Texas Chamber of Commerce has instituted a program statewide under the banner of Texans Against Lawsuit Abuse.

Billboards have been placed in strategic areas of the state, reading "Lawsuit Abuse! We All Pay, We All Lose."

"This is not attorney bashing," said Larry Milner, president of the Texas Chamber. "There is a small group of personal injury lawyers who are abusing the system. We have several attorneys on our board who came to us and said, 'You need to do something now.'"

"The basic problem is the mindset of the general public when they're sitting on a jury, they're giving away someone else's money. Why not let a large insurance company or utility or General Motors pay?" Milner said. "In fact, they're giving away our money, because we all pay in the form of higher premiums, loss of jobs and the additional cost of products."

The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce recently passed a motion to help educate the public about the lawsuit abuse problem.

Many Texas towns are setting up local campaigns similar to the state campaign.

"We want it (Texans Against Lawsuit Abuse) to be a major topic of discussion over coffee in Muleshoe, at the Petroleum Club in Houston and at the barber shop in Longview," Milner said. "When people are sitting on a jury, we want them to think about whether an award is really justified."

A Houston businessman, Willard Boss, said, "Even the plaintiffs' bar must understand they are killing the goose that laid the golden egg. If we don't all stand up and do something, we are going to totally destroy the

business community. There won't be any multi-million dollar judgments, not even legitimate ones, because all the companies with money will have checked out of Texas long ago."

The threat of costly lawsuits has had a chilling effect on the country's economic development and production.

A recent Conference Board survey of 3,600 Chief Executive Officers (CEOs) found that as a result of litigation fears:

- *47% of US manufacturers have withdrawn products from the market;
- *25% of US manufacturers have discontinued some form of product research; and,
- *Approximately 15% of US companies have laid off workers as a direct result of product liability experience.

Milner notes that Texas' litigious reputation hinders the state's economic development efforts.

Just as shoppers know where to find bargains, plaintiffs attorneys know which counties are most likely to render large jury awards. Counties in South and Southeast Texas have a long-standing reputation for having generous juries, and as a result, personal injury filings have increased at a faster rate in those counties.

Under current rules, plaintiffs have a great deal of leeway to select where their cases are filed and heard. In general, the suit must be filed in a county where the defendant has an agent or office, or where the plaintiff lives if the defendant is out of state.

Expand mandatory sentences

US Senator Phil Gramm has told the Senate he will introduce legislation to mandate life sentences for criminals with three convictions for drug felonies or violent crimes.

Meanwhile, attempts to soften sentencing for drug offenders are being mounted in the House of Representatives, apparently with support from the White House.

"There is talk in the House that they are going to move to eliminate minimum, mandatory sentencing," Gramm told the Senate. "I'd like to save them the time and effort and the energy."

"We will not repeal minimum, mandatory sentenc-

ing in the US Senate," he said. "I intend to do everything in my power to make sure that does not happen."

Noting an emerging Clinton Administration policy which apparently is designed to eliminate some mandatory sentences so people convicted of drug offenses can be released from prison, the senator said, "I think the way to deal with violent criminals is to put them in prison and keep them there for a long time."

"I do not understand priorities that cut prison construction by \$580 million at the same time that we're talking about letting drug thugs out of jail because we don't have room," he said.







So hair matters—just ask any woman. (Or any man with a rapidly expanding forehead, for that matter.)







OM team qualifies for World contest

The Dimmitt Middle School Odyssey of the Mind team is preparing to participate in the OM 1993 World Finals June 2-5, after winning first at the State OM contest.

The structure team, "Robin Wood and the Magical Widget," is comprised of Jeremy Matthews, David Terrell, Timothy Proffitt, Hank Morgan, Jared Townsend and Michael Keith. They are coached by Pat Keith and Wayne Proffitt.

More than 700 teams from almost every state of the US and several foreign countries are expected to compete at the World contest. With five to seven members per team, plus two coaches, that represents well over 2,000 participants, not including officials and observers.

The public is invited to view the performance portion of the contest for all teams. However, no observers are allowed at the spontaneous portion.

The event will be held at the University of Maryland College Park Campus, which is located near

Washington, D.C. Opening ceremonies will begin with teams parading into the arena waving state, country or school flags or banners. The final awards ceremony will be held June 5.

Part of the activities for team members will include sightseeing and tours.

At OM competitions, each team must present a solution to a "long-term" problem it has worked on during the school year and also must solve a "spontaneous" problem presented on the day of the competition.

The structure teams must build a structure of balsa wood that weighs no more than 18 grams, but that will hold more weights than any other team's structure.

The OM program began in 1978 with just 28 New Jersey schools participating. Its founder, Dr. Samuel Micklus, believes critical thinking and creative problem-solving skills are basic to how we live, and that those skills need to be nurtured.

AMP endows Cleveland Scholarship

American Maize-Products Dimmitt Inc. has added \$10,000 to its scholarship endowment at West Texas State University.

This endowment funds the second of four planned scholarships, which primarily benefit dependents of company employees.

Gary Thompson, director of operations for American Maize-Products also has announced that the new scholarship will be given in memory of former Dimmitt High School basketball coach Kenneth Cleveland, effective with the 1993-

94 school year.

"This new scholarship is given in memory of Coach Cleveland's dedication, leadership and influence on the youth of the area," Thompson said. "This scholarship will permanently be known as American Maize-Products Dimmitt Inc. Kenneth Cleveland Memorial Scholarship."

Cleveland was killed May 16 when he was struck by lightning at the Pendaries Golf Resort near Las Vegas, N.M. Cleveland had coached the Dimmitt Bobcats since

1961 and led the team to 27 district titles since that time. During his tenure, Cleveland's teams won 20 or more games in 29 seasons and won state championships in 1975, 1982 and 1983.

American Maize-Products Dimmitt originally constructed in 1970 by Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc. in 1984, American Maize-Products bought the plant and operated it as American Fructose, Dimmitt Inc. until February 1993 when it was merged into American Maize-Products Dimmitt Inc. The plant grinds 54,000 bushels of corn a day and the high fructose corn syrup produced by the facility is used by soft

drink bottlers as a sweetener.

"This second gift from American Maize-Products of Dimmitt Inc. represents a continuing commitment to education," said Betty Howell, executive director of development at WTSU. "We at West Texas State University appreciate their partnership in developing leadership for the future."

Royce Schulte, a junior agriculture business and economics major from Dimmitt, was recipient of the first scholarship in the fall of 1992. Announcement of the first recipient of the scholarship in memory of Cleveland will be made later in the summer.

on the TCPB since it was chartered. He worked for TDA for two years and has been executive assistant for the TCPB for the past 20 months. He also has served on various local, civic, church and school boards.

"We're all pleased that he (Bennett) is going to be our new state director," said Scotty Abbott, county executive director of ASCS.

"Having a farmer in there will be a benefit to all of agriculture. He's aware that programs are administered at the county level and he knows of problems we face," Abbott said. "I think it's a good idea that we're going to have a producer that's experienced some of the problems producers have had."

Bennett was first contacted about submitting an application for the ASCS state executive director's position last November, but says he wasn't interested at that time. He was approached again in January, but still declined the offer to submit an application.

Then in late January it was decided that the position would only be offered to someone not directly involved with ASCS operations. After that decision was made, Bennett again was asked to submit an application. This time he agreed.

"I didn't initially pursue this appointment because I'm totally happy doing what I'm doing—I enjoy farming and working for Texas Corn Producers," Bennett said. "That's one of the reasons I said no at first."

"When they decided to go outside the organization to hire a director, I thought I might as well try," Bennett said.

"I think this will be a great challenge. It will give me an opportunity to really have an impact on farm legislation. Hopefully that will be a favorable impact for Texas. It's going to be a real battle

with formation of the 1995 Farm Bill and reorganization of US Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) coming up."

As state executive director, Bennett will be responsible for planning, implementing and operating ASCS stabilization, conservation, environmental and emergency assistance programs within the state. He will act as the advocate and emissary of Sec. of Agriculture Mike Espy, and the administrator of ASCS at the state level.

"This is basically a job where I will be the (Clinton) Administration's farm spokesman for the state. That means I'll be a spokesman for the programs sent down to the state and also a spokesman for the state, taking requests back to Washington."

Bennett said he will have a hand in drawing up the 1995 Farm Bill and says that could be the biggest issue he'll face.

"We will be able to make recommendations (on provisions) on the '95 Farm Bill. I think the impact we'll have on it will be as important as anything we'll do. There are 49 or 50 state directors who will have input, and with Texas' size and farming industry, we're going to have a lot of opportunity to make our recommendations."

He said the challenge of being able to present some new ideas led him to accept the appointment.

"I want to see if I can make a difference. I hope to tap into the political power of the commodity groups in the state. We have got to use the power we have in Texas if we're going to have a positive influence on what goes into the 1995 Farm Bill."



Redistricting still snarled

Court fusses over advisors

Pct. 1 Commissioner Harold Smith tried to get the other commissioners to agree to dismiss Daugherty & Associates as the county's attorneys in the redistricting process and turn the job over to County Attorney Jerry Matthews and an employee of the US Justice Dept.

Smith's motion died for lack of a second.

The matter had been placed on the agenda of the Monday meeting of the Commissioners' Court.

In discussion of the matter, Smith said that a "Mr. Taylor," who is the "boss" of Chris Herrin, had agreed to work with the commissioners in modifying the current plan, which has been rejected by the Justice Dept. Herrin is the Justice Dept. reviewer who has been assigned to the Castro County redistricting plan.

County Judge Polly Simpson said that Virginia Daugherty of Daugherty & Associates plans to request that Herrin be dismissed as reviewer and that another reviewer be assigned. Simpson suggested that the commissioners authorize Daugherty to make the request and to seek Justice Dept. reconsideration of the rejected plan. No action was taken.

Simpson refused to allow three people present for the meeting to make any comment on the redistricting matter because no one had requested that they be placed on the agenda. Those present were Don Sheffy, Larry Gonzales and Joe Crespin.

"I've told you if you want someone to talk, get them put on the agenda," Simpson told Smith.

Smith's motion also included terminating the services of Allison & Associates, which had been handling the redistricting for the county before it was switched to Daugherty & Associates.

"We already terminated the services of Allison & Associates," Simpson told Smith. "I'm sorry you didn't know that."

"What better deal could you get than to have the head of the Justice Dept. get the redistricting done for us?" Smith asked the other commissioners.

"Why won't they work with Virginia on it?" asked Pct. 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson.

In comments outside the meeting, Crespin, who is a plaintiff in a redistricting lawsuit against the county, said, "We only wanted to suggest that the county make the changes that the Justice Dept. pointed out" in the letter of rejection that was sent to the county May 11.

Gonzales said he thinks the commissioners are "afraid" to have an Hispanic elected to the commissioners' court.

In other business:

The commissioners approved several line item transfers for various county departments, but rejected one for Pct. 1 and modified another.

Smith had requested \$4,000 be transferred from capital outlay to road and bridge materials in his precinct's funds. County Auditor Maretta Smithson said that Smith's recent purchase of 14 grader blades and six culverts caused his budget to be overspent in that category by \$3,173.34. Pct. 2 Commissioner Dale Winders made the motion to transfer only that amount and no more. Smith seconded the motion and all voted in favor.

Smith had also requested a \$15,000 transfer from capital outlay to road and bridge materials for "contract hauling."

"We don't allow contract hauling," Simpson said.

"Then it's for buying material," Smith said.

"That's not what it says," Pct. 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos said.

"Then make it say whatever you want," Smith said.

The second transfer requested by Smith was rejected.

Also, in reviewing the bills, a payment of \$82.50 to Leonard Gerber was rejected. Gerber is an employee of Precinct 1. Smith said he was reimbursing Gerber for use of his personal vehicle while one of the precinct pickups was being repaired. The other commissioners told Smith he should have shifted use of his other two precinct pickups, but Smith said he preferred to handle it the other way.

The other commissioners told Smith that the expense could not be

paid by the county. They also reminded him that the county pickups should not be taken home by his employees. Smith had said Gerber occasionally drove a precinct pickup home in the evening and frequently for his lunch break.

For the final vote on payment of the bills, Smith was out of the room. The other commissioners voted in favor of paying all the bills except the one to Gerber. Among the other bills was a payment for \$4,316.97 to Daugherty & Associates for work on the redistricting plan.

Bid proposals on property in Hart being sold for payment of back taxes were approved, but must also be approved by the City of Hart and the Hart School Board before becoming final.

Maxine Myers was appointed to the board for Rhoads Memorial Library. She succeeds resigning board member Jackie Byrnes.
