

The other itch mite commonly called the depluming mite, is a very small! creature which burrows into the skin near the base of the feathers. The intense itching sometimes causes the fowls to pull their feathers until they are almost naked. Dipping of all fowls on an inflected flock in a tub of water containing about 2 ounces of flowers of sulphur and one-half ounce of laundry soap to each gallon of water will give complete control. The fowls should be completely submerged and the feathers ruffled so all parts of the body will be reached by the liquid. Care should be taken to keep the dip stirred during the treatment so as to keep the sulphur in suspension. In case a flock has live as well as the depluming mite, three-fourths ounce or one heaping tablespoonful of so-dium flouride should be added to each gallon of water in the foregoing mixture.—Floyd Co. Hesperian.



HRRIGATION ON PLAINS LAND COST \$1.50 PER ACRE

The cost for irrigation in the Plainview country, as estimated by John W. McCullum, special census agent for the Federal Government, during the last season. January to June, was \$1.50 per acre. This is only an approximate figure, and includes only the cost of labor and the cost of filed and oil. Mr. McCullum ascertained that on the 5.000 acres irrigated in the vicinity of Plainview the total cost as tabulted by the owners was \$7.500.

COUNTY OFFICERS NOT RE-PORTED MAY LOSE PAY

Austin, Texas, Dec. More than one-balf of the counties throughout the State has so far failed to certify the names of their newly elected county officers, announced C. D. Mins, Secretary of State, who added that unless they do so commissions cannot be issued to them. The Comptroller will not draw warrants in favor of public officials who have not been duly commissioned by the Secretary of State.

Procrastination in certifying the names of the newly elected county officers is similar to that experienced in obtaining election returns.
