THE LOCKNEY SCHOOL BOARD ELECTS FACULTY FOR NEXT YEAR

The schooll board of the Lockney Independent District met Tuesday night of this week, with President S. W. Perry, presiding and all mem-bers of the board and Superintendent J. J. Wilson present.

At this meeting of the board the faculty for the 1923-24 school term was completed, with the exception of one or two teachers which will be elected at a later date.

Superintendent Wilson has been re-elected for the next term of school and, we understand, has accepted. Mr. J. B. Allen was re-elected, but it is understood that he will be anable to accept, as his intentions are to attend school next term. Mr. J. H. Lockey, present athletic director and teacher of science, was elected as principal. Mr. Patterson, who is one of the high school teachers, has advised the board that he will be unable to accept a place on the faculty for next term, on account of his gin busi-ness here. Other high school teach-ers elected are Mrs. E. M. Randolph and Miss Reynolds.

Teachers elected for the grades, subject to assignment, are Misses McFall, Rose Stewart, Lauream Christian, Alma Livingston, Mabel Reeves, Olga Honea, and Roy Riley. Miss Nox was re-elected, but will not accept, as she intends to attend school next term. A teacher for the seventh grade is yet to be elected.







COUNTY AGENT NOTES Time to Spray Fruit Trees

It is time to spray apple trees just s soon as all the petals have fallen. Then after two weeks spray again and then three weeks from the second spraying a third should be applied in order to control the codling moth. The codling moth egg is deposited on the young buds and in the blossoms and just as soon as the young apple is formed the little worm enters the apple and remains in there till the apple is a good size and then causes it to drop. The other sprays are to control the worms that enter the apple after it is larger. These tiny worms enter the little apple and if the spraying is done just as soon as the blossoms are off the calix closes and the poison will not reach them. The first spray should be applied just as soon as the blossom's have nearly all fallen

The spraying equipment should be gotten into shape and if you do not have the spraying machinery you should get it at once. A barrel spray pump should be used for larger orchards but a knapsack pump is large enough for a home orchard. This knapsack pump holds about three gallons of the solution. A foot bucket spray pump is not satisfactory because it does not make a fine enough spray. A nozzel which will make a fine mist should be used.

Lead arsenate, paste or powder, should be used for the poison. Use 2 1-2 pounds of powder or 5 pounds of paste to 50 gallons of water.

Control Black Beetles. The common black beetle which is now present in large numbers will do great damage to the crops which are now being planted if they are not controlled. These beetles are developed from the white grubs which feed on grass roots. Most of these beetles are found in pasture lands and along fence rowsThey migrate from these waste places into the fields and destroy the young plants of cotton and Among the many improvements maize.
