HAS ATTACK OF BRONCHO-PNEUMONIA BUT CONDITION IS IMPROVING

Presidential Headquarters, Palace Rictel, San Srancisco, Tuesday, July 31 (3:30 Central Time).-President Harding, characteristically calm and determined, is fighting the greatest battle of his career-a struggle in which his life is at stake.




