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Communism And Socialism-What Is The Difference?

The Difference? Among some of the political terms used today, such as "Liveral" "conservative", or "capitalist", are two other terms which are used often, "socialism" and "commun-ism". Many people think that these terms have the same meaning, but they are different. The official name of the Soviet Union is the Union of Soviet Socialist Republies, and the Communists use the term "socialism" in references to their doctrine; but Socialism and Com-munism have certain basic differ-ences. First of all, the Communists say

First of all, the Communists say that when Communism has been established, all forms of govern-ment will gradually "wither away", leaving a one-class society living in perfect harmony-without a gov-ernment. This type of civilization would be impossible today, because people are of such a nature that the strong would eventually take advantage of the weak. A Com-munist state could exist only if peo-ple were genetically bred to such a state that they would never take advantage of each other. Therefore, the various countries which call themselves Communist are not actually so, and they never will be. Communism is actually a totalitar-ianist system, in which the people exist to serve the state. In a demo-cratic system, the government cratic system, the government exists for the sole reason of ser-

crafic system, the government exists for the sole reason of ser-ving the people. Another difference between the two systems of socialism and Communism is that the Commun-ists attempt to change things by violently overthrowing the govern-ment, while socialists and other democratic groups try to change things by peaceful methods. Socialiss feel that property should be either owned by the private person or owned by the dub e government. Last of all, the Communists and other totalitarian groups suppress the freedom to speak out against the government, the freedom to worship as one pleases, the free-dom to own and enjoy property, and the freedom to elect one's lead-er, while socialists respect the index of the individual


