

GINS BURNING ARE DETRIMENT TO FARMERS


The burning of gins at various points over the Plains are proving quite a detriment to the cotton farmers. Within the last few days the gine at Flomot, Ralls and Petersburg have been burned, and as the gins at most the towns nearest to ! these points are overrun with cotton to gin it has created quite a hardship on the farmers of these sections.

Lockney has three gins, starting the season with four gins, one being burned about six weeks ago, but these three gins are running day and night, and using every available minute to care for those bringing their cotton to Lockney. To this end the Lockney gins will set aside two nights a week to care for the Flomot cotton.

Every effort will be made to take care of this business, even to providing places for the farmers to sleep and eat, and to see that they get the very highest prices for their cotton at this place. Lockney business men desire to serve the people of this section, and make the farmers feel that they can depend on Lockney for their marketing place. Lockney paid about ic per pound more for cotton Tuesday than any other town in this section, and the farmers can rely on getting the very highest price possibly for their cotton here a tall times. The machine's success this time was even greater than the inventors had expected. 


