# EVERY CITIZEN OF THE LOCK-**NEY. PETERSBURG & LUBBOCK COUNTRY URGED TO BE PRESENT**

Railroad building will begin in West Texas within the next thirty days and we are in line for the first road to be built. The first road to be built in this section of the country will be built over the old Altus. Lubbock & Roswell survey, the dump of which is already built and in first-class shape from Silverton, through Lockney, Petersburg to Lubbock. Every person who is interested in this line is requested to be present at a mass meeting of Lockney, Petersburg and Lubbock citizens, at the High School auditorium in Lockney, Friday (tomorrow) night at 7:30 o'clock when you will hear the story about the building of this railroad. We have had men in the field for the past two weeks securing information concerning the routes of proposed railroads and they have something of special interest to every red-blooded citizen of the Lockney, Petersburg and Lubbock country, and they expect to let the people present at this mass. meeting know what they have found out about the railroad that is to be built from Lubbock north thru this section of the country.

There has been representatives of several different railroad companies in this section during the past few weeks gathering data and getting preliminary surveys on the line of the old Altus, Lubbock & Roswell line through Briscoe, Floyd, Hale and Lubbock counties, and these men are to be in Lockney at an early date to confer with the people along this line in reference to building the road.

Reports from Austin and Fort Worth state that the Fort Worth and Denver will begin the building of a line of railroad out of Estelline to points on the South Plains within the next few weeks, and we are also in line for this line of railroad. Lockney expects the people who have made Lockney "The Heart of the Best Farming Section of the Plains" to show their colors and be present tomorrow evening at 7:30 to help put over a proposition that will mean the greatest thing in the way of developing this section that has ever come our way.

ANTI-MASK BILL BECOMES A STATE LAW

Severe Penalty is Provided for Violations of Law-Hollowe'en and Mardi Gras Not Exempt

Austin, March 9 .- Wearing of masks in public, went under the ban today when Govoernor Ferguson signed the Holbrook anti-masking bill, which was substituted for the Mankin bill in the senate as the bill carries the emergency clause, it goes into ef-

fect immediately. Severe penalties are included for breaking the law. The penalties: appearing in public masked \$500 fine; masked near, or entrance into private home while masked, one to ten years in the penitentiary; masked near or in a church, except at church entertainment, two to ten years; for assualt while masked, not less than five years in the penitentiary.






