THE PAVING PROPOSITION

At this time there is more agitation in regard to the paving of main street from the middle of the block near Baker Mercantile Co. to the Santa Fe track south and from the north end of the pavement to the site of the Denver depot to the north. This piece of pavement would do a great deal for Lockney in the way of improvement, and will be very badly needed when the two depots are built. The paving from the north end of the present pavement to the site of the Denver depot was promised to the Denver Road by the railroad committee if the depot was located on the proposed site, and the pavement on South Main to the Santa Fe depot has been promised to the Santa Fe railroad, provided a brick depot is built in the center of the street at the railroad tracks. 




BIBLE TO BE TAUGHT IN TEN-NESSEE SCHOOLS.

The State Board of Education at its meeting June 19 authorized the teaching of the Bible in all schools. The following resolution was adopted on the motion of Governor Peay:

"Resolved, That the Board of Education of Tennessee hereby approves the inclusion of the Bible in the currisulum of elective studies for which schools may give credit.

"To this end the commissioner of education is authorized to appoint a committee of five representatives of the Protestants, Catholic and Jewish faiths of our State, all of which have the Bible as the basis of their moral and spiritual instruction, to formulate a syllabus of Bible study, and a plan for teaching same which committee shall report as promptly as convenient to the State Board of Education for final approval of its recommendations."-Tennessee Educational Bulletin.



The railroad commission Saturday set for hearing October 13 aplication of the North Texas Petroleum Traffic Bureau of Fort Worth for a revision of regulations, so as to allow mixing or blending in transit of naptha and natural gasoline in tank cars at refining points in the state.

The rate on reserve deposits of from \$5,000,000 to \$7,000,000 of state funds will be increased one-fourth of onehalf per cent December 1, when the present 2 per cent contracts expire, Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher announced, following the meeting of the state rate-making board. The reserve rate is now 2 per cent. This board reestablished the 4 per cent minimum interest rate on state deposits in Texans banks, for time deposits.

Exactly 14,748 more automobiles were registered in Texas during the first six months of 1925 than dur ing the year of 1924, when 837,445 automobiles were registered, occording to figures compiled by the state highway department. More than a million machines are expected to be registered during this year, highway officials indicated.

Through an error in paving the Beaumont-Houston Road it was found that the County of Jefferson had crossed nine lots at Nome belonging to the Texas Townsite Company and had also used Southern Pacific prop erty. This was brought out when the Texas and New Orleans Railroad and Texas Townsite Company filed a claim for damages.


