Texas News

A. Waltonbarger, land owner of Red Branch, 25 miles northwest of Sherman, has discovered a vein of coal on his farm. It is 19 feet under the ground and ranges from 50 to 309 yards in width.

Valuations of Cameron County property on the tax rolls just completed are \$27,272,612, as compared with \$25,-288,413 last year, an increase of almost \$2,000,000.

Menard will ship 300,000 pounds of pecans and Kimble County will market 800,000 pounds, according to announcements of growers in those sections.

There has been ginned in Rusk county up to October 18, 44,802 bales of cotton as compared with 17,224 bales for the same date in 1924, making this year's crop almost three times as large as last year's

An early and discriminative selection of farm seeds as one of the most important moves in preparation for next year's crops in East Texas is recommended by R. E. Carswell, Wood County agricultural agent.

The controversy between the cities of Schulenburg and Flatonia over distribution of \$27,000 in highway surplus funds has been settled by Payette County commissioners with the award of half the amount to each

October, 1925, came near the record for October rainfall at Galveston with 17.34 inches. Only twice in 55 years has this been exceeded, with 17.78 inches in 1871 and 17.39 in 1877. In October, 1924, only a trace of rain fell.

The law requiring railroads in Texas to maintain comfort stations at stations was upheld recently by the supreme court when a writ of error was refused in the case of the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway Company against the state of Texas from Clay County.

Mayors of 52 Texas towns have been advised by State Fair Marshal J. J. Timmins that the fire marshals of those towns are delinquent in making reports regularly of fires, and that unless these reports come with morning regularity, a charge of 3 cents will be applied immediately to the text.

Immigration department officials in Fort Worth have been requested to assist the South Texas department heads in stopping the expected infux of Chinese coolies into the United States when a recent edict of President Calles of Mexico expelling the Orientals from the country goes into effect.

Assessed valuation of Freestone County this year is \$22,258,455, against \$10,107,940 for 1924, figures made public by the tax assessor at Fairfield show. The increase of \$12,150,515 is due to discovery one year ago of oil near Wortham and the bringing in of one of the best pools of the Balconnes fault in Freestone County.

Only indigent confederate veterans are eligible to apply for pension, Controller S. H. Terrell was advised this week by Assistant Attorney General George C. Christian. The opinion, in answer to a query of the controller, stated that though a veteran be disabled, he was not entitled to receive the pension if he had any source of income.

In order to prevent the spread of the pink boll worms, rules requiring that all cotton lint from El Paso and Hudspeth counties be vacum fumigated, has been promulgated by George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, effective November 10. The rules also require that all cotton lint shipped in from Donna Anna County, New Mexico, be vacuum fumigated.

Farmers and business men of Milano and vicinity have organized in Houston the Milano Watermelon Growers' Association. The following officers were chosen for the ensuing year: J. H. Burnet, president; R. J. Sloan, secretary; G. W Butte, O. T. Bullock and S. E. McGregor, directors. It is estimated that between 750 and 1000 acres will be planted to watermelons by the association.

Thus far this year Texas has escaped an epidemic of dengue fever. In previous years Texas people have suffered in the fail seasons both physically and financially as a result of the fever, but only three cases have been reported this year. County and city health officers reported communicable diseases for October as follows: Tuberculosis, 155; chicken pox, 7; diphtheria, 78; dysentery, 2; influents, 11; measles, 3; meningitis, 3; mumps, 8; pellagra, 2; pellomyelitis, 1; pneumonia, 1; scarlet fever, 46; smallpox, 1; typhoid fever, 68; trachoma 1, and whooping cought, 67.


Another reason that men do not talk at home is because they are selfish. They make no effort to entertain their wives because they are concerned only with their own comfort and pleasure, and are not considering
