
EDD MUNCY ANNOUNCES FOR FLOPY CO. DISTRICT CLERK

WE ARE AT PRES-ENT ABLE TO MEET ALL COMPETITIVE PRICES, which is ten cents higher than they would be without this organization, and pay a small refund. Big creameries who claim they own this territory, are running prices high at present trying to discourage this association, if you fail to co-operate with our organization these creameries will monopolize the prices, and pay 10c to 15c lower as heretofore, and we will be forced to take our cream to Plainview where there is a Dairy Association, as we have done before and some are now doing.

Thru the courtesy of the Lockney Grocery, the Floyd County Dairy Association has opened a station in the rear of their building. Mr. O. C. Burgess, manager of this station, is an experienced cream man in the testing and grading of cream. Honest tests are fostered and it is to his interest to give high tests since his salary is based on per centage butterfat received. This station is furnished with up-to-date equipment all the best testing apparatus obtainaable, together with steam cleaner and sterilizer for cans.

MEMBERSHIP in this Association costs only one dollar per year, which is taken out of refund to be used in advertising, stationery, records, etc.


