

#### Auto Tragedies Increase as Other Travel Is Made Safer



WHILE railroad tragedies and street car accidents in the United States have gradually been diminishing in the last ten years, the annual toll exacted by automobile casualties is steadily mounting, says the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents. Railroad accidents have been cut more than one-third, or from 12.520 in 1913 to 8.075 in 1923, the latest government figures available. Street car fatalities also have been cut down one-third or from 3,080 in 1913 to 2,006 ten years later Automobile deaths, on the other hand, have increased over five-fold. Against the 3,822 deaths in 1913 we have 16,452 in 1923, and the score is
