The sewer bond election will be held on Tuesday, August 16th. The purpose of voting bonds is to take care of the outstanding warrants of the city, and build a sewer system in Lockney that will cost approximately \$40,000. A sewer system is the only thing that is needed in the town to give every modern convenience that can be offered in any town in West Texas, and the sewer is one of the most important conveniences that a town can have.

Lockney needs a sewer system in the worst way. The town is built on level ground and there is practically no drainage at all in the town. Water and trash remains where it falls, and in many instances becomes stagnant and unhealthy, while the water and refuse from bath tubs, sinks, etc., of the town run into the gutters, and there remain, making excellent breeding quarters for disease germs of all kinds. Then, again, with no sewer system, we have the ever disagreeable toilets, that harbor all kinds of flies, disease carriers and germs.

With the voting of the sewer bond the town will be able to do away with one of the biggest nuisances and most unhealthy conditions that have prevailed here in the past, and will enable it to be kept perfected sanitary, as well as having a convenience that is for the best of any community.

Good Rain Fell Last Friday Morning

COVERED LARGE AREA OVER PLAINS AND PANHANDLE COUNTRY

A big rain fell over the Panhandle Plains country last Thursday night and Friday morning, reports stating that from two to four inches fell in the different sections. Here in Lockney a little more than two inches fell, and to the north of town, where the rains this year have been very light the rain was reported to be more than three inches.

The rains at this time were worth much to the growing crops, and the crops in general are in the best of condition and growing very fast, however, the lice are reported on the cotton plants in some places.

The feed crops are in fine condition and the prospects for a bumper feed crop are very good at this time. The cotton crop will depend largely on the weather conditions and the extent of the spread of the lice. If we have dry weather for ten days or two weeks, the lice will probably have little effect on cotton but to have a fair cotton crop this year, the frost will have to be late and the plants receive no insect damage.

Steel Laying Begun On Denver Line

ENOUGH STEEL ASSEMBLED AT
ESTELLINE TO LAY 200
MILES OF TRACK

The actual laying of steel on the new South Plains lines of the Denver Railway was begun at Estelline, on the main line, Monday of this week with a large crowd from the various towns along the line present.

More than 200 miles of steel rails and 75 cars of cross ties have been unloaded at Estelline for the new line and the big steel laying machine is now at work on the new line. All the grade, bridges, etc., have been finished as far as Turkey, and the steel laying will proceed that far without interruption. The big locomotive used for the work, was run into the Estelline yards last week, and has been busy switching the material and getting ready for the laying of the steel. The big steel laying machine takes the steel from the flat cars and places the rails in position on the ties, and then travels over the rails it has laid, and lays the new rails in front.

In all probability the steel laying will proceed without any material delays, as the tunnel between Quitaque and Lockney, just under the cap rock has been completed, with the exception of the concrete work, and the balance of the grading and cutting should be ready for the steel laying gang by late fall.

The grading on top of the Plains has been finished on the line from the caprock to Lubbock, with the exception of one mile in the city limits of Lockney, and a short stretch in the city of Lubbock, which will allow the laying of steel from the cap rock to Lubbock just as soon as the top of the cap is reached. The grade is practically up from the junction to Plainview, and there are some grading crews at work on the Dimmitt end of the line. There has been no grading done on the Silverton line from the junction north.

Several acres of ground is covered with material at Estelline for the new lines, and bridge materials are being carried out from both Estelline and Lockney for work along the line, and it is the belief of some, that the steel laying gang will reach the top of the cap rock by December 1st, this year, or possibly sooner, and that all the track will be laid and the trains running by late winter or early spring.

The work under the hill is now being concentrated on the new tunnel, which is being cut just north of the big tunnel, where it was found it would be easier to tunnel than to make a big cut through a hill. Steam shovels and blasting gangs are very busy making cuts and fills that are necessary on the line to the top of the cap.

All Amendments Suffer Defeat

LIGHT VOTE BUT HEAVY MAJORITY AGAINST FOUR AMENDMENTS IN MONDAY ELECTION

AUSTIN, August 2.—Overwhelming opposition buried the four proposed amendments voted on by Texas Monday. Of 189 counties reported, 26 of them complete, but two favored the amendments which would have changed the judicial system, increased salaries of the State officials, abandoned the fee system, and changed the system of taxation.

With apparently no more interest in the making of returns than was manifested at the polls Monday, but 106,592 votes were accounted for Tuesday night. But the vote was so decidedly against these amendments that those outstanding in the 253 counties in Texas would have little effect on the result when the ballots are tabulated officially.

The counties that made a favorable gesture of the changes sponsored by Governor Dan Moody were Harris and El Paso. A bit of strength was reported early in the Rio Grande Valley, but it soon diminished. Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar counties went strong against these amendments.

Machinery Being Installed At Mill

LOCKNEY COTTON OIL MILL MACHINERY ARRIVING AND BEING INSTALLED IN MAIN BUILDING

Work on the seed house, the linter and hull houses will begin in a short time. The foundation to the seed house has already been laid, and work will begin on its erection within the next few days.

The mill is the largest and the best mill that has been erected in the state so far, and when placed in running order will use a large force of men regularly.

Water Works Extensions Almost Complete

NOW TESTING MAINS WHICH ARE ALL LAID AND READY TO COVER UP

Work on the water works system and extensions in Lockney are progressing at a rapid rate, all the ditches having been dug, and the mains placed in them, the testing of which is being made this week, to remedy all leaks which might occur in the pipe.

The big concrete reservoir was completed several days ago and is now ready for use. The engine for the plant will soon be installed, the foundation having already been built, and the driller now busy drilling the new well. The entire water extensions will be complete within the next few weeks.

The water extensions are costing the city about \$30,000, making the City's water works system total about \$100,000, and giving the city the best water supply and cheapest water rates to be found in West Texas. The water rate has been lowered by the city council to a minimum of \$1 per month to resident users, with an extra charge of 10c per thousand gallons over 3,000 gallons used each month. The industrial water rate has been cut to 8c per thousand gallons.

New Buildings Nearing Completion

BYINGTON BUILDING AND BAKER'S FILLING STATION NOW NEARING COMPLETION

The brick work on the Byington building, a two story brick, being erected on Main Street, has been completed the past week. The workmen are busy at this time putting on the roof of the building and finishing up the interior work of the building, and within the next few days the building will be ready to be turned over to the owner, Mr. J. H. Byington.

The brick and concrete filling station, being erected on Main Street for Artie Baker is nearing completion, the brick work having been completed.

Bond Election Fails To Carry In Floyd County

OUTLYING COUNTRY BOXES DEFEAT ISSUE BY SMALL MAJORITY

In the election held Monday for the purpose of issuing \$475,000 worth of road bonds for the purpose of paving Lee Highway across Floyd County, the issue was defeated by 48 votes, lacking that number of votes being the desired two-thirds. The towns of Floydada, Lockney and Aiken, and a few small boxes gave the bonds a large majority, but the outlying country boxes, and especially in Commissioners Precinct No. 3, went so solid against the proposition that the final returns lacked 48 votes of having the necessary two-thirds that would have carried the bond issue.

GAS ORDINANCE
Passed, July 25, 1927

An ordinance regulating Gas Piping, Appliances, Fixtures and Apparatus in all buildings and structures of Gas Consumers, and the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof provided for bonds to be given by those who do such work, providing for permits and providing penalties and declaring an emergency.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas

Section 1: That the City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to supervise all gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus, whether now or hereafter existing, placed in or in any manner connected in any building or tent or structure of any character, whether used for business or resident purposes, in the City of Lockney, and the installation, construction, reconstruction and repair thereof and to see that all the rules and regulations of said City of Lockney with respect thereto are properly complied with and to inspect and reinspect all such gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus and the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof to be such as not to cause fire or accident or injury to life or property and any and all such gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus now existing or hereafter existing as well as the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof shall be subject in the foregoing inspection and supervision.

And it is further ordained that no gas appliance, fixture or apparatus, either for heating, illuminating or hot water heating, be installed until type of said gas appliance, apparatus or fixture has been approved by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistant.

Section 2: That the said City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants shall be subject to the order and direction of the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas and they are hereby vested with full authority to enter an building or premises or structure, subways or other places, either public or private, at any time in the discharge of their duties, and to pass upon and decide any question arising under provisions of this ordinance or any ordinance hereafter passed or any rules and regulations already adopted or hereafter adopted by the City Council relative to any such gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus or the installation, construction, reconstruction, adjustment and repair thereof or relative to the materials used therein, whether the same be in the original construction and erection or in any alterations or repairs thereof.

Section 3: No person, firm or corporation shall enter upon the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair of such gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus or any change thereof, nor shall any such person, firm or corporation undertake for any other person, firm or corporation, the adjustment thereof) until the said individual, firm or corporation shall have secured a license as hereinafter provided and shall have executed and delivered to the City of Lockney a good and sufficient bond in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars having thereon two or more sureties approved by the City Council of the City of Lockney, one of which said Sureties shall be a surety company duly authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the faithful performance of all such work entered upon, or contracted for, in strict accordance and compliance with the terms, requirements and provisions of this ordinance and such further and future ordinances of the City of Lockney as may be hereafter passed. Said bond shall be condition-

ed that such person, firm, or corporation shall, without additional cost to the person for whom the work is done, remedy any defects therein due to faulty workmanship or incorrect construction or due to the faulty material furnished or used by such person, firm or corporation, and that such person firm or corporation shall construct, re-construct or repair such work to the satisfaction of the Plumbing Inspector of the City of Lockney at any time within one year after the construction, repair or installation or repair thereof, and after forty-eight (48) hours notice from the City Plumbing Inspector to reconstruct or repair the same. In case of gas leaks of any nature, upon order of said City Plumbing Inspector or any of his assistants, the gas shall be cut off immediately from the premises forthwith without notice and likewise the said City Plumbing Inspector or any of his assistants may in the interest of the public safety order the gas supplied to any customer cut off immediately without notice. The said bond shall for all the foregoing purposes be in force for one year after any such work on the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair work of such gas piping, is done and one recovery shall not exhaust said bond but said bond shall be a continuing obligation against the sureties thereon until the entire amount thereof shall have been exhausted. In case the bond therein provided for shall be decreased on account of any recovery which may be obtained or arising out of the violation of any conditions of the same, the City Council shall require, upon notice of such fact, an additional bond to be given by such person, firm or corporation in accordance with this ordinance in any amount sufficient when added to the unexpired amount of the original bond, to be at all times equal to the sum of \$1,000.00. The City of Lockney, may for itself or for the use and benefit of any person injured or damaged by any reason of failure to repair any defective gas piping or any defective installation, construction, reconstruction or repair thereof or for the failure or refusal by any person, firm or corporation to pay any of the fees required by this ordinance, maintain suit on said bond in any court having jurisdiction thereof or suit may be maintained thereon by any person injured or damaged by reason of any breach of any of the conditions of said bond. The bond here required shall expire on the first day of January next following the date of the approval of such bond by the City Council and thereafter on the first day of January a new bond in form and substance as herein required shall be given by any such person, firm or corporation to cover all work as shall be given by any such person, firm or corporation to cover all such work as shall be done during the year beginning on such January 1st.

That upon approval of said bond by the City Council the individual, firm or corporation, desiring to do such work shall secure from the assessor and collector of taxes of the City of Lockney, a license which shall run until the first of January next succeeding its issuance unless sooner revoked and shall not be transferable. In the event of the dissolution of any company or partnership holding such license, the member retaining such license shall be required to renew the bond herein provided for before doing any such work provided for herein. That the names of each and every member or representative of any firm or corporation obtaining the license shall be given to the Assessor and Collector of taxes of the City of Lockney and all such names shall be inserted in such license. The person, firm or corporation obtaining such license shall pay to the Assessor and Collector of Taxes of the City of Lockney, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) as an annual license fee therefor, provided that if said license is issued after January of any year the license fee shall be for the proportionate remaining part of such year computed from the first day of the month in which the same is issued.

Section 4: The size of the pipe shall not be less than called for in the following tables:

The same with four or five mixers, 1 1/2-inch pipe; for regular installations approval of size shall be secured from City Plumbing Inspector.

Air mixers must not be placed in air tight ash boxes, but where a free flow of air can reach them at all times.

No house riser shall be less than 3/4-inch pipe.

No branching for cooking stoves shall be less than 3/4-inch pipe.

Use as few elbows as possible; elbows not absolutely necessary will be condemned. When impossible to get through an obstruction such as a beam, offset the pipe rather than use elbows.

For all large buildings the plans for piping should be taken up directly with the City Plumbing Inspector before any pipe is installed. All piping for fixtures with a great number of burners on them will have to be made larger accordingly.

Gas is never to be supplied from a smaller pipe to a larger one.

Pipe must be free from obstructions. White lead or other joining material should be used sparingly so as not to clog the pipe.

The riser must be extended to a point within 18 inches of the proposed location of the meter, and to right of same at least 20 inches above floor.

Meter should not be located near furnaces or ovens, locked in compartments or placed in any other position where they will be inaccessible or liable to injury. Under no condition will a fitter or plumber or other person disconnect any meter, connect to or disturb piping between main and meter.

When to accommodate different tenants, one or more meters are desired in a given building, the gas supplying company will set as many meters as there are separate consumers, connecting the meters to one service pipe, provided that the risers or pipes leading to these different tenants are extended to within 18 inches of the proposed location of the meters, which are to be set in the same location.

Risers should not be scattered, but should drop together in alignment to the room where the meters are to be set. They should be kept at least three inches apart, and should not extend less than 20 inches from the floor.

Union and valves must not be used in concealed work, but long threads if necessary, should be used.

Long runs of horizontal pipe should be firmly supported at intervals by metal fasteners to prevent sagging.

All branch outlet pipes should be taken from the sides or tops of running lines, never from below.

Bracket pipes should be run from below when practicable. Drop extensions must be supported with at least three supports, one under pipe at drop, one across between cap and ell or bend and one half-way between drop and main pipe. All supports are to be 3" x 1" or larger number.

Two supports must be used for all bracket extensions, one directly under riser ell and one half-way between and ell and main supply pipe.

House pipes should be so run and covered as to be readily accessible. No cast iron fittings smaller than 3 inches are to be used.

No individual, firm or corporation shall enter upon the installation, construction or reconstruction of any work provided herein until a permit has been issued by the City Plumbing Inspector, covering each installing or addition to be made, and when required by the said City Plumbing Inspector, plans and specifications for the proposed work must be filed with him before the permit is granted or during the process of said work; provided, however, the City Plumbing

Inspector may issue a general permit to any individual, firm or corporation owning or controlling any building for a term not exceeding three (3) months from the date thereof, authorizing minor alterations or changes, but such permit shall be revocable. No permits will be required for the repair or adjustment of gas piping appliances, fixtures and apparatus.

Section 5: When a plumber or fitter has completed the system of piping and has all full drop and bracket extensions and heater openings firmly and permanently fastened, he shall test the piping and if found tight, file a written application for tests with the City Plumbing Inspector and the Plumbing Inspector or one of his assistants will call and inspect the piping and witness the test, and if the City Plumbing Inspector or such assistant will issue and deliver proper certificate to the effect.

The piping must be tight under a pressure of ten inches of mercury column. This test will be made before the fixtures are hung and appliances connected and before the piping is closed in. The use of gas fitters cement for repairing leaks is strictly prohibited.

Any additional piping of outlets installed after a certificate is granted must be reported for inspection and test.

No gas fitter, plumber or other person doing work in any house or structure shall conceal any of said gas piping until certificate of inspection is issued and inspection card attached to said piping.

Section 6: If any person, firm or corporation shall fail or refuse to remedy any defects found by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistants in any work, provided for herein, within seventy-two hours after notice to do so, the City Plumbing Inspector shall not issue any further permits to such person firm or corporation until such defects are remedied; or if it is shown that said person, firm or corporation is incompetent to do such work, then the license of such person, firm or corporation shall be subject forfeiture by City Council.

The City Council may forfeit the license of any such person, firm or corporation for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or such future ordinance of the City of Lockney as may hereafter be passed; provided, that the forfeiture of any such license shall not in any manner affect the liability of the principal or sureties on the bond of any person, firm or corporation for any work herein provided for previously done by any such person, firm or corporation; also, provided, that in the event that the license of any person, firm or corporation issued under the terms of this ordinance is forfeited for any violation of this ordinance or other ordinances of the City of Lockney, pertaining thereto, said person, firm or corporation shall not be granted another license for the period of one year after the date of the cancellation of previous license.

Section 7: Any and all gas piping appliances, fixtures and apparatus

and other material, which may at any time become defective and in the opinion of the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistants likely cause leaks, fires or accidents or to endanger persons or property, shall be condemned by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistants and when, in his opinion, it is deemed necessary in order to prevent such accident or danger, said City Plumbing Inspector or his assistants is hereby authorized to disconnect such gas piping, appliances, fixtures, apparatus or material shall cause the same to be put in safe condition and tested and approved by the City Plumbing Inspector.

When any gas piping, appliances, fixtures, apparatus or material of any nature whatsoever have been in any manner disconnected and rendered inoperative by the City Plumbing Inspector or the service discontinued, as set forth in the foregoing provisions, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to in any manner reconnect the same or cause the same to be reconnected to any supply of gas or to use same as a part of any gas piping system until they have been put in safe condition and a certificate of acceptance has been issued by the City Plumbing Inspector.

Section 8: In every gas installation all piping and attachments must be of at least such capacity as will supply gas up to the maximum requirements of all appliances contemplated to be connected thereon according to requirements of this ordinance.

No gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus or the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair thereof, for which a permit is issued shall be put to use or connected to any supply of gas until inspected and accepted by the City Plumbing Inspector.

All applications for inspection will be held at least twenty-four hours after same are filed. It is required that same individual, firm or corporation or his or her representatives shall personally inspect every installation before a card for inspection is filed and that all work for which the inspection is asked shall be complete.

Applications for re-inspection must be made out on new cards the same as the original application, stating whether the first, second or third inspection. Telephone or verbal requests will not be considered.

When any gas piping, appliance, fixture or apparatus is found to have been installed without proper permit or not in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, the City Plumbing Inspector, or his assistants is hereby authorized and empowered to prevent any supply of gas thereto or to the consumer until such permit has been secured from the said City Plumbing Inspector and such work inspected or re-inspected, and approved.

Applications for inspection shall be filed with the said City Plumbing Inspector and accompanied by a fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar for the first two openings and twenty-five cents for each opening thereafter. A fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar shall be charged for each inspection after the second

inspection made on condemned installation for each opening.

Before any such gas piping, appliances, fixtures, or apparatus constructed or furnished under permits hereafter granted, shall be approved, the same be granted, the said work or any certificate of acceptance of must be complete, and in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Plumbers or gas fitters shall consult Gas Company for the location of meters before starting job. The Plumber or Gas Fitter shall be held responsible for any changes in meter risers installed in locations not authorized by Gas Company.

Section 9: Any gas installation not specifically covered by this ordinance must be approved by the City Plumbing Inspector.

Section 10: All powers conferred by this ordinance upon the City Plumbing Inspector are hereby likewise conferred upon his assistants and such assistants and who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, each of them may likewise exercise all such powers.

Section 11: That any person, firm or corporation or who shall fail to comply with the requirements of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day's continuance of any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute and be deemed a separate offense. That in case of any such violation of any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actually in charge of the business of such corporation or the person or persons actually performing the work for such corporation, shall be subject to the penalties herein provided.

Section 12: The fact that the City of Lockney does not have an ordinance regulating the installation of gas piping and fitting and that gas work is already being constructed, creates an emergency on account of the immediate preservation of the public safety requiring that this ordinance take effect at once and it is accordingly ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage and approval.

Section 13: All connections Stoves of any fixtures must be made with wrought iron joints.

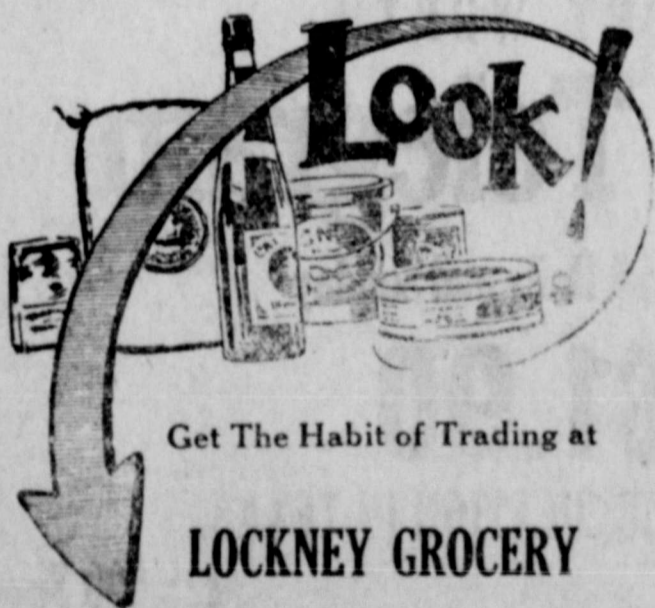

THE FARMER'S BEST WAY OUT

Dean Russell of Wisconsin College of Agriculture says: "Two things have hit the farmer hard but the same things have hit business. They are increase in cost of production and decline in prices which latter has been more drastic in farm products than manufactured products. The farmer's political friends say salvation can be found through legislation. Our legislative doctors propose price control. The difficulty with this is price control always means price elevation which always produces expansion in production and if this occurs without expansion in consumption you have inevitable decline in prices. The remedy works to produce the very opposite result from that intended.

"Another legislative panacea would make it easier to borrow, as if running into debt was the solution of the difficulty. There are farmers who wish it had not been quite so easy to borrow because the inevitable day comes when they have to pay principal and interest. The third legislative remedy would make easier the pathway for cooperative endeavor. All you have to do is to wave the magic wand 'Cooperation' and all the farmer's difficulties will immediately disappear. I wonder if there is any government that can make people cooperate. The success of cooperative effort will lie in organization from the bottom up rather than from the top down and it will take a decade or two for the results to be felt.

"The farmers have at hand a remedy that can be utilized immediately with the definite knowledge that it will secure far better results if they will take a leaf out of present day business methods they will have relief in agriculture they will not have to wait for. Business has suffered the same as the farmer, yet business came through in a way that is far ahead of the farmer. This has been brought about through industrial efficiency, through improvement of methods. They have increased labor output per unit to the degree the costs of production have actually been reduced by better methods of carrying on work. Industrial enterprises on a large scale are spending millions on research. In ten years automobile output per worker has increased 172 per cent, tires 211 per cent, oil 83 per cent, cement 61 per cent.

"Compare that with others. The packers have increased only 27 per cent, sugar refining 25 per cent, boots and shoes only 6 per cent. There has been an increase in agriculture since 1913 of 20 per cent. It is doubtful that business has any such opportunity as exists in agriculture to reduce cost of production through improved methods. Take corn,—Iowa shows a variation in cost of production from fifteen cents to seventy-five cents a bushel. In Illinois the cost of producing corn on 80 acre fields was reduced from fifty-two cents to twenty cents a bushel. The manufacturer who had it within his power to reduce production costs from fifty-two to thirty cents per unit would be tickled to death with the opportunity of meeting competition under these conditions.

"The way out for the farmer is (1) to become a business man, (2) to adopt business methods, to adapt himself to the same kind of conditions and be as efficient, mobile as is our manufacturer or our business man in the ordinary channels of his trade, (3) to rely less upon political promises and more upon individual initiative, (4) to work toward cooperative endeavor but in the meantime not to wait for cooperative endeavor to solve all of these problems because individually he can do something at the present time."

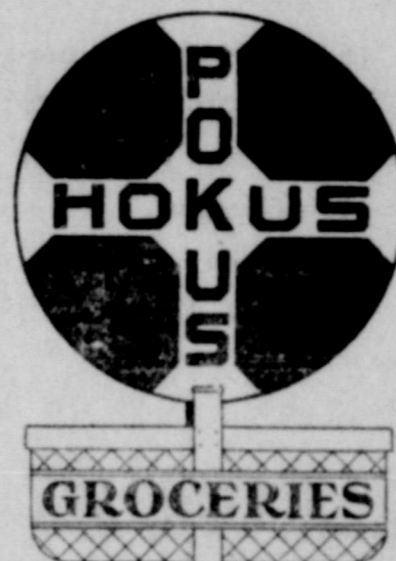

ORDER AND NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS

On this 14th day of July, 1927, the City Council of the City of Lockney in Floyd County, Texas convened in called session at its regular meeting place in the City Hall with all the members thereof present, viz:

E. O. Baker, Secretary
and passed the following order:

It was moved by Alderman Hohlaus and seconded by Alderman White that there be submitted to the qualified voters of said City who are property tax payers therein the two following propositions for the issuance of bonds of said City, Proposition No. 1 being for the issuance of \$40,000 sewer bonds, and Proposition No. 2 for the issuance of \$15,200.00 Funding bonds, as hereinafter more fully set out, for the said City of Lockney, Texas, such election shall be held on the 16th day of August, 1927. The motion was carried by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Hohlaus, Guthrie, White, Woodburn, and Coleman.

NOS:
None.

Thereupon the following election order was adopted:

It appearing that the City of Lockney is in need of sewers, and that the City Council of said City deem it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for said purpose in the amount hereinafter set out:

And it further appearing that the City of Lockney has an unpaid indebtedness, consisting valid and legally binding obligations against said City for lawful City purposes in the amounts and of the description hereinafter more fully set out, to wit:

City of Lockney Fire Truck war-

rants, dated May 15th, 1925, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and maturing serially \$900.00 each year on Feb. 1, 1928, 1929, and 1930
TOTALING \$2,700.00

City of Lockney Funding warrants, dated Aug. 15th, 1925, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and maturing \$1000.00 on April 10th, of each of the years 1928, 1929, 1930 and 1931. TOTALING \$4,000.00

City of Lockney Street warrants, Series of 1927, dated March 1st, 1927, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, interest payable semi-annually and maturing serially, \$500 on February 15th, of each of the years 1930, 1931 and 1932.
TOTAL \$1,500.00

City of Lockney Waterworks Extension warrants, dated, July 10th, 1927, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and maturing serially, \$500 on April 10th, of each of the years 1929 to 1942 both inclusive.
TOTAL \$7,000.00

Therefore, be it ordered by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas, that an election be held on the 16th day of August, 1927, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City for their action thereupon:

Proposition No. 1

Shall the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Lockney Texas, in the amount of \$40,000.00, maturing serially within forty years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, and levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund with which to pay the principal at maturity, for the purpose of construction of sewers as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Statutes of 1925.

Proposition No. 2

Shall the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Lockney Texas, in the amount of \$15,200.00, maturing serially within forty years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum, and levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund with which to pay the principal at maturity, for the purpose of funding an equal amount of outstanding indebtedness existing against the City of Lockney, Texas, by cancelling the evidences thereof, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall building in the City of Lockney, and the following named persons are hereby appointed Judges and Clerks, respectively, of said election:

S. J. Baldwin, presiding judge; D. C. Lowe, judge; Mrs. Carl McAdams, clerk; and Mrs. Ed Reeves, clerk.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the manner of holding same shall be governed by the laws regulating general elections, so far as applicable, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers in said city shall be entitled to vote at said election.

All voters who favor the foregoing proposition, No. 1, to issue the bonds for the construction of sewers shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTION OF SEWERS," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF SEWERS."

All voters who favor the foregoing Proposition No. 2 to issue bonds for funding the heretofore described indebtedness shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE FUNDING EXISTING INDEBTEDNESS," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words, "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF FUNDING EXISTING INDEBTEDNESS."

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary of the City of Lockney shall serve as a proper notice of said election; and the Mayor and City Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to because such notice of election to be posted at the hereinbefore named polling place in said City of Lockney for thirty full days prior to the date of such election and also

to cause such notice to be published in some newspaper of general circulation which has been published in said City for at least one year before this date, which notice shall be published once each week for thirty full days before the date of said election, the date of the first publication thereof to be not less than thirty full days

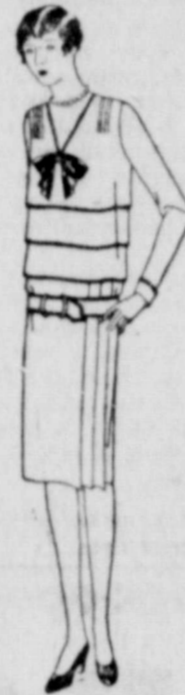

SOMETHING WE LIKE

Salads of various kinds often form the main dish during hot weather.

Tomato Aspic
—Take two cupfuls of stewed tomato, to which one slice of onion and one teaspoonful of salt have been added. Boil twenty minutes and strain. Add two tablespoonfuls of gelatin dissolved in one-half cupful of water, and add to the tomato. Mold. Celery salt, cayenne and bay leaf may be added for seasoning when cooking the tomato if liked. Serve on lettuce with a highly-seasoned salad dressing.

Meat and Nut Balls.—Take one cupful of chopped cooked well-seasoned veal, add one dozen chopped almonds, one egg, one-half teaspoonful of salt and pepper to taste. Mix and roll into balls, place in a baking pan and pour one cupful of rich, highly-seasoned tomato sauce. Serve on a platter garnished with watercress.

Peach Beatty.—Use soft crumbs from the center of a loaf, mix three cupfuls of the crumbs with one-half cupful of melted butter. Put a layer of crumbs into a baking dish and lay over them a layer of sliced peaches; sprinkle with sugar, orange or lemon peel and bake one hour. Cover the dish while baking the first half hour, then remove and brown. Serve hot with cream and sugar.

Oil Pickles.—Add to two quarts of sliced cucumbers (size one inch in diameter), four thinly-sliced onions, or a dozen small ones, as they make a better slice, corresponding in size with the cucumbers. Cover with a strong salt water and let stand overnight. Drain, add one cupful of olive oil, celery seed, mustard seed (one tablespoonful of each or more if liked) and just cover with vinegar. Seal in mason jars and keep in a cool place.

Watermelon Cocktail.—Cut slices of ripe watermelon and with a potato ball cutter prepare balls to fill sherbet glasses. Prepare a sirup with lemon or orange juice and rind, cool and pour over the melon balls. Let stand an hour on ice to season and serve with a sprig of mint in the center of each glass.
