Luncheon Will Be Served in Metho dist Basement Beginning Next Monday at Noon

At the regular Monday luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce, Mesdames A. B. Cox and L. L. Savage, representatives of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Lockney Methodist church, submitted a proposition to the organization to serve the luncheon each Monday at noon, which was accepted, and beginning next Monday the regular weekly luncheon will be held at the church.

The hotel proposition was discussed again, and the proposition was passed to the next meeting, awaiting developments.

Mr. D. L. Hannifin, of the Beatrice Creamery Co., and Mr. H. F. Duehning of Shawnee, Okla., were visitors at the luncheon, and Mr. Hannifin made a good talk on the dairy interests in this section of the country, stating that this section had a decided advantage over other sections of the country along this line of farming, and favored the business men encouraging more pure-bred milk cows, chickens and hogs, and assisting the farmers to make this a more extensive dairying section. Mr. Duehning is looking out a location for a creamery, and was quite favorably impressed with the outlook for such an institution in this section of the country.

President Mason submitted a proposition to gather statistics of production in all lines of farming and manufacturing in Floyd county, so that at any time we would be able to tell any outside interests just what they wanted to know at any time about the county. This move on the part of Mr. Mason was sanctioned by the organization and carried over to the next regular meeting, when Mr. Mason will submit his plan in full for final action of the body.
