



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

ous as a feed for livestock and poul-try, so much so that the poultry and livestock centers of California and other states depend largely on the milo crop of West Texas as their business barometer.

Here are facts that may startle the most optimistic: Floyd county probably has 50 registered Jersey cows. When making up a Floyd county exhibit for the State fairs last year, the secretarys of the Floydada and Lockney Chambers of Commerce were unable to find one sample of pure bred milo in Floyd county. The same fact held true in cotton, as 90 per cent of the fields grew 'scrawney,' four-lock, half and half cotton that would have disgraced any county's fair, but still this product had to be exhibited at the State fairs as representatives of Floyd county.

In the survey conducted, many farmers brought forth samples of black hull wheat, the ban of all millers and hardly fit for export purposes, yet we puzzle ourselves over the question as to why we do not receive a profitable price for our farm products.

Farmers have few means of finding pure-bred seed suitable for their culture. A man is needed who has studied this condition for a period of years In the poultry industry, 90 per cent of the farmers know nothing of a balanced ration. Egg circles, having for their purpose a more profitable poultry production are being formed in the county as in California. If we had a specialist to inform the farmer as to the balanced ration and reasons therefor, these circles could make the farmer of Floyd county independent as they now are in California.

There is not a bull circle in Floyd county, today. It is not that the farmers are not interested but they need a specialist to start the project correctly.

Whether farmer or follower of some other line of business, it behooves all citizens to bring pressure to bear to secure the services of a specialist to instruct and supervise constructive farm projects as all citizens of the county are dependent upon the farmer and his industry.

The South Plains of West Texas are now on a threshold of industrial development. Do you think an industry dependent upon farming would come to Floyd county if the farmers are not progressive in their methods of production? Don't you know that industries are subject to tax and will remunerate the treasury of the county in securing a county agent? Is it not a good business principle to invest money in education? Is not Floyd county being retraded from an industrial, agricultural and educational standpoint because we do not have a county agent?
