

### HOW WE WILL VOTE IN THE PRIMARY

Below we have scratched the ticket according to the way we will vote in the primary election next Saturday, July 28th.

You will note that our choice in the first primary for United States Senator is Tom Blanton of Abilene, our second choice for this office is the present senator, Earle B. Mayfield. Blanton is the only candidate in the race from West Texas and has made a good record during the 12 years he has been in congress.

We will support Dan Moody for Governor, because we think Mrs. Wilman hasn't got a chance to win, and we are opposed to Wardlow, because he is wet and a Jim Ferguson favorite, as far as Hawkins we don't consider him in the race.

Every man and woman in Texas who are opposed to Catholicism and whiskey should vote for Tom Love for Lieutenant Governor, as he stands four-square against the liquor traffic and Catholicism, and will not support Al Smith for President of the United States. With the premium list complete in the agricultural and home demonstration departments of the Floyd County Fair, which will be held in Floydada Sept. 26, 27, 28, 29, and the directors being appointed in the various divisions of the exposition plans are rapidly maturing for the best and largest fair ever held in the county. Due to the fact that the Floyd county show is always a free admission event it attracts a much larger attendance than larger fairs with gate admission.

O. T. Williams, vocational agricultural teacher of the Floydada High School, will assist in the agricultural department. Mr. Williams is offering his assistance to those communities who are preparing exhibits and his services will be available in the very near future.

Miss Blanche Bass, county demonstration agent will again have charge of the club exhibits. Premiums of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be given to the best exhibits of home demonstration work prepared by one club. Individual premiums on material exhibited in the club exhibits will not be paid, but a free trip to the State Fair is being offered to the girl winning first place in the Girls Club exhibit.

One of the added features of the 1928 exposition will be the prize of \$10 offered to the member of the Floydada vocational agriculture who produces the best ten heads of Milo maize. A second prize of \$5 and a third of \$2.50 will be allowed. Pedigreed maize seed was furnished these boys by chamber of commerce members in the Spring and it is expected that the production from this seed will be able to take first place.

Several changes in the parade will also be made this year. A separate division for floats prepared by members of the various boy scout troops of the county will be made. Arrangements are also being made to make the doll parade a part of the big parade to be held on Saturday.

### PROPOSED LINE OR RAIL- ROAD IS CHANGED

Snyder, July 21.—Interest in the proposed Roswell, Snyder and Gulf Railroad was increased here Friday with the arrival of Capt. Ed. Kennedy and his associates, A. J. Keith, B. H. Halmadge and P. A. Neilan, all of Houston. They had just completed their final inspection tour of the proposed road all the way east from Roswell, N. M. with the citizens of each town.

Reports made public by them were that in each town visited the requirements made by the promoters had been complied with and the citizens were anxious for grading to start.

The route of the proposed road has been changed to some extent, according to Capt. Kennedy. From O'Donnell west the routing will remain the same, but east from that point, the road will run direct to Fluvanna, where connections will be made with the Roscoe, Snyder and Pacific Railroad, making a direct connection to Corpus Christi.

The promoter stated he had received proposals from several trunk lines and that when the final details had been worked out, he would accept one of these, assuring the construction of the route at an early date.

In speaking of the new route, Capt. Kennedy said it would lessen the haul from Roswell, N. M., to Corpus Christi by a distance of 480 miles, which would mean quicker service and a big saving in freight rates.

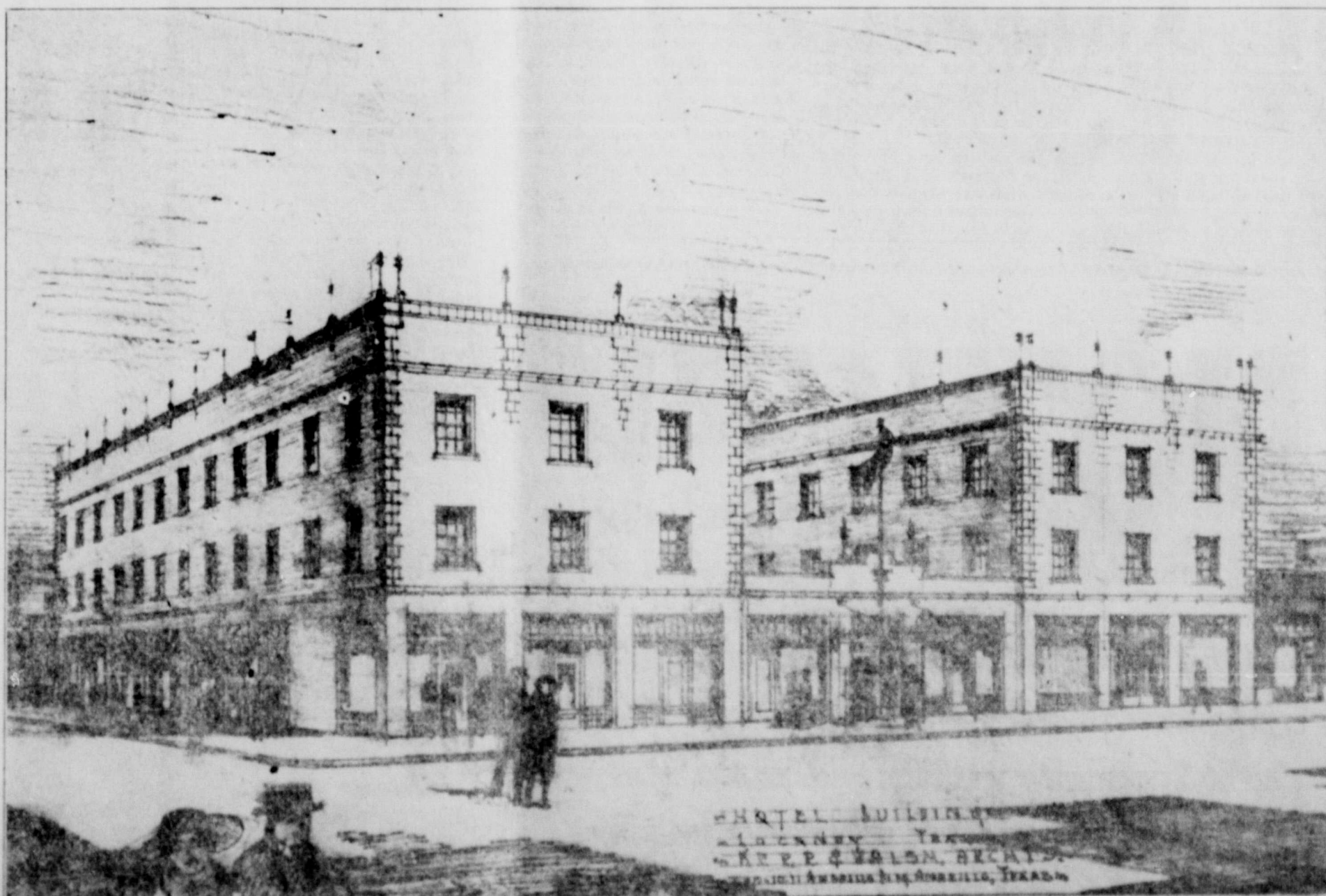
### RANKINS CALLED TO BEDSIDE OF FATHER

TRUE DEMOCRATS (?)

Newspaper Heading "Plan to Keep Solid South Solid."

Funny things happen in politics, and especially when the whiskey gang and Catholics join to get a slum born degenerate into office. What do you think of Chairman Raskob, president of the General Motors Co., and Chairman of Al Smith's campaign, talking about "Keeping the Solid South Solid" when as a matter of fact he has been a republican for the past 24 years, and would not today give the Democratic party any consideration were it not for the fact that he is both in favor of whiskey and is a member of the Catholic church. He cares nothing for the "Solid South Being Solid" only for the purpose of putting his tool, Al Smith, into office so that the liquor interests and Catholics can control this country. He should stop for a minute and consider there would be less General Motor products sold if whiskey was sold in saloons in the United States and The Catholics were at the head of the government, for the common people would be forced into poverty, and could not afford to buy Chevrolests, Buicks, Oldsmobiles, Pontiacs, Oakland, La Salle and Cadillacs, nor DeLco Lights or Frigidaires. Mr. Raskob, as his names implies, cares nothing for America other than for what he can get out of it. He is a believer in foreign rule, or else he would not support Al Smith, the Pope of Rome, and the Rum Delegation. His name doesn't belong to America, hence, we don't expect him to believe in American ideals. If for no other reason all true democrats should oppose the rule of Raskob, Al Smith, the Pope of Rome and the whiskey gang, because they look for their following among the ignorant, scragging of the world, and are wanting to boost a man from the slums of New York, who has never been associated with many white men, but has been associated practically in every way with that 85 per cent foreign population in New York, to lead our nation to ruin and degradation, to ignorance and penance, under the dictatorship of the Pope of Rome, to whom both Raskob and Al Smith pay homage.

THOMAS B. LOVE'S POSITION

One of the outspoken opponents of Al Smith in Texas is Thomas B. Love of Dallas. Mr. Love is a candidate for lieutenant-governor, and has announced that he will not support Smith in the general election. Because of his assertion the courts have held that he is not entitled to have his name appear on the ballots in next Saturday's primary. Because of the widespread discussion over Senator Love's position, and in order to give the public the complete details related to all the issues of the state and national campaigns, The Daily News is printing

in full a formal statement which Mr. Love has forwarded this paper:

"I am opposed to the election of Gov. A. Smith of New York as president of the United States and because of this fact my name has been withheld from the Democratic primary ballot in four of the 225 counties in the state and this action has been approved by the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals in a remarkable judicial opinion published last week. As any laymen or laywoman will find by reading our election laws they plainly provide that the names of all candidates certified by the Executive Committee (as my name was) shall be printed on the primary ballot and Article 207 of the Penal Code make it a penitentiary offense for any committee member or chairmen charged with the duty of printing primary election ballots to leave off any name duly certified to him.

The most important right of the people, and the most sacred, is their right to vote for any candidate for public office when they may choose to vote for and to have such vote honestly counted. This important and sacred right of "free suffrage" is guaranteed to every citizen of Texas by the Texas Constitution.

It was my great privilege and honor to collaborate with Judge Alexander Watkins Terrell in the Texas House of Representatives in 1903 and 1905 in drafting laws carefully designed to safe-guard and preserve this right of free suffrage in the Democratic primary elections in this state.

To this end, in the election laws then enacted, which are still the law, we were careful to provide that any qualified voter who would take the prescribed test, should be allowed to participate in the primary election of any party, and that any qualified voter eligible to hold an office, affiliating with any party (and certainly the right to vote in the party primary is the highest test of party affiliation), should be allowed to become a candidate for a party nomination and to have his name printed on the primary election ballot in every county in the state.

In order to protect this sacred right of the people against local political prejudices and political influences, it was strictly provided that no party committee or officer should have any power or discretion to interfere with the right of the people to decide for themselves whom they should nominate for office, and not only were the courts given so much power but were compelled by specific statute to prevent such interference by others.

This same San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals, composed of its present judges, in 1926, in the case of Briscoe vs. Boyle and others, 286 S. W. 275, passing on these same election laws said:

"The Legislature has in minute detail laid out the process by which political parties shall operate the statute-made machinery for making party nominations, and has so hedged this machinery with statutory regulations and restrictions as to deprive the parties and their managers of all discretion in the manipulation of that machinery," and further said:

"The Legislature has assumed control of that subject to the exclusion of party action, thus depriving the party of any power to alter, restrict or enlarge the test of the right of the voter to participate in party primaries."

Since our election laws were first enacted, or for about 25 years, no candidate who was eligible for the office he sought, has ever been refused the right to have his name printed

on the Democratic primary election ballot, and no name certified by the State Executive Committee has been left off the primary ballot in any county of the state, until the action of the local committees this year in the counties of Cameron, Val Verde, Galveston and Webb.

It seems that by reason of the constitutionally fixed vacation of the Texas Supreme Court it is impossible to get an appeal from this "strange" decision of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals, considered in the Supreme Court before the first Monday in October, when this campaign and the primary election will have passed into history. Thus, it seems that my clear and undoubted right to have my name printed on the primary ballot in Cameron, Galveston, Webb and Val Verde counties, for which I paid the State Executive Committee the compensation fixed by law, my name being duly certified by the State Committee upon the fullest consideration of all the facts, is to be denied me and that my name will not appear on the primary ballot in those counties. I am advised by many voters in those counties that my name will be written in on the primary ballot, and by many voters in other counties that this action which they regard as unfair and unjust will get me more votes outside the counties named than I can lose in those counties even though my name were not written in by any voters. In any event, it is the purpose of this address to candidly advise Democratic voters of the facts for their information, without complaint or cavil. In fighting for my convictions I know I must take what comes.

I am not only content but proud to pay any penalty that may be involved in opposing the election of Al Smith as President of the United States. My candidacy for the important state office of Lieutenant-Governor is based upon important state issues and I am unable to accept as sound the decision of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals that a Democratic National Convention has any power to drive out of the race for state and local offices all candidates before the Democratic State primaries whose consciences will not allow them to support the Democratic nominee for president.

Nor can I agree with the dictum of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals that the multiplied thousands of Democrats in Texas, men and women, whose consciences will not allow them to support Al Smith, for President are "the arch enemies of Democracy" or that they "now forsake the party and enter the Republican party." On the contrary, I declare that their records of loyal service in the past as well as their present attitude proves them to be the best Democrats on earth.

To use the words of our beloved Southern Methodist Bishop Edwin A. Mouton, a Texan, I intend to vote against Al Smith "as a Democrat because I am a Democrat."

Certainly we are as good Democrats as John J. Raskob, who has not voted for a Democratic presidential candidate in 16 years, voting for Harding in 1920 and for Coolidge in 1924, and a member of the Union League Club of Philadelphia, the staunchest Republican organization in America and one of the oldest whom Al Smith, only last week, forced the Democratic National Committee to elect unanimously to head the Democratic party as its chairman, even though we are not in favor of liquor in every American home, as he is, and do not believe that prohibition is "a damnable affliction," as he declares that Al Smith believes.

I am opposed to Al Smith for president because I am opposed to Tam-

many government in the nation. I am a candidate for Lieutenant-Governor of Texas because I am opposed to Tammany government in Texas. I deny the right or the power of Tammany Hall, by dominating a Democratic National Convention, to drive from the Democratic primary ballot in Texas all candidates who are opposed to Al Smith for president, and to Tammanyize Texas. The Texas democracy is not a sub-station at Tammany Hall. The Tiger shall not cross Red River."—Amarillo News.

FROZEN DESSERTS ARE FINE DURING HOT DAYS

Housewives will find that frozen desserts made according to the following recipes taken from the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman are very delicious and especially pleasing during the hot summer weather.

Sherbets—Make a syrup of two cups of sugar and one cup of water. Add three cups of water and any fruit or fruit juices preferred. When partially frozen add the well-beaten whites of three or four eggs.

The sweetness and the flavor "freezes out" in sherbets, so they should be made a little sweeter and a little stronger in flavor when they are mixed than wanted after they are frozen. A lemonade or an orangeade that is strong and sweet makes delicious sherbet. Lemons, oranges, and bananas, or lemons, oranges and pine apple alone are good. Watermelon sherbet made from the red pulp of the melon with a little lemon makes another good sherbet.

Fruit Mousse—Take a cup of any fruit pulp that is well flavored and sweetened. Whip a pint of cream, mix with the pulp, mold and pack in ice and salt. Let stand three hours. If the fruit is solid like pineapple, drain off the juice, heat it and for each cup all one tablespoonful of gelatine that has been dissolved in cold water. When the gelatine begins to set, fold in the whipped cream, add the fruit, and if necessary, a little lemon or orange juice, mold, pack in ice and salt and let stand for four hours.

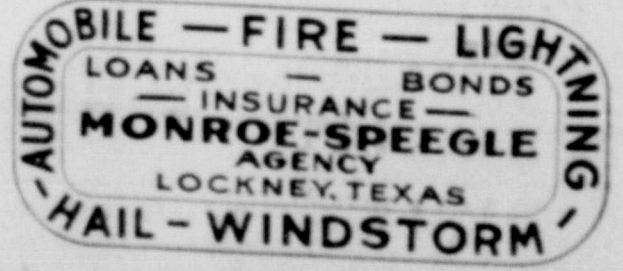

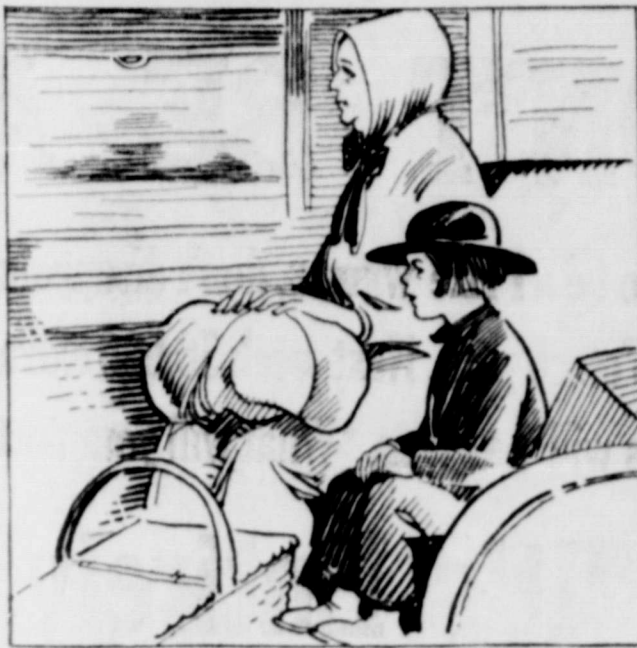

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### POT SHOTS AT POLITICS

Impartial enforcement of all laws is getting to be the real thing in Texas. The court of criminal appeals occupies the unique and distinguished place in the legal system of the commonwealth. It is the first appellate court created and vested with criminal jurisdiction only. As the result of this fact its judges have become specialists (according to the Texas bar) of the highest standing in the review of criminal cases and its opinions are cited throughout the world. The great legal writer, Wharton, in one of his commentaries referring to the court of criminal appeals says: "This court is unquestionably the ablest criminal court in the United States." The court, in the review of cases, follows no merely technical rules of practice. Briefs may be filed, but none are required. A lawyer may adopt his own methods of presenting his case and the simpler and more direct the method the better his chance of success.

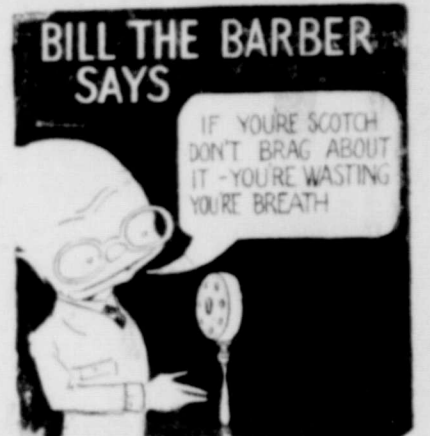
In determining the disposition of a case the court considers only its substantial merits. The entire record is read; the evidence is weighed and analyzed and the law applied to the exact case presented. This is the consensus of opinion of able members of the Texas bar. Judge W. C. Morrow, presiding judge of this court, is now a candidate for re-election. Again the consensus of opinion in the legal world is that he is an able, learned, experienced and impartial judge; that those who are acquainted with the work of the court since its creation rank him as one of its greatest judges, and that his candidacy has been approved by district judges, district attorneys, and members of the bar throughout the state constitute the best evidence touching his qualifications.

TRUE DEMOCRATS (?)

Newspaper Heading "Plan to Keep Solid South Solid."

Funny things happen in politics, and especially when the whiskey gang and Catholics join to get a slum born degenerate into office. What do you think of Chariman Raskob, president of the General Motors Co., and Chairman of Al Smith's campaign, talking about "Keeping the Solid South Solid" when as a matter of fact he has been a republican for the past 24 years, and would not today give the Democratic party any consideration were it not for the fact that he is both in favor of whiskey and is a member of the Catholic church. He cares nothing for the "Solid South Being Solid" only for the purpose of putting his tool, Al Smith, into office so that the liquor interests and Catholics can control this country. He should stop for a minute and consider there would be less General Motor products sold if whiskey was sold in saloons in the United States and The Government, for the common people would be forced into peonage, and could not afford to buy Chevroleats, Buicks, Oldsmobiles, Pontiacs, Oaklands, La Salles and Cadillacs, nor Delco Lights or Frigidaires. Mr. Raskob, as his names implies, cares nothing for America other than for what he can get out of it. He is a believer in foreign rule, or else he would not support Al Smith, the Pope of Rome, and the Rum Delegation. His name doesn't belong to America, hence, we don't expect him to believe in American Ideals. If for no other reason all true democrats should oppose the rule of Raskob, Al Smith, the Pope of Rome and the whiskey gang, because they look for their following among the ignorant, scrapping of the world, and are wanting to boost a man from the slums of New York, who has never been associated with many white men, but has been associated practically in every way with that 85 per cent foreign population in New York, to lead our nation to ruin and degradation, to ignorance and peonage, under the dictatorship of the Pope of Rome, to whom both Raskob and Al Smith pay homage.

THOMAS B. LOVE'S POSITION

One of the outspoken opponents of Al Smith in Texas is Thomas B. Love of Dallas. Mr. Love is a candidate for lieutenant-governor, and has announced that he will not support Smith in the general election. Because of his assertion the courts have held that he is not entitled to have his name appear on the ballots in next Saturday's primary. Because of the widespread discussion over Senator Love's position, and in order to give the public the complete details related to all the issues of the state and national campaigns, The Daily News is printing

in full a formal statement which Mr. Love has forwarded this paper:

"I am opposed to the election of Gov. A. Smith of New York as president of the United States and because of this fact my name has been withheld from the Democratic primary ballot in four of the 225 counties in the state and this action has been approved by the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals in a remarkable judicial opinion published last week. As any laymen or laywoman will find by reading our election laws they plainly provide that the names of all candidates certified by the Executive Committee (as my name was) shall be printed on the primary ballot and Article 207 of the Penal Code make it a penitentiary offense for any committee member or chairman charged with the duty of printing primary election ballots to leave off any name duly certified to him.

The most important right of the people, and the most sacred, is their right to vote for any candidate for public office when they may choose to vote for and to have such vote honestly counted. This important and sacred right of "free suffrage" is guaranteed to every citizen of Texas by the Texas Constitution.

It was my great privilege and honor to collaborate with Judge Alexander Watkins Terrell in the Texas House of Representatives in 1903 and 1905 in drafting laws carefully designed to safe-guard and preserve this right of free suffrage in the Democratic primary elections in this state.

To this end, in the election laws then enacted, which are still the law, we were careful to provide that any qualified voter who would take the prescribed test, should be allowed to participate in the primary election of any party, and that any qualified voter eligible to hold an office, affiliating with any party (and certainly the right to vote in the party primary is the highest test of party affiliation), should be allowed to become a candidate for a party nomination and to have his name printed on the primary election ballot in every county in the state.

In order to protect this sacred right of the people against local political prejudices and political influences, it was strictly provided that no party committee or officer should have any power or discretion to interfere with the right of the people to decide for themselves whom they should nominate for office, and not only were the courts given so much power but were compelled by specific statute to prevent such interference by others.

This same San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals, composed of its present Judges, in 1926, in the case of Briscoe vs. Boyle and others, 286 S. W., 275, passing on these same election laws said:

"The Legislature has in minute detail laid out the process by which political parties shall operate the statute-made machinery for making party nominations, and has so hedged this machinery with statutory regulations and restrictions as to deprive the parties and their managers of all discretion in the manipulation of that machinery," and further said: "The Legislature has assumed control of that subject to the exclusion of party action, thus depriving the party of any power to alter, restrict or enlarge the test of the right of the voter to participate in party primaries."

Since our election laws were first enacted, or for about 25 years, no candidate who was eligible for the office he sought, has ever been refused the right to have his name printed

on the Democratic primary election ballot, and no name certified by the State Executive Committee has been left off the primary ballot in any county of the state, until the action of the local committees this year in the counties of Cameron, Val Verde, Galveston and Webb.

It seems that by reason of the constitutionally fixed vacation of the Texas Supreme Court it is impossible to get an appeal from this strange decision of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals, considered in the Supreme Court before the first Monday in October, when this campaign and the primary election will have passed into history. Thus, it seems that my clear and undoubted right to have my name printed on the primary ballot in Cameron, Galveston, Webb and Val Verde counties, for which I paid the State Executive Committee the compensation fixed by law, my name being duly certified by the State Committee upon the fullest consideration of all the facts, is to be denied me and that my name will not appear on the primary ballot in those counties. I am advised by many voters in those counties that my name will be written in on the primary ballot, and by many voters in other counties that this action which they regard as unfair and unjust will get me more votes outside the counties named than I can lose in those counties even though my name were not written in by any voters. In any event, it is the purpose of this address to candidly advise Democratic voters of the facts for their information, without complaint or cavil. In fighting for my convictions I know I must take what comes.

I am not only content but proud to pay any penalty that may be involved in opposing the election of Al Smith as President of the United States. My candidacy for the important state office of Lieutenant-Governor is based upon important state issues and I am unable to accept as sound the decision of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals that a Democratic National Convention has any power to drive out of the race for state and local offices all candidates before the Democratic State primaries whose consciences will not allow them to support the Democratic nominee for president.

Nor can I agree with the dictum of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals that the multiplied thousands of Democrats in Texas, men and women, whose consciences will not allow them to support Al Smith for President are "the arch enemies of Democracy" or that they "now forsake the party and enter the Republican party." On the contrary, I declare that their records of loyal service in the past as well as their present attitude proves them to be the best Democrats on earth.

To use the words of our beloved Southern Methodist Bishop Edwin A. Mounon, a Texan, I intend to vote against Al Smith "as a Democrat because I am a Democrat."

Certainly we are as good Democrats as John J. Raskob, who has not voted for a Democratic presidential candidate in 16 years, voting for Harding in 1920 and for Coolidge in 1924, and a member of the Union League Club of Philadelphia, the staunchest Republican organization in America and one of the oldest whom Al Smith, only last week, forced the Democratic National Committee to elect unanimously to head the Democratic party as its chairman, even though we are not in favor of liquor in every American home, as he is, and do not believe that prohibition is "a damnable affliction," as he declares that Al Smith believes.

I am opposed to Al Smith for president because I am opposed to Tam-

many government in the nation. I am a candidate for Lieutenant-Governor of Texas because I am opposed to Tammany government in Texas. I deny the right or the power of Tammany Hall, by dominating a Democratic National Convention, to drive from the Democratic primary ballot in Texas all candidates who are opposed to Al Smith for president, and to Tammanyize Texas. The Texas democracy is not a sub-station at Tammany Hall. The Tiger shall not cross Red River."—Amarillo News.

FROZEN DESSERTS ARE FINE DURING HOT DAYS

Housewives will find that frozen desserts made according to the following recipes taken from the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman are very delicious and especially pleasing during the hot summer weather.

Sherbets—Make a syrup of two cups of sugar and one cup of water. Add three cups of water and any fruit or fruit juices preferred. When partially frozen add the well-beaten whites of three or four eggs.

The sweetness and the flavor "freezes out" in sherbets, so they should be made a little sweeter and a little stronger in flavor when they are mixed than wanted after they are frozen. A lemonade or an orangeade that is strong and sweet makes delicious sherbet. Lemons, oranges, and bananas, or lemons, oranges and pineapple alone are good. Watermelon sherbet made from the red pulp of the melon with a little lemon makes another good sherbet.

Fruit Mousse—Take a cup of any fruit pulp that is well flavored and sweetened. Whip a pint of cream, mix with the pulp, mold and pack in ice and salt. Let stand three hours. If the fruit is solid like pineapple, drain off the juice, beat it and for each cup all one tablespoonful of gelatine that has been dissolved in cold water. When the gelatine begins to set, fold in the whipped cream, add the fruit, and if necessary, a little lemon or orange juice, mold, pack in ice and salt and let stand for four hours.
